Rock Island Conferring With Mexican Central For Merger.

St. Louis, May 11 .- It is stated that A. A. Robinson, president of the Mexican Central, is now in New York in conference with officials of the Rock Island upon the terms of sale.

The acquirement of the Mexican Central would place the Rock Island in the position of a formidable competitor for Stillwell's Orient line, as well as prove by developments an excellent feeder to the system.

The lines connect at El Paso and extend from this point to the capital of Mexico, while several feeder lines tap important territory.

The Mexican Central already reaches within a few miles of the Pacific coast and there is little to be done in case the deal goes through for the Rock Island to get a Pacific outlet.

Branch lines have been started. One extension is projected from Jiminez, and if completed would place the Rock Island into close competitive contact with the Stillwell line.

It is pointed out that by the acquisition of the Mexican Central the Rock Island would not only get a direct

Sugar By-Products as Horse Feed. The beet chips, diffusion residue, and other by-products obtained in the manufacture of beet sugar, consist of the sugar beet from which a considerable portion of the carbohydrates has been removed, says a bulletin of the Department of Agriculture. The total amount of nutritive material present, however, is fairly large. These products, properly speaking, are also coarse fodders. Molasses, which consists almost entirely of carbohydrates (sugars), was used as early as 1830 as a feed for horses, and has recently attracted considerable attention in this connection. As high as 30 pounds of molasses was fed per head daily at different times, but the ration finally adopted consisted of 15 pounds of molasses, 3 pounds of bran, and 4 pounds of maize. In addition green sugar cane tops were fed. The health of the horses remained excellent. Molasses did not cause diarrhea, but rather constipation, which was counteracted by feeding bran. Feeding molasses effected a saving of over \$45 per head per annum. From the Farmers' Review: I have had very little experience with cows standing on cement floors and have not seen any case of rheumatism resulting from it. I am of the opinion, however, that cement floors without plenty of bedding, might cause rheumatism. Development of Young Pigs. Much of our success in hog raising, both as to economy of production and quality of product, depends on how we care for the young pigs after weaning. says Prof. W. J. Fraser. The old saying that "feed is haif the breed" is true, if we include the methods of feeding. Feeding largely on food that tends to produce fat, without sufficient exercise being given, will often change a little Yorkshire into a thick, fat type, or may cause such a derangement of the digestive organs as to founder the young pigs. This is a most serious condition, and will render them profitless. Indigestion may show itself by the pigs failing in flesh, loss of appetite, roughness of hair, scaliness of skin, teeth becoming black, etc. The last condition is often thought to be the cause, rather than the effect. is, together with the others, but an evidence of injudicious feeding. In case some young pigs become so fat that they die from what is known as "thumps," in all cases proper food and exercise will prevent, and, in a measure, remedy them. "Prevention is better than cure."







#### BOUNDARY OF TEXAS.

Austin, Texas, May 11 .- The general Land Office has recommended to the Governor that State Surveyor Twitchell be instructed to join the United States surveying party headed by Kidder, at the extreme northeast corner of the State, and continue with them as they "run" the line of the northern boundary of Texas.

Kidder and the Government surveyors are just finishing the work of locating the 100th meridian, the eastern Panhandle boundary, and will now fix the northern boundary and then take up the much disputed 103d meridian, which forms the Texas-New Mexico boundary, and locate it. State Surveyor Twitchell has been instructed to be present and participate in running the 103d meridian, and it is now thought advisable to have him on the northern boundary as well.

#### JESSIE MORRISON RETURNED TO PRISON.

Topeka, Kansas, May 9.-In an opinjon handed down today the Kansas supreme court upheld the decision of the Butler County district court in the Jessie Morrison murder case and ordered that the defendant be returned to Lansing to serve the term of twenty five years in the penitentiary to which she was last sentenced. This opinion puts an end to all possiblity of a new trial, as it was with great difficulty that the relatives of the defendant raised the necessary money to appeal the case to the supreme court this time.
