Payment of an indigent funeral expense in the amount of \$300 was also approved, to Blackwell-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.


Request for right-of-way easement from Five Area Telephone Cooperative of Muleshoe was approved.








He has taught Bible at both Amarillo College and Wayland Baptist College. He married Valoise Peek in 1956, and they are parents of three children: Kevin, Keith, and




