The wholesale and retail grocery of T. M. Holt of Vernon was closed last week for benefit of creditors.

The proposition to issue bonds in the sum of \$45,000 for a sewer system carried at the election in Amarillo.

The Bowie county grand jury refused to indict Rev. J. B. Cranfill for shooting at Rev. Dr. Hayden at Texarkana last spring.

Uncle Sam's engineer have found a much better and cheaper route for the Panama canal than the French engineers had mapped out.

Rev. Geo. Stuart, the evangelist, secured over \$12,000 for the new church in Dallas, during the big meeting recently held there.

Length 441 feet 3 inches; beam 76 feet 2 1/2 inches; draught 25 feet 9 inches; speed 29 knots; indicated horse power 19,000. Main battery consists of four 12-inch and eight 8-inch and twelve 6-inch guns, and her secondary battery consists of fourteen 3-inch guns, twelve 3-pounders, sixteen small guns and four 21-inch torpedo tubes.
