Officials from Lone Star watching, the sound would Gas Company met with the Goldthwaite City Council for the second time in two months trying to get an increase started for users in broadcast.

City Council Stalls

Gas Rate Increase

Okays Cable TV Hike -

Goldthwaite, and they will have to come back again. The gas company is asking for an increase in overall income by 14%. citing last year as a test year to determine the rate increase. Lone Star is seeking a return to investor of 9.2%. The accountants

for the firm say that currently only a 2.4% return is being realized from the system in Goldthwaite.

THE PRIMARY means for the increase in operating revenue is a proposed customer service charge. The charge, if levied, would mean that every residential customer in the city would be assessed a \$3.00 per month charge for gas

service. Commercial units would pay \$6.00 per month. This charge would be assessed, regardless of any gas used and would be paid every month. At the present time, when no gas is used, a "no bill" is issued.



It was all very simple. The Hico Tigers made the most of their opportunities and the Goldthwaite Eagles didn't. The result was a 13 - 8 victory for the Tigers in last Friday's season opener for both teams.

The Eagles clearly dominated the game. both offensively and defensively, except for 3-minute span in second half.

But that was all the time Hico all-state tailback Daniel Parks needed. Parks, who quarters by the Eagles, finally broke loose on a 38-yard jaunt on the third quarter's final play.







To Galveston -**Retired Teachers Enjoy Bus Trip**

A group of people enjoyed a bus tour from Goldthwaite to Galveston to history, sponsored by the local Retired Teachers Association. Credit must be given to Reba and Orville Hale and their co-workers who made all arrangements through the First Travel Service in Brownwood.

Departure was at 8:00 a.m. in a new Arrow Coach. The miles and hours passed swiftly as downtown Austin and Houston were bypassed. Arrival in Galveston was by mid-afternoon. They were lodged in the Flagship Hotel on Seawall Boulevard," built out over the shoreline waters of Galveston Ray, At 6 p.m. all were back on the bus headed south on Seawall Blvd. for a 13 mile ride enroute to the Mary Moody Northern Amphitheater in Galveston Island State Park.

The amphitheater was a dream come true for Mrs. Northern. For many years she had nurtured the idea of an amphitheater for historic Galveston as a place for producing historical dramas. Now in its third year of operation "The Lone Star" was the first of a series of historical dramas to be produced in the amphitheater. It was written by Pulitzer Prize winner Paul Green. He is the author of "The Stephen Foster Story". "Texas". "The Lost Colony" and others.

a Chuck Wagon supper wis served on the grounds. The fast moving drama, "The attend a pageant of Texas Lone Star", presented events in the annals of history, from the colonizing of Texas through its struggle for independence. The play began with the founding of Stephen F. Austin's first colony and events leading up to the war with Mexico. The Fall of the Alamo and the Massacre of Goliad were the battle cry of Col. Sam Houston's army in their surprise attack on Santa Anna's army at San Jacinto. Amid gun and cannon fire and charging cavalry the Mexican army was defeated and Santa, Anna captured. Texas was then granted its independence to emerge as a new republic. All was not hardships and war. There was comedy, dancing, singing.

love affairs as well as heartaches all entwined throughout the drama. As a grand finale to celebrate Texas' Independence there was singing, dancing and a fireworks display. The audience joined in singing "Texas. Our Texas" as they applauded the cast.

There were 100 people working in the production of this drama. They were actors, dancers, singers, musicians and technicians. Their ages ranged from 55 years to a 6 year old girl. This child had been with the show since the premiere Prior to the performance, season, was interested in

speaking, singing or dancing roles but were in the play each night. They were a mare and five geldings. three Apaloosa, a Morgan and two Quarter horses. They were ridden by officers of both the Texas and Mexican army. They had to rehearse like the rest of the cast to be familiar with the surroundings and become accustomed to the flash and booming of gun fire and cannons. The morning after the

performance, the group took the Treasure Isle Train for a 17-mile tour over the old parts and new Galveston. The lecturer/guide gave interesting facts about the growth of the city, the Oleander legend, naming Moody, Sealey, Rosenberg and Gresham families as early businessmen and builders, and the work that had gone on through the years to protect the city

from hurricanes. Historical homes were everywhere, most with Texas Historical Markers. To name a few pretentious homes: The Moody Home (now the residence of Mrs. Northern), the Bishop's Palace. Ashton Villa and Sweeny-Royston House. St. Mary's Cathedral was the oldest church in the city. built in 1847. The First National Bank building, now being restored was the home of the first National Bank in Texas, chartered in

1865. The ride continued by the vacht basin, cotton warehouses, the UT Medical complex, and dozens of other interesting places. Back on the bus the

Mary R. Fletcher, assistant professor of Education and Psychology at Tarleton, retired at the end of the summer session at TSU.



One of the greatest pests on today's producer is weed infestation. Perhaps a weed should be defined as any plant growing anywhere it is not desired

The majority of weeds can be categorized into two main headings, annuals and perennials. Annuals are those plants germinating and living one year, while perennials are weeds which live more than two years and may live almost indefinitely. A third category includes the biennials. which is a plant living more than one year but not over two years.

Weed control is and has

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always been a very important production practice. Weed competition reduces production through area. sunlight and moisture compcontrol practices without etition. 

When all was dark and quite except for the falling rain, they emerged and started toward the river. some four miles away. Their shoes soon became heavy and cumbersome with mud. and they determined to pull them off and leave them behind. They lost their way, and soon bitterly regretted their barefoot condition.

All night they stumbled blindly through the chaparral, and must at times have passed back near the Mexican army. Gray dawn found them still

short of their destination, but with the light they were able to find their way. They limped into the Texan camp just ahead of the Mexicans, who would have found the 42 men there easy prey except for the warning. All but two escaped. St. Clair dropped from the pages of history but Whitfield Chalk joined Sul Ross' Rangers and received his commission from Sam Houston. He afterwards became the first sheriff of Williamson County, and later opened, with his brother, the first mill in Bell County.

The Texans who surrendered at Mier were marched into the interior of Mexico. Eighteen were executed by firing squad following an abortive escape. The remainder were thrown into prison at Perote Castle, where many of them died. The last of them were released late in 1844. Historian C.L. Yarbrough

AUSTIN--Don't be caught out in the cold this winter with an antifreeze product liberals are now in the unsuited to your needs. advises Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "If the price of a particular

brand of antifreeze seems too good to be true, it would be wise to find out if it meets certain minimum standards of freeze and corrosion protection." Brown said. "This is especially important if you are not familiar with the brand in question." By law, all antifreeze

offered for sale in Texas must meet rigid performance standards and be registered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). Brown noted that consumers may check to see if a particular brand of antifreeze is registered by calling the nearest TDA district office or the Weights and Measures Section in Austin at (512) 475-6577. He pointed out, however, that the Department will not give specific details about a product and will not endorse any brand. Before certifying any antifreeze for sale in the state.
