





John H. Robinson: When one un dertakes poultry keeping the chances are against his success. But, unfortunately, nearly every beginner thinks himself or herself the talented and favored or exceptionally industrious person who is sure to succeel, and therefore neglects to take the necessary precautions to avoid failures With rare exceptions those engaging in poultry keeping on any consider able scale begin without any adequate practical knowledge of the conditions, requirements and methods of the business. If they happen to have abundant capital to carry on the busifiess until they have learned in the costly school of experience what they ought to have known before investing a dollar, they must finally make a success of it, but the greater part of the original investment and also of the expenses for several years may have to e charged off to cost of acquiring experience. The most serious cases are those of people with limited means who go into poultry keeping, expecting it to give them their living almost from the start. As far as my observation goes the greater number of persons who once become deeply inture into it will take bad advice in preference to good every time. I suppose this is because the bad advice is more in line with their hopes and wishes. The daily care of poultry is neither as easy as some think it, nor as hard as others make it. It is easy when you know how, and it is neither a long nor a difficult task to know how. There is a great difference between doing work well and doing it profitably. Permanent success in any line of work depends, as a rule, upon doing it both well and profitably.

# How I Get Winter Eggs.

From Farmers' Review: Our experience in getting winter eggs has only been with Buffs and Barred Rocks. The first thing is to have pure-bred stock, as no definite result can he expected from miscellaneous crosses. For Barred Rocks the chicks should be hatched the last two weeks of March, or the first half of April, but the Buff Rocks may be hatched as late as the middle of May. Then care should be, taken to keep them growing from the time they leave the shell. Above all, keep them free from lice When the time arrives for placing the stock in winterquarters, cull out all the drones, and those inclined to take on fat too readily, for a lazy hen like a lazy poultryman is not a success. Do not crowd the stock. Fifteen to twenty hens are enough in one pen. See that the house is warm. Keep the floor covered about six inches deep with straw or some other litter. This should be renewed about once a week or often enough to keep



Combined Feed for Pig

At the Kentucky station a c ison was made of various fee ads for pigs. Corn was fed alone and also ombined with other feeds, these ing soy bean silage, soy beans and dried distillery grains. Drawing conclusions from the experiment Prof. D. W. May says: The results of these experiments, like those of several previously made, indicate that in eeding pigs, corn should be combined with other feeds to get the best returns. Experiments indicate that silage can not be profitably substiroted for a part of the grain ration with pigs. In this experiment it w.3 fed in addition with some profit, giving quicker gains and keeping the animals in better condition. Soy beans made an excellent pig feed mixed with corn in the proportion of one to two. Being rich in protein, it is recommended as an especially efficient addition to the ration when corn composes the larger part. Dried distillery grains proved to be a poor pig feed, except in small proportions. When fed as one-third or one-half of the ration with corn it was unprofita-When it composed one-fifth of ble. the ration very good returns were obtained. Cottonseed meal may be profitably used to finish hogs for market. In such cases it may be safely fed in quantities of one-half pound per pig daily and then omitted during periods of alternate weeks.

Feeding in Open Sheds or Barns. The results of the tests on feeding in barns and open sheds at the Missouri station came as a surprise to those that have so long declared that beef steers should be fed in warm barns. The station entered into an extensive correspondence with feeders throughout the state asking their opinion in the matter. Only 18 per cent favored feeding in barns; 59 per cent practicing feeding in open sheds, and 23 per cent in open lots. Four tests were made, the steers each time being fed similar rations of corn and hay. In the first tost the average daily gain of steers fed in barns was 1.47; of those fed in sheds 1.72. In the second trial the gains were for those fed in barns 1.85 and for those fed in open sheds 2.3, while similar gains made by steers fed in an open lot were 2.29 pounds per day. In the third test steers fed in harns gained on an average 1.67 per head daily; those fed in the open sheds 1.69, and those fed in the open lots 1.78. In the fourth test the cattle fed in barns gained 1.83 per day; those fed in open sheds gained 1.97, and those fed in the open lots gained 2.09. This showed that barn feeding, at least in the latitude of Columbia, was not a profitable operation.

# Ignorant Poultry Raisers Fail.

John H. Robinson: When one un dertakes poultry keeping the chances are against his success. But, unfortunately, nearly every beginner thinks himself or herself the talented and favored or exceptionally industrious person who is sure to succeel, and therefore neglects to take the necessary precautions to avoid failures. with rare exceptions those engaging in poultry keeping on any considerable scale begin without any adequate practical knew'edge of the conditions. requirements and rethods of the business. If they happen to have abundant capital to carry on the dusiness until they have learned in the costly school of experience what they ought to have known before investing a dollar, they must finally make a success of it, but the greater part of the original investment and also of the expenses for several years may have to be charged off to cost of acquiring experience. The most serious cases are those of people with limited means who go into poultry keeping, expecting it to give them their living almost from the start. # How I Get Winter Eggs.

From Farmers' Review: Our experience in getting winter eggs has only been with Buffs and Barred The first thing is to have Rocks. pure-bred stock, as no definite result can be expected from miscellaneous crosses. For Barred Rocks the chicks should be hatched the last two weeks ribly burned about the body walked of March, or the first half of April, but the Buff Rocks may be hatched as late as the middle of May. Then care should be, taken to keep them growing from the time they leave the shell. Above all, keep them free from lice. Combined Feed for Pigs

At the Kentucky station a comparson was made of various feeds for pigs. Corn was fed alone and also combined with other feeds, these being soy bean since, soy beans and deled distatlery ars ar Brawing conclusions from the experiment Prof. D. W. May says: The results of these experiments, like those of several previously made, indicate that in feeding pigs, corn should be combined with other feeds to get the best returps. Experiments indicate that silage can not be profitably substituted for a past of the grain ration with pigs. In this experiment it wis fed in addition with some profit, giving quicker gains and keeping the animals in better condition. Soy beans made an excellent pig feed mixed with corn in the proportion of one to two. Being rich in protein, it is recommended as an especially efficient addition to the ration when

corn composes the larger part. Dried distillery grains proved to be a poor pig feed, except in small proportions. When fed as one-third or one-half of the ration with corn it was unprofitable. When it composed one-fifth of the ration very good returns were obtained. Cottonseed meal may be profitably used to finish bogs for market. In such cases it may safely fed in quantities of one-half pound per pig daily and then omitted

during periods of alternate weeks. Feeding in Open Sheds or Barns. The results of the tests on feeding in barns and open sheds at the Missouri station came as a surprise to those that have so long declared that beef steers should be fed in warm barns. The station entered into an extensive correspondence with feeders throughout the state asking their opinion in the matter. Only 18 per cent favored feeding in barns; 59 per cent practicing feeding in open sheds, and 23 per cent in open lots. Four tests were made, the steers each time being fed similar rations of corn and hay. In the first test the average daily gain of steers fed in barns was 1.47; of those fed in sheds 1.72. In the second trial the gains were for those fed in barns 1.85 and for those fed in open sheds 2.3, while similar gains made by steers fed in an open lot were 2.29 pounds per day. In the third test steers fed in barns gained on an average 1.67 per head daily; those fed in the open sheds 1.69, and those fed in the open lots 1.78. In the fourth test the cattle fed in barns gained 1.83 per day; those fed in open sheds gained 1.97, and those fed

Feeding Young and Old Hens. On the ordinary farm it is not convenient to separate the hens into two flocks of old and young, and the farmer will find it necessary to feed some "general purpose' ration. This clover hay. should consist of not too large a

quantity of carbo-hydrates, combined with a considerable quantity of protein. But the farmer that keeps several hundred hens can well afford to separate his flock into two yards of old and young. The young and growing birds can use a great deal of corn without becoming fat. Being active they also burn up in their lungs more fat than will older birds. There is little danger of getting them too fat the first winter, especially if they have an opportunity to exercise by scratching. The old hens must be fed more carefully, and care be taken to restrict their ration of corn. We have seen many a flock of hens rendered upprofitable in winter by - too heavy feeding of corn. It m be understood that the feeding & any ration excessively rich in carbohy drates would have the same result but there are few rations on the farm so rich in carboydrates as corn and there is little likelihood that these rations would be fed. For both old castration .-- W. B. Anderson and young hens a feed of soft food daily in winter is very good; it will

keep their digestive organs in good condition and lessen the losses from indigestion in the spring.

The Egg and Poultry Trade of 1902.

Since April when storage eggs sold as low as 14% cents per dozen, prices have been good and well sustained Sixteen cents was freely paid in May and the early part of Juns. Then there was a drop of half a cent, but later a revival and steady advance until now, at the close of the year, fresh eggs are bringing 26 cents and storage eggs 191/2 cents. Fewer eggs have been placed in cold storage than in 1901.

The feature of the poultry season has been the scarcity of fowls and high prices realized, in some cases almost double those of 1901. A cold wet summer interfered with the rearing of young turkeys and not more than 60 per cent of the usual crop was grown. At the close of the year dressed turkeys at wholesals were bringing 17% to 18 cents, against 9 to 10 cents in 1901, and dressed cl eng 10 to 11 cents, against 7% cent one year ago. The boliday t
