Section 3. The governor is hereby authorized to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this proposed amendment to the electors of the State, as hereinbefore indicated, and to further direct said election in its details, as is usual and customary in such cases.

Section 4. That the sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the necessary cost and expenses 2 in which Miss Bush sues Mr. of the proceedings hereunder to be had and done.

#### **Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution.** Relating to Incorporation of State Banks.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and dis-counting privileges, prescribing the liability of stockholders in the same; providing for the regulation of such corporate bodies, and prohibiting for-ign corporations with such powers from doing business in this State; and providing for the submission of such proposed Constitutional Amendment as required by law. required by law.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Schtion 16, of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby so amended that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

Section 16. The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incoeporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting privileges, and shall provide for a system of State supervision, regulation and control of the questions involved and the sensuch bodies which will adquately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof.

Each shareholder of such corporate body incorporated in this State, so long as he owns shares therein, and for twelve months after the date of any bona fide transfer thereof shall be personally liable for all debts of such corporate body existing at the date of such transfer, to an amount additional to the par value of such shares so owned or transferred, equal Mr. Smith met Miss Bush while the to the par value of such shares so owned or transferred.

No such corporate body shall be chartered until all of the authorized capital stock has been subscribed and paid for in full, in cash. Such body corporate shall not be authorized to engage in business at more than one place, which shall be designated in its charter.

No foreign corporation, other than the National banks of the United States, shall be permitted to exercise banking or discounting privileges in this State.

Section 2. The Governor is hereby required and directed to make the proclamation and give the notices required by law for the submission of the foregoing resolution to the people of the State of Texas as an amend-ment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, at the next general election; at which election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on the ballots the words. "For the Amendment to Section 16, or printed on the hallots the words. **GREAT STRIKE OF MEAT CUTTERS BEEF FAMINE THREATENS THE PEOPLE** 

Chicago, July 14 .-- As a result of a stubborn disagreement, chiefly over wages for unskilled labor, one of the most extensive strikes in the history of the meat packing industry of the United States began today in Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph and other cities where large packing plants are located. If prolonged the strike is expected to cause widespread inconvenience, possibly equaling the anthracite coal famine of two years ago.

The unamity of the strike was complete. More than 45,000 employes are directly involved. In Chicago alone 18,000 men are on strike.

The effect of the strike on the food supply of the country and the price of meat is being earnestly discussed, notwithstanding announcement that the packing houses, contrary to somewhat general expectation, will continue operations without any close down, employing whatever help may be obtainable. How much alleviation in the furrishing of supplies to the public this course may afford is a matter of wide variation of opinion. The packers declare that hundreds of men who could not be provided with places have been applying daily for work.

Kansas City .- Eight thousand meat cutters, butchers and others affiliated with the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers Workmen's union, constituting the entire force in those departments in the six big packing plants here struck today. As a result all the plants are shut down and 12,800 employes in the various departments are affected. Those out or affected by the strike in the meat cutters and butchers are distributed as follows: Cudahy, 2,500; Armour, 3,5000; Swift, 2,800; Schwartzchild and Sulzberger, 2,000; Fowler, 1,200; Ruddy Bros., 800.

Omaha .- Four thousand employes of the four packing houses at South Omaha laid down their tools and went out on a strike. The packing plants affected are those of Armour, Swift, Cudahy, and the Omaha Packing company.

Fort Worth, Texas .- Between four and five hundred men, including butchers, meat cutters and cellar men, employed in the packing plants of Armour and Swift struck.

New York .-- As soon as the butchers in this city learned that strikes had been ordered in the meat packing plants in many of the large cities, they at once began to advance the price of meats from two cents to three cents a pound.

St. Louis .- It is stated that in the neighborhood of 4,500 men' employed in packing houses in St. Louis and East St. Louis are out as the result of the order received from Mr. Donnelly of Chicago, president of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers of America. Of this number only between 700 and 800 were employed in St. Louis, as most of the great packing houses are in East St. Louis in the vicinity of the national stock yards there.

St. Paul.-The strike will mean a suspension of all the live stock business in the northwest. This situation, if continued, it is said, will reduce the supply of meat in this city to the vanishing point, and run prices up to the very top figures.

Sioux City .- At an enthusiastic, orderly mass meeting at which 1,000 workmen were present, the striking butchers and laborers of the Cudahy Packing plant determined on an orderly course of procedure in the strike. They decided to offer no resistance to the employment of non-union men at the packing plant.

Omaha .- A dispatch from Nebraska City states that the employes, sev eral hundred in number, of the Morton Gregson Packing company, in that city, went on a strike. The plant is idle as a consequence. The strike there is said to have resulted from the employment by the company of a nonunion watchman.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Article 3, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the pensions of ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors.

SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Lagislature of the State of Texas: That Article 3, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51.
