Resignations — Goldthwaite School Board Renews Teacher Contracts For Coming Year

These positions were approved pending the funding of the individual programs. Elementary teachers were rehired subject to placement in various classes. It is not known at this time how the class numbers will be split in 1979-80.

The board authorized the erection of parking signs adjacent to the elementary school and the high school in the bus loading zones. Times that the zones will have to be honored will be from 7:45 until 8:30 in the mornings and from 3:00 until 3:45 in the afternoons. At other times parents and others may pick up and deliver at the zones. This has come about as a safety precaution.

Five new sewing machine heads and another complete cabinet and head have been authorized for purchase by the board. They will be used in the home economics department of Goldthwaite High School.

In the athletic spectrum, the board authorized the purchase of a lane marker for the new track. The machine will mark all eight lanes at once, minimizing distortion.

It was voted to accept the list of equipment needed for the athletic program for the coming year, including all sports, both boys and girls, and to approve the money to pay for the items.

The letter jacket program was discussed by the board, and it was decided to leave the item unchanged. Students are eligible for one jacket in one sport or type of organization. The eligible items are rodeo, National Honor Society, drill team, band and athletics. Only one jacket can be received by a student during his entire high school tenure.

In other board business, it was decided to accept the recommendation of the textbook committee for the 1979-80 school term.

The board also rehired Mrs. D. E. Rhoades as secretary and Gloria Marler as tax assessor-collector.

City Council Handles Residential Matters; Others At Regular Meet

The Goldthwaite City Council met for its regular meeting last Thursday, and dealt with a varied agenda.

Mrs. M. F. Horton and Elton Geeslin were in attendance at the meeting to discuss the deed of a portion of a street to the city adjacent to the two property holders. The street in question runs perpendicular to Horton Street in the western part of Goldthwaite. At the present time the land is owned by the Hortons. The new street would serve Geeslin on the south.

It was the consensus of the council that City Manager Dale Allen submit a cost estimate on constructing the new street, with dimensions of 50 x 192 feet, to the council at its next meeting. The council will then decide if the amount of money would be justified for the street construction.

RAILROAD SPEED DISCUSSION

Bob Caldwell, assistant superintendent of the area Santa Fe Railroad, was at the meeting to talk about the speed of trains passing through Goldthwaite. Caldwell said the Santa Fe time schedule and information set the speed limit on local trains at 45 miles per hour. He said that the railroad has its own radar facility to monitor individual trains and that engineers may be fined if they are guilty of speeding on three separate occasions.

The subject arises as a result of several complaints of excessive speed by local citizens and one confirmed case of speeding, tracked by highway department radar equipment. Caldwell said he would deliver a letter giving the guidelines for the speed of the trains for future reference by the city. He said he would endeavor to see that the speed is not exceeded here.

LOT CLEAN-UP

Mr. and Mrs. James Carter were in attendance at the session to ask for the city's help in cleaning up a lot adjacent to their property.

The Carters listed the property as a health and fire hazard. The council requested a letter be sent to the property owner and that stronger measures would be taken in the matter is not settled.

G. C. Head Insurance was awarded the insurance on several items in the city's water department, that had heretofore been uninsured. A bid of \$344 was accepted by the council for about \$450,000 worth of insurance on the city filter plant, two water storage facilities and the building at the city off-channel storage reservoirs at the Colorado River. The policy will cover fire and extended coverage.

The council approved a recommendation by the Texas Highway Department to install passive railroad markers on the other crossings not controlled by the dropping arms on Fourth Street. The signs will be standard, and some streets would be painted in a standard style designating the upcoming crossing.

CITY MANAGER MONTHLY REPORT

CM Allen issued the following report for the month of February:

• Three test holes were drilled for water by the city by Cook Drilling Co. of Goldthwaite. None of the tests proved fruitful enough to be cased and added to the system. The city has drilled innumerable wells over the past twenty years in a search for the elusive water veins flowing underground. The test holes were made at a cost of \$4876. The council discussed the possibility of deep water in this area, even up to 1000-1500 feet. No concrete answers could be given to the question, and further study will be made of area oil and gas exploration records to try to come up with some definite conclusions.

• Kimmel Irrigation of DeLeon has been contacted and will be here soon to see why the pumping on the

large city well just north of town has been dropping off. Even after the well has been rested, the amount of water has dropped. There seems to be some problem with the pumps, originally installed by Kimmel.

• The council approved the setting of the next meeting

later by a week, as per the recommendation of Allen. This is done so the election results can be canvassed and no special meeting will be necessary. The meeting will be held on April 12, instead of April 5.

• City employees Yvonne Bruce and Grace Smith are

continuing their advancement on the road to becoming certified tax assessors-collectors. Both have been attending schools and have passed several tests on the tax business.

• The City Council will sit as the regular Board of Equalization, beginning with a session on March 12 at the City Utilities building. Time for the session will be 7 p.m. The group will review all the individual taxable properties and set values and then if any changes are to be made, taxpayers will be notified, and given a chance to make an appointment if they feel the change was not in order.

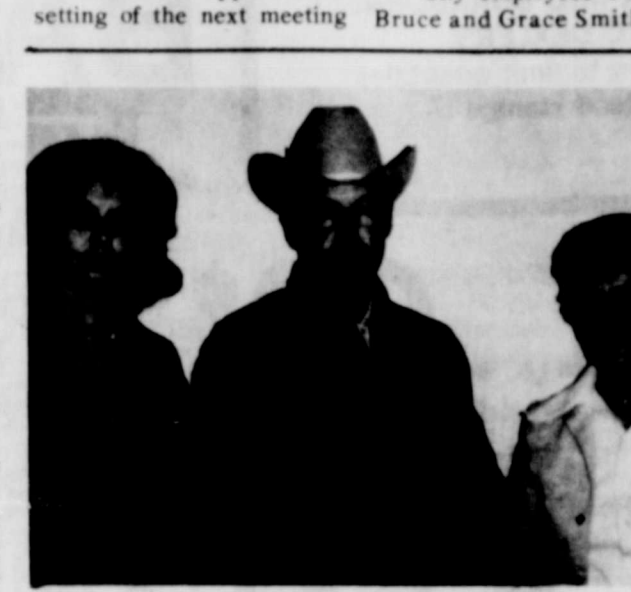
• City Manager reported that the crew had been doing extensive tree trimming around primary electric lines of the city's system. This is done to cut down on possible damage to the lines and to eliminate the accompanying line loss of electricity.

• Several blocks of streets were graded during the month.

• The monthly operating report showed that the city collected a total of \$55,337.15 and disbursed a total of \$57,325.42 in February. The council discussed the continual loss of revenue in the garbage department. Some regular stops may have to be eliminated to cut down on expenses.

• The February bills were authorized to be paid, including a payroll of \$12,505.42, of which \$349.27 was overtime.

The council meets the first Thursday night of each month at the City Utilities building. Time is 7 o'clock.

Extension Highlights

gardening is a topic of most of the minds of homeowners this time of year and this is the time to get requests for information concerning garden fertilizers and their use. We will attempt to provide some general information on this subject.

Before purchasing a fertilizer you should first consider the vegetable to be grown and the soil type in the garden site. Complete pre-plant fertilizers such as 10-20-10 should be applied at the rate of 2-3 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. to deep sandy soils. If there is a high clay content, you might consider a 16-20-0 or 15-10-5 at a rate of 2-3 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. Care should be taken when applying fertilizers with regard to rates particularly in poor thin, sandy soils. The best method of determining fertilizer needs is of course a soil test.

Once a decision has been made on the kinds and rates of fertilizers, they should be applied several days before planting, applying evenly over the plot and mixing it into the top 2 or 3 inches of soil. Avoid applying fertilizers in direct contact with seed as seed death and burning can result.

Additional nitrogen can be applied late as a sidedressing. This nitrogen can be applied as either ammonium nitrate (33-0-0) or Ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) at the rate of 1/2 to 3/4 lb. per 100 linear feet. This can be applied in a furrow and watered in.

Where soil condition and texture are problems, you might consider adding 2 inches of sand plus 2 inches of organic matter to the site in late winter and turning the soil to achieve mixture. Gypsum can also be added to improve structure and drainage at the rate of 6 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. Remember that garden site texture and quality should be achieved over a period of several years instead of attempting to make a complete change in a single season.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

WHO IS TENG?

Is Teng Hsiao-p'ing a friend or enemy of the United States? Is the image presented by the news media, President Carter, and the liberal bureaucracy reliable?

Teng Hsiao-p'ing is the vice chairman of the Communist Party of China and the Army Chief of Staff. He is a hard-core Marxist-Leninist trained at the Sun Yat-sen University in Moscow, a school where Communists receive training in revolution. He has been a powerful dominant figure of the Communist Chinese elite for over 40 years. While Teng was key military and government figure in the Southwest Military Region, he enacted land reform and the suppression of counter-revolutionary activities; acts which forced millions of Chinese from their homes and farms to be put to death by starvation, overwork, exposure, and disease. Other millions were butchered for "crimes against the people" such as owning an eighth of an acre of land or being a small business man. Millions more were sent to slave labor and "re-education" camps from which they never returned. Teng now boasts without fear of punishment that he was the "key military and government figure" in Southwest China during this time. He is thus personally responsible for millions of his countrymen being put to death.

Teng has twice been attacked by powerful rival factions of the Communist Party and once only a powerful friend kept him from being expelled from the Party. Teng and one other now control the Communist power of China. Teng holds the advantage since he is responsible for the economic and military modernization of Communist China. With help from President Carter and David Rockefeller, his star is on the rise again.

In conclusion, I quote a paragraph from an article written by John Rees in The Review of the News, Jan. 31, 1979. "The Chinese Communist Party of which Teng is the leader is a Marxist-Leninist organization that backs the enemies of the Free World on every continent. It supports its own networks of revolutionaries and terrorists throughout the world, from the Americas to Africa and back to Asia. Teng's record is one of craft and guile, mass murder, and the enslavement of millions, and exhibits patient vengeance as the most important trait of his character. Whenever it was prudent to do so, Teng Hsiao-p'ing supported the Soviet Union."

Soil Stewardship Week Set For May 20-27 In G'waite

Soil Stewardship Week, which has its origin more than 1500 years ago, will be celebrated in Goldthwaite and throughout the United States and its territories on May 20-27, 1979, according to an announcement by Kenneth L. Boyd, Chairman of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District.

The theme for the 1979 celebration is "Interdependence," a concept endorsed by President Carter in his foreword to the descriptive Soil Stewardship Week booklet. The booklet and accompanying Soil Stewardship Week material is distributed by Conservation Districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and individuals interested in participating in the unique celebration.

"Americans have always understood the value of working together to achieve common goals," President Carter said. "We have learned that unity of purpose and mutual dependence are essential to our growth as a society of self-governing

people. "It is especially fitting, therefore, that interdependence...of city and country, of Americans and their resources, and of man and nature... is the theme of Soil Stewardship Week in 1979," the President observed. "Our nation can be thankful for our progress in repairing the damage we have done to our environment. But that is only a start. To achieve greater harmony with nature, we must continue to seek harmony with one another."

The concept of Soil Stewardship had its origins in the special Rogation Days set aside by the Bishop of Vienne, France, following bad weather and earthquakes that brought crop failures and widespread hunger to much of France some 1500 years ago. The Bishop called upon the people to offer prayers and penance, and to offer humble thanks to their creator "for priceless gifts of soil, water, air and sunshine which make all living things possible."

While we are not faced with the immediate prospect of famine or hunger in the United States today, the reasons for Soil Stewardship commemorative activities have not changed very much, the sponsors believe. We still need to pause each year to express our thanks for the natural resources of soil, water and air which nurture our people and provide us with daily food and fiber necessary to carry on our daily existence.

Soil Stewardship Week has been sponsored in the United States since 1955 by the National Association of Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 Conservation Districts.

Old Man Winter Deals Icy Hand For Sheepmen

AUSTIN--Old Man Winter is having little sympathy with Texas sheep raisers this season, and the result has been more sheep and lambs moving into feedlots, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"A February survey shows that the number of sheep and lambs in Texas feedlots is up by 39 percent from a year ago, and the main reason is the weather," said Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "This year's rough winter has deteriorated pastures to the point that many producers have sold their animals as feeders or for slaughter rather than face expensive supplemental feed bills."

According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, there were 82,000 head of sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter in Texas as of the first of February. This is up 23,000 head from the same month a year ago, and is 15 percent above last month. Placements during January totaled 47,000 head, and, like November and December placements, are running well above the previous year.

Marketings during the last few months, on the other hand, have declined or remained steady in relation to 1978. Many analysts blame this also on the weather, saying that winter storms in important Eastern markets have made transportation difficult. In addition, transportation to Texas markets has been hindered in many areas recently due to adverse weather conditions.

IT'S TIME TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT GASOHOL, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently, noting that recent increases in OPEC oil prices have narrowed the cost gap between the agriculturally-derived product and gasoline.

"The cost of ethyl alcohol is approaching within only a few cents of gasoline prices at the service station," he commented. "And some engineering firms have reported that new technologies could reduce the estimated \$1-a-gallon price of gasohol by an additional 25 percent."

"One of the most important benefits of gasohol production is that it would provide an additional market outlet for many of our surplus agricultural products."

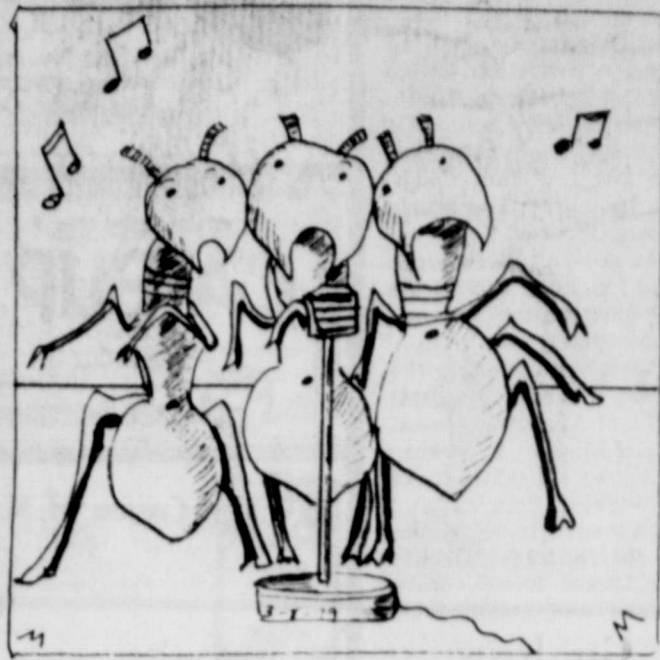

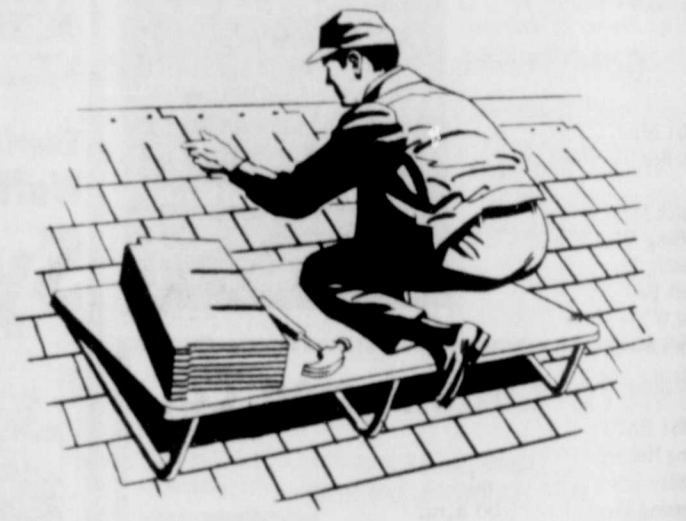

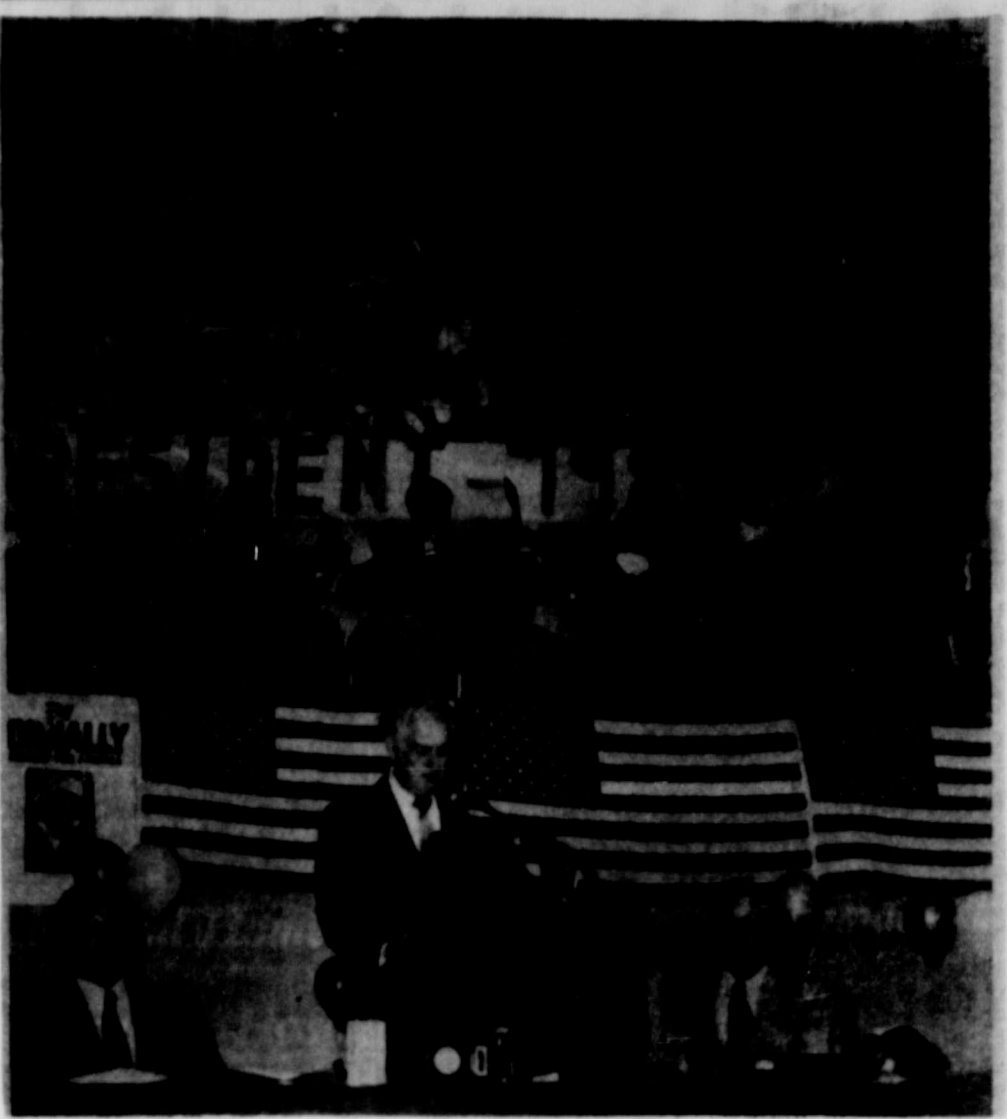

Mills County Farm Bureau Newsletter

Troy Berry, President

The president of the Mills County Farm Bureau is urging local farmers and ranchers to contact their legislators in support of H.B. 759 in the Texas Legislature.

Troy Berry said the bill, introduced by Reps. Tim Von Dohlen of Goliad and Stan Schlueter of Salado, would implement property tax relief for agricultural landowners.

Berry said that the local county FB has contacted both Rep. Stan Schlueter and Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene in support of the bill.

H. B. 759 has the support of the Texas FB which was active in the Nov. 7 general election in which the Tax Relief Amendment was passed. The bill, which is enabling legislation for the amendment, would limit the property tax value of agricultural land.

There are a number of versions of bills introduced to implement agricultural land tax relief; however, the local farm leader said H.B. 759 is "by far the most favorable" for farmers and ranchers.

Only H.B. 759 contains a provision which states that it is not the intention of the bill to increase the ad valorem tax value on any open-space agricultural land.

H.B. 759 provides that the taxing limit apply to all agricultural land; one version

denies this type of limit on agricultural land in city limits. The local farm leader said that cities generally provide no services to farm land, and the expenses for police and fire protection, streets, etc., are not increased by farm land inside city limits.

H.B. 759 also provides for a capitalization rate of approximately 15% in computing tax value. The higher this rate, the lower the value.

The income capitalization method is a mathematical formula whereby value is based on a set percent return applied to the annual new income from the land. Only return from agricultural use of the land is considered, subtracting any expense for labor, including the owner's labor.

The capitalized value of the farm is found by applying an appropriate percent of return to this net income. The capitalization rate is selected to represent a fair return, considering the risk involved.

Since farming and ranching is an extremely risky business, Farm Bureau believes that a high capitalization rate is appropriate, the local FB leader said. This is the reason Farm Bureau is backing the 15% capitalization rate, he said.
