Referendum Is Slated May 10

The nationwide "Beef Referendum" vote will be held May 10 according to Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent. The vote will be conducted in the County Extension office (second floor of the county courthouse) from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on May 10. Voters may also request an Coordinators office. Here are a few important facts about the "Beef Referendum":

Voter eligibility--Voting is open Bovina Fire Department, is sponsored by the fire to any producer who owned or acquired ownership of any cattle during the period of October 1, 1986 through March 31, 1988, or any importer of cattle, beef, or beef products who imported during that same time period. There is no age requirement for voter eligibility. Producers must vote in the county in which they reside.

Absentee voting--Requests for absentee ballots may be picked up in the County Extension Office. Absentee ballots will be delivered from now until April 29, 1988. All requests received after that time will be returned. Persons late in requesting absentee ballots may still vote in person on May 10.




