And The Japanese Have Delayed Attack on Mukden.

FRESH TROOPS ARE ARRIVING.

Meanwhile General Kuroki is Trying to Seize and Cross the Hun River Far East of Mukden-Thence he Will Move Down the River.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 28.-The cause of the extreme deliberation of the Japanese advance on Mukdken was explained by a dispatch from General Kuropatkin, which indicates that Field Marshal Oyama has not yet concentrated his forces. Fresh troops are constantly arriving at Bentsiaputze while others which recently reached Liao Yang are marching up the Taitse river to Sianchan.

These reinforcements presumably come from Japan. As soon as the fourth Japanese army at Sianchan is sufficiently strong, it is now evident the Japanese intend to resort to their favorite flanking tactics, move a for midable array against Kuroptkin's left, and compel the evacuation of Aintsintin. They are evidently reconnoitering the ground over which the Sianchan army will march up and

cross the river. Meanwhile General Kuropatkin is trying to seize and cross the Hun river far east of Mukden. Thence he will move down the river and co-operate with the Fourth army from Sian chan, while Generals Oku and Nodzu engage Kuropatkin's attention south of Mukden. The attacks on Da pass and San Lungka September 20 were the first symptoms of this vast flanking movement.

Kuropatkin now reports that Japanese scouts have been encountered near the Hun river, half way to Mukden, trying to seize Kaoutou pass, ten miles northeast of Bentsiaputze, in order to clear the way to Fushun, and that Oku's and Nodzu's outposts have been engaged in skirmishes with Cossacks near Inpu, between Bentsiaputze and the railroad.

After reviewing the troops at Odessa the emperor will go to Ishineff and bid farewell to the fourteenth division, famous for its passage of the Danube under General Dragomiroff. The latter probably will attend the cere-

General Dragomiroff is greatly enfeebled in health, which may render impossible his going to the Far East as the chief of staff of Grand Duke Nicholas.

20,000 PEOPLE WERE THERE.

Archbishop of Canterbury at the Open Air Service.

Washington, Sept. 27.-The Right Hon. and Most Rev. Thomas Randall Davidson, the archbishop of Canterbury, sounded a ringing appeal for Christian unity at the open air service Mount Saint Albans this afternoon. Not since President McKinley was present at the erection of the peace cross on the same spot, after the war with Spain, have as many people gathered at that picturesque spot. The crowd was estimated at from 20,000 to 25,000. Mrs. Roosevelt, Mrs. J. 




