NEW ZEALAND CONDITIONS.
Guthrie, Ok., Sept. 25.—S. E.
Taylor of New Zealand arrived in
the city yesterday to visit his brother,
Dr. Taylor of this city, the first time
the brothers had met in fifty
years. He is an enthusiast relative
to the resources and climate of New
Zealand and also regarding the op-
portunities offered there.

Mr. Taylor says they get inside
their fur overcoats about July 4th
and inside their summer clothes
along in December, as to general
conditions says:

"We have no strikes in New Zealand,
and no money kings, no millionaires.
For the first evil we have arbitration
laws, and when a dispute arises be-
tween labor and capital it goes into
the courts, which arbitrate until the
trouble is settled. There is a law
which compels, when it is necessary,
the large land owners to divide their
lands and sell them in lots, so that
while they make good profits, they
are not allowed to accumulate large
tracts of land. Another very bene-
ficial law is one which fixes the taxes
of a lot unimproved the same as one

improved, thus encouraging the im-
proving of land.

"A very just law is in force, which
provides that a man over 65 years
of age and who has lived in that
country twenty-five years, is en-
titled to a pension from the Govern-
ment of about 25c a day. This, how-
ever, is not given to any person who
has an income or is making \$50 an-
nually, or more. In this way the
Government expends about £200,
000 annually. A condition of the
pension is that the receiver shall be
a man of good character and habits."

Mr. Taylor expects to return to
New Zealand after visiting friends
in the United States.

Capt. M. B. Loyd of Fort Worth
paid the license on 71 dogs in the
pound and secured their release,
rather than let them be killed; and
he says he will probably pay out all
dogs placed in the pound. The
city authorities are non-plussed at
Capt. Loyd's action. The ordinance
was passed with a view of ridding
the city of worthless curs and not
as a measure for revenue. The li-
cense on a dog is \$1 and a tag costs
7c, making a total of \$1.07, and if
the Captain keeps up his work it
will cost him several hundred dol-
lars. To date, the city collector of
Fort Worth has issued 1,153 dog
licenses.

A gentleman in Austin said a few
days ago that work is progressing
on the Colorado, Texas & Mexico
Ry., a road chartered some years ago,
but little was done towards its con-
struction until recently. The line
has been surveyed from Washburn,
Armstrong county, to Llano, with
San Antonio as its objective point,
which, however, is ultimately des-
tined to build into Mexico. Grading
is being done both north and south
from Abilene, just how far he was
not prepared to say. The project
seemed to be backed by ample capi-
tal, the grading force being prompt-
ly paid every Saturday night, and
plenty of money in hand for all
other necessary expenses.—Clarendon
Chronicle.

see is publishing a paper at Bristol,
and incidentally making the race for
the United States Senate, and who
has seen all sides of political life,
says in a recent issue of his paper:
"Decency and fairness and honesty
have no more business in politics

assas cost Uncle Sam \$750,000.

The Prohibitionist carried Mata-
gord county in Tuesday's election.

Kinney county will market
200,000 pounds of honey this year.

On October 8th Amarillo will vote
on the question of issuing bonds for
a sewer system.

The early part of October Texas
will exhibit seventy-five car loads of
fine cattle at the World's fair.

Government experts will give a
road building demonstration at
Beaumont on October 10th and 11th.

New York capitalists will build a
two and a half million dollar pack-
ery at Chicago to fight the beef
trust.

The annual live stock quarantine
proclamation issued by Gov. Sayers
gives the Texas quarantine the same
as last year.

The sugar crop on the Brazoria
county farm, owned by the State and
worked by State convicts, is believ-
ed to be worth \$100,000.

It is believed that several of the
millionaires of the Gen. Miles party
who recently toured the State will
make investments in Texas land.

Two Swiss scientists discovered
that if persons in a dark room have
a 16-candle power blue light shine
into their eyes for three minutes,
they become insensible to pain and
can have a tooth extracted without
feeling it.

From crop reports from all over
the State the Dallas News makes an
estimate that Texas will this year
produce 2,551,490 bales of cotton,
which will be 3 1/2 per cent more than
last year, but the yield per acre 5 1/2
per cent less than last year. The
increase in number of bales being
due to the large increase in acreage.

The annual report of the Santa
Fe Railway Company shows that for
the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904,
the gross earnings were \$68,171,200
and net earnings \$25,949,167.
These figures show a substantial in-
crease over the year previous. The
lines comprising the system are:
Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe; Rio
Grande & El Paso; Gulf, Colorado
& Santa Fe; Southern Kansas of
Texas, and the Pecos Valley.

The first settlers were largely till-
ers of the soil, which ought to con-
vince our farmers that their calling
in America is an ancient and hon-
orable one. "Since Adam delved and
Eve spun" and Washington, Jeffer-
son and Webster were farmers, and
the fore-fathers had to toil in the
fields, why should not agriculture
be considered one of the noblest of
pursuits? And if the Pilgrim Fathers
about 280 years ago could be
grateful for their little crops, we
should be more thankful for the im-
mense advantages in yield we have
over them in these progressive years.

Fruits are divided by the famous

1. Acid. 2. Sweet. 3. As-
trigent. 4. Oily. 5. Mealy.

In the first he counts cherries,
strawberries, raspberries, gooseber-
ries, peaches, apples, lemons, orange-
es, and regards them as of great
hygienic value.

Cherries he prohibits to those af-
fected with neuralgia of the stomach.
Strawberries and raspberries he
recommends to the bilious and
gouty, and denies them to those af-
fected with diabetes.

Of the sweet fruits he particularly
values plums, especially for the
gouty and rheumatic.

Grapes he awards the first place,
and thinks them the cure par excel-
lence for the anemic, dyspeptic,
consumptive, gouty and bilious.

Bananas are recommended for the
typhoid patient.

Lemons and tomatoes are cooling.
Lemonade is the best drink in
fevers.

The juice of half a lemon in a
teacup of strong black coffee, with-
out sugar, often cures the sick head-
ache.

The apple is one of the best of
fruits. Baked or stewed, it gen-
erally suits the most delicate person,
and are laxative.

Green figs are an excellent food
and are laxative.

Prunes supply the highest nerve
or brain food. Dried figs contain
heat, nerve and muscle food, hence
are good for both cold and warm
weather.

The small seeded fruits, such as
blackberries, raspberries, currants
and strawberries, are among the
best foods and medicines. Their
sugar is nutritious, their acid is
cooling and purifying.

Sweet ripe fruit in prime con-
dition only is called a perfect food.—
