Not Exclusively For The Athlete— The Eagles Off-Season Program Explained

The off-season program at Goldthwaite High School is for the benefit of each and every boy in Junior High and High School physical education. The program has four phases: (1) Track, (2) Tennis, (3) Weight Lifting, and (4) Agility. On Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, all athletes participate in the weight lifting program from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. When 3:30

arrives, the athletes go to their respective activities. On Tuesday and Thursday, at 2:30 p.m., all athletes participate in their respective activity. The physical education athletes continue with conditioning and various other activities.

The high school weight program is broken down into three stations: (1) Free weights, (2) Universal gym weights and (3) Agility station. Each coach takes one station and execute the drills

Health Clinic At Sr. Center March 28

A Public Health Clinic for immunization against polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus will be held on Wednesday, March 28, 1979 at the Senior Citizens Center, Old Priddy Rd. & Hwy 84, between 10:30 a.m. and 12:00 noon.

At present, children entering school in Texas must be immunized against the above listed diseases. In September of 1979, mumps immuniza-

tion will also be required for all children through age seven.

As of September 1, 1978, all children between the ages of 18 months and 12 years were required to be immunized against measles. After this year, the maximum age requiring immunization will be raised. Parental histories of measles will be acceptable until Sept. 1, 1979, and after that must be verified by a physician's statement.

Childhood diseases are an ever present danger to the health of our children even though they are not as prevalent as they were in the past. Parents concerned about immunization records need to keep a few things in mind. You need to have an up-to-date immunization record when your child enters school. It should be validated by a licensed physician or public health clinic.

There were approximately 1,287,400 nursing home residents in 18,300 facilities last year, according to National Center for Health Statistics.

The median age of residents was 80. Seventy-one percent were female. Fifty-eight percent were widowed.

Ninety-two percent of the residents in nursing homes were white.

Hillview Highlights

Hillview Manor has obtained approval of an Orientation and Training program for its staff of employees from the Texas Department of Health.

Fern Rajnoch, Administrator of the 60-bed long-term care facility, announced today that a Training Coordinator has been designated and that orientation, job specific training and on going in-service training of personnel starts on March 22, 1979. "Each employee who has any contact with residents of the facility is enrolled in the training classes. This includes nurses aides, dietary personnel, social service staff, maintenance and laundry employees," she said.

The designated coordinator for training the staff is Glenda Arnold of Marble Falls, who holds the required degree or license and experience to qualify as instructor. A total of 30 personnel of the various day and night shifts at the facility are receiving the training.

"Knowing that our staff is specially trained for their duties gives them more prestige with residents and their families; and, we will all feel more competent in our jobs," said Fern Rajnoch, Administrator. "Our goal is to serve the individual resident's psychological, physiological, and social needs to the best of our ability."

The required hours of training in the basic program varies according to the staff

position held. Nurse aides, for example, must develop the required competencies by successfully completing five hours of orientation and 35 hours of job specific training. All aides are then required to receive a minimum of 3 hours of continuing education each three months thereafter. Records of each employee's training hours are kept by the facility.

Approval of the program by the Texas Department of Health verifies its compliance with requirements of Senate Bill 9 passed in 1977.

The Texas House passed on March 15. The bill as passed by the Senate for consideration.

Most intangible property (stocks, bonds, etc.) is exempted from property taxation.

All household goods (personal effects (if not producing) are exempted from property taxation.

Two automobiles per person are exempted.

The residence homestead exemption is defined for the homestead exemption granted in the Tax Relief Amendment.

An additional \$10,000 market value of homestead for persons over 65, or aged persons, is also exempted. The tax value for homesteads can never be less than the value under this article.

The homeowner must apply for this exemption initially and that application remains in effect until cancelled.

6. School districts will be reimbursed for the taxes on the difference between the 1978 value of agricultural land and the current agricultural use value. School districts will also be reimbursed for the \$5,000 and \$10,000 homestead exemption.

7. The "Economic Growth" of Texas is defined for implementing the Tax Relief Amendment provisions limiting state spending increases to the same percentage increase as the economic growth of the state as a whole.

8. This reduction of the tax values does not apply to the 10% school bond debt limit for any bonds voted prior to March 1, 1979.

9. This act will be effective for the 1979 tax year. Agricultural use valuation applications must be filed within 45 days after the date the act is signed by the Governor.

CTMC Receives \$25,000 Grant For New Programs

Employment and Training Administration of the Department of Labor has awarded a \$25,000 grant to the Central Texas Manpower Consortium. The grant will be used to develop and establish a Private Sector Initiative Program (PSIP) and a Private Industry Council (PIC). CTMC is federally funded by the Department of Labor and consists of seven counties in the Central Texas Region. The counties include: Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba.

The \$25,000 planning grant is to be used to pay for staff salaries, supplies, materials, and other administrative expenses involved in establishing a Private Industry Council, and in planning local private sector training programs.

The main objective of Title I is to demonstrate what techniques would be effective in increasing the employment of the business community, including small business and industry in the employment and training activities for unemployed persons.

The \$25,000 planning grant is to be used to pay for staff salaries, supplies, materials, and other administrative expenses involved in establishing a Private Industry Council, and in planning local private sector training programs.



Cleaning Indoor Plants— Indoor plants do not have the advantage of the cleansing effect of rainfall to keep their leaf surfaces free from dust. To keep them looking their best a careful cleaning once or twice a month is helpful. For smooth leaved plants a wet sponge or soft cloth rinsed frequently in clean water is a dependable method. For specimens having many small leaves, it may be best to take the plant outdoors and syringe with plenty of water.

Plants with hairy leaves require special attention. A camel hair brush used carefully to avoid bruising the leaves works well. If commercial leaf polishes are used, be sure to water the plant thoroughly several hours before application. Oils should be avoided but a mild soap and water solution may be used for extremely soiled leaves. Since cold water can cause leaf blights, be sure that the water you use for cleaning is near room temperature.

Winter months are generally difficult for indoor plants. Many good gardeners like to send the plants outdoors for several months as soon as warm temperatures are here to stay. A shady location is best since most houseplants grow naturally in the shade of other plants and are damaged by strong, direct, sunlight.

CANNER TESTING SET--

The Mills County Extension Homemakers have scheduled a Pressure Canner Testing for Wednesday, March 28, from 9 - 12, in the County Agents office in the basement of the Courthouse. Canners should be tested each year for pressure accuracy. If all home processed foods are not pressurized at the correct temperature

and time, the chances of food poisoning is extremely high. Those wanting their canners tested can bring their equipment and leave it or wait for the results. Owner's names should be attached to canner lids.

Charge for the testing will be \$1.00 for each canner.

Soil insects can damage home vegetable gardens unless control measures are taken at least two weeks before planting vegetables.

Soil insect pests such as the white grub, wireworm, cutworm, mole cricket, seed corn maggot and cabbage maggot can economically reduce vegetable stands and yields by feeding on seeds, roots, stems and leaves.

The white grub is of particular concern. It is widely distributed and is one of the most destructive underground insect pests in the garden. White grubs are immature May beetles or June bugs and can be recognized by their curved or "C"-shaped white to dirty white body. They are 1/2 - 1 inch long and have a brown head. The abdomen, or rear end, appears darker because soil particles inside show through the body wall. They may live up to three years in the soil before emerging as an adult.

White grubs feed and destroy roots and underground parts of potato, corn, bean, pea, strawberry and many other vegetable plants. Most severe damage occurs on newly established garden sites that were in sod the previous year.

We suggest sampling the soil to determine before planting if treatment for white grubs is necessary. Check soil at six to nine

1-square foot areas over the garden plots to a depth of 5-6 inches. Thoroughly sift the soil and count the white grubs. An average of one white grub per three locations warrants use of a soil insecticide.

White grubs and most other soil insects can be controlled in the home garden with diazinon (25% liquid concentration) or Spectracide 6000. Dusts are not recommended as a soil insecticide.

To be effective, insecticide must be applied to plowed ground and worked thoroughly into the top 4 to 6 inches of soil. Two weeks should be allowed before planting so that the insecticide can equally distribute throughout the soil and thus kill most of the insects.

Re: Petroleum Reserves of the Continental U.S.

Why higher gasoline prices? Why gasoline rationing in a land of plenty of gasoline where the oil companies are already making a real good profit?

There is no need for our gasoline prices to increase if we alter our laws and regulations in regards to drilling for oil and gas. It is not necessary for us to depend upon the OPEC nations for the 40% or more of the oil or gas that we are consuming - according to information that is available.

The nation's largest eight petroleum pumpers have more than quadrupled their

sales since 1970. In 1978 they averaged making four times as much profit as they made in the year 1970. Does that sound like they need a price increase?

There is enough known gas and oil reserves in the continental United States to last us more than 150 years if used at the present rate of consumption, around 7 billion barrels per year, such as: 1. On Nov. 22, 1971 the U.S. News and World Report stated that "We are literally surrounded by oil", and further stated that "Our total offshore reserves amount to approximately 780 billion barrels." 2. The Interior Department of the U. S. estimates that our "easily" recoverable shale oil is in excess of 600 billion barrels. 3. The estimated reserves in Alaska are listed as 20 billion barrels.

Mr. Citizen: If you do not wish for the following to happen, it is NOW time for you to be heard from.

1. The price of gasoline to go to \$1 per gallon by January 1, 1980 and to \$2 per gallon by Jan. 1, 1981

2. A very limited amount to be allotted to you for your consumption or use without paying blackmarket prices.

U.S. Census Bureau Has Temporary Jobs

The U. S. Census Bureau has a number of temporary jobs open during the next few weeks in Mills County to help prepare address lists for use during the 1980 census. Temporary census workers usually will work three to four weeks each and will be paid on a per-address collected basis. For an 8-hour

day, the average worker will earn \$27 to \$30 per day plus 17¢ per-mile for any driving done in a private vehicle. Applicants for the jobs must be 18 years old, or over, a U.S. citizen, and pass a written test. The work involved driving or walking to compile lists of addresses of each dwelling

unit in designated areas of the county. These address lists will play a vital role in taking the 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaires to be sent to each household in America on March 28, 1980. Then, a few weeks following the April 1 Census Day, census officials will use the address lists to determine which households have not returned their completed questionnaires. Census takers must then be sent to each non-responding household to collect the information required on the census form.

The 1979 address collection activity in the county is part of a Census Bureau program involving 35,000 temporary workers nationwide to compile lists containing approximately 30 million addresses. Another 50 million addresses have been purchased from commercial mailing list companies.

Tex-Pack Express - A Unique Grass Roots Institution In Texas

The familiar sight to Texans of Tex-Pack express trucks bustling along the state's streets and highways constitutes one of the unique grass roots institutions of the state.

Unlike a monolithic giant corporation, it is a cooperative network of independent, locally-owned businesses who collectively provide express service to more than 1200 large and small communities across the state.

Each individual Tex-Pack company owns and operates its own trucks and terminal facilities for its own routes, pays taxes and employs substantial payrolls, and purchases goods and services at the local level.

The backbone of the Tex-Pack system is a small army of local agents in countless communities who provide the home town link to any spot in the state. These independent agents, which are typical of Main Street, U.S.A. are usually well-known local citizens, many prominent in community leadership, who provide a personal tie with the customer.

Alfred Negley of San Antonio, head of one of the state's largest Tex-Pack operations, says that home town agents help preserve

the kind of individual attention often found in the small town doctor or postmaster, a human quality that is growing more scarce.

"The typical Tex-Pack agent knows everybody in town," Negley says. "He has a personal concern about the shipping problems of his own neighbors and stays on top of their needs. You don't get that kind of service out of a big corporation."

Tex-Pack offers same day package pickup in most communities and overnight delivery to destinations within 600 miles. Small packages may be handled for as little as \$1.60 complete. Shipments are accepted up to 100 pounds in weight.

Exclusive features include waybills to both shipper and consignee on all shipments; cost-free handling of change of address; WATS tracing, also without cost; dislocated shipments; collect calls to arrange pickups in remote areas. Tex-Pack carriers operate current application for the Texas Railroad Commission by United Parcel Service for authority to duplicate Tex-Pack's service. Spokesmen contend that such authorization would damage current shipping their local agents and result in deteriorating current service to hundreds of Texas communities.
