Sales Tax Option For Texas Counties May Lessen Tax Burdens

Local officials of all the counties in Texas are deeply concerned about the coming changes with the problem of property taxes. They are faced with the ever-present need for funds. The problem is not a lack of need for funds, but a lack of a way to raise property taxes. The problem is that five assessors cannot evaluate all the properties of a county and render an equitable evaluation without a number of disturbing errors. "The sales tax method, however, is a bitter pill that it is," said Judge Ledbetter, "could hold property taxes down for from 4 to 6 years. It is progressive in the sense that as products rise in price the collected revenues increase proportionately on goods already manufactured." At present without the passage of this Bill 462 the individual counties are unable to use the sales tax as a more desirable method to meet increasing costs. The state has been reserving this right in the event the legislators in Austin decide they need increased funds above the current 4%. This is not likely since Texas has a surplus of 1 billion, 600 million according to the recent issue of the Texas Almanac. (p. 642) Legislators are not subject to the pressure of local taxpayers in eye to eye confrontation. Often they vote quite unthinkingly of what the people want. The local officials, however, receive relentless complaints and are moved in desperation to seek relief placing considerable hope in this bill. To add to their dilemma, both state and federal authorities mandate standards and numerous programs. It is true that some funding is allocated but the powers that be neglect to explain where the balance of money is to come from. In an interview with Judge Ledbetter it was revealed that he took a sampling of Mills County residents. Out of 164 voters, 2 were against, 2 undecided, while 160 were in favor of the right to vote on how they are to be taxed. Those 160 names were submitted to Rep. Stan Schlueter, vice-chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. In conclusion the judge stated emphatically, "Discussion of this issue in the coffee shops is not productive. Letters, however, do impress federal and state officials. I would like to urge everyone interested to write their opinions whether they favor the bill or not." 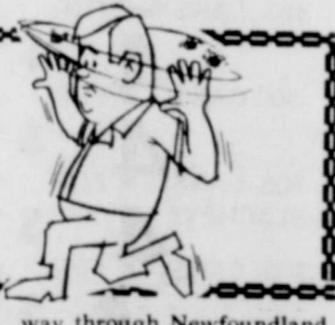
Home Demonstration Clubs Adopt New Name

Mills County Farm Bureau Newsletter

The Directors from the Mills County Farm Bureau were in Austin this week to contact Rep. Stan Schlueter of Salado, to urge his support of legislation which would give tax relief to agricultural landowners, according to Troy Berry, president of Mills County Farm Bureau. According to Berry, Farm Bureau supports provisions of H.B. 759, either separately, or as a part of H.B. 1060, a tax relief package bill that has been reported out of committee in the Legislature. Debate was held on H.B.

1060 March 12-15. Berry said that H.B. 1060 needs amending in four areas to conform to provisions of H.B. 759:

- (1) Language ensuring that taxes are not raised by the Act.
- (2) A capitalization rate of 15% (the higher the rate, the lower the tax value of the land).
- (3) Administration by the State Comptroller rather than the School Tax Assessment Practices Board.
- (4) Language clarifying definition of "net to land" to ensure that cash lease or share lease terms would be the first priority rather than owner-operator budget.

The income capitalization method is a mathematical formula whereby value is based on a set percent return applied to the annual net income from the land. Only return from agricultural use

of the land is considered, subtracting any expense for labor, including the owner's labor. The capitalized value of the farm is found by applying an appropriate percent of return to this net income. The capitalization rate is selected to represent a fair return, considering the risk involved.

Since farming and ranching is an extremely risky business, Farm Bureau believes that a high capitalization rate is appropriate, the local Farm Bureau leader said. This is the reason Farm Bureau is backing the 15 percent capitalization rate, he said.
