

City Sets Annual Election; Has Regular Salary Review

The regular election for the City of Goldthwaite was held April 7, 1979 by the Council at its regular meeting last Thursday night. Voters of the city will elect Mayor and two aldermen at that time. Terms expiring are for J. D. Harper, and James Charles Childress and Frank Bridges.

The council named Valeria Davis as election judge and Davis as alternate. Pay for the judge is \$2.50 per hour with a \$15.00 fee for every hour of the election. Alternates are also \$2.50 per hour. This is the maximum allowable pay for election judges in the State of Texas.

Other council matters were reviewed and set salaries for the coming year. City Manager Dale Davis listed the present salaries paid to employees with his recommendations for changes. He raised the salaries one by one and totaled the amount and showed the amount was within the budget. City salaries have been averaging \$5.50 per month for the fiscal year, and the raises would up the average by about \$900 per year, or an increase of 8%.

The council unanimously approved the salaries as recommended by the city manager also voted a \$150 per raise for the CM.

CITY MANAGER MONTHLY REPORT

The city will seek grants through the Central Texas Council of Governments for water improvements and sewer system updating. The grant program, called the block grant proposition, could be in the amount of up to \$125,000, and could be used as matching funds for other money, some through the Farmers Home Administration and others.

The council reviewed once again the speed limit for trains going through the city limits. At present only an emergency order is being used. The City Manager will work up an official ordinance regulating the speed of trains, which has been excessive at times. The item will be on the agenda at the next session.

The city electric department will install several capacitors in the near future, as per the request of the Lower Colorado River Authority, city power wholesaler. The LCRA made the request, saying that if the city doesn't comply to the stabilization of the power load through the use of capacitors the rates could be increased according to the power surges. The installation will cost over \$2000 but could save many times that amount.

City Manager Allen, Larry Pafford and James Knight attended the water school in San Saba recently, furthering their education into water systems and problems, and getting more credits toward higher licensing by the state.

The city office personnel have been attending schools on their way to becoming certified tax assessors.

The City Manager noted that three large items in the city list of property have not been insured to date. The large water storage tank, the building at the filter plant, and the building at the city reservoirs were not insured. Allen will take care of the matter and present it to the council at the next meeting.

The recent stint of bad weather has enabled the city equipment to be completely repaired and maintenance done. All appears to be in

good shape to enter the busy spring and summer seasons for the city work crews.

The council meets the first Thursday of each month in the City Utilities Building on Fisher Street. Everyone is invited to attend at any session. Meeting time is 7:00 p.m.

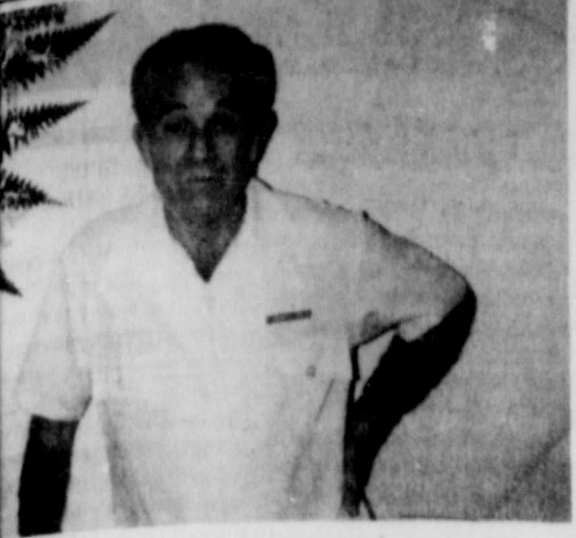

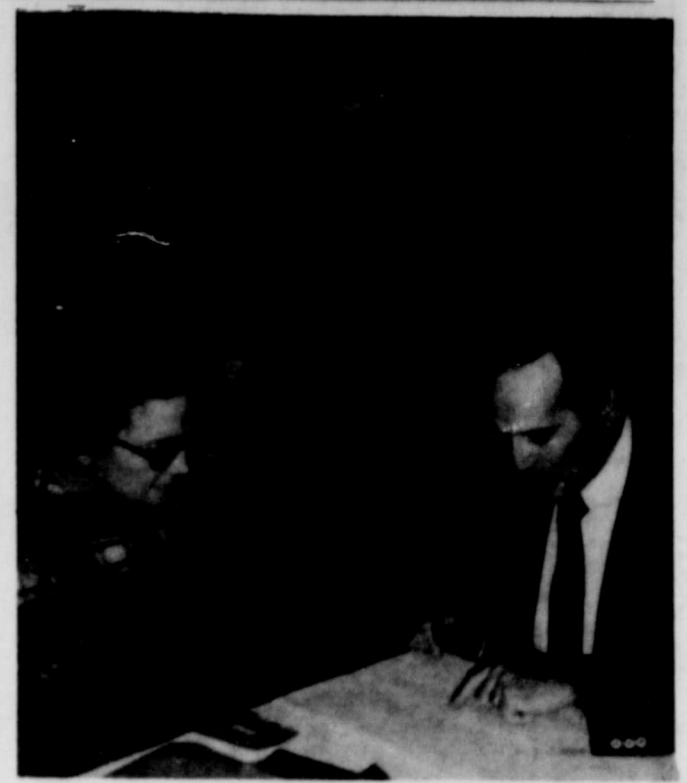
Twenty-Seven Participate In Landscape Workshop
