

During the Second Night the Distressed Bark Disappeared From View and Not a Trace of It Could Be Found the Next Day.

Philadelphia, Nov. 23.-The Britsh steamer Aros Castle, Captain Day, fifty-seven days out from Java, with a cargo of sugar, arrived at this port and reported the probable foundering, on November 15, of the Spanish bark Tafalla, with her crew of fifteen men, during the recent southern storm. The steamer stood by the sinking bark for two days and on the second night. the Spanish vessel disappeared. The condition of the Tafalla when the fact that the Japanese return through crew of the Aros Castle last saw the vessel was such as to lead them to ing the night.

Captain Day reported that, shortly before daybreak on Sunday, November 13, during a terrible gale, rockets were sighted about 220 miles east of the Bermudas. The rockets were answered by flare lights from the Aros Castle, and the steamer's course was changed in the direction of the rockunknown vessel.

After daybreak, it was learned that the distressed vessel was the Tafalla, 995 tons, Captain S. Roig, with a cargo of pitch pine from Brunswick, Ga., for Valencia. The storm was so great that no small boat could be sent to the assistance of the Tafalla, and Captain Roig hoisted the following signal: "Leaking six inches an hour. Main pump broken and smaller pump clogged. Men worn out."

SOVEREIGNTY OVER MANCHURIA

The Minister Belongs to the Liberal, Progressive Element and Has Already Addressed a Memorial to the Throne Regarding the Future Questions That May Arise.

Paris, Nov. 22 .- The Chinese min ister in Paris, Souen Pao Ki, has come out as an advocate of applying Secretary Hay's "open door" policy to Manchuria. The minister belongs to the liberal, progressive element and has recently addressed a memorial to the throne, urging the grav ity of the questions which will arise when the present war ends, particularly the maintenance of China's sovereignity over Manchuria. In the course of an interview today the minister said:

"Whether Russia or Japan is victorious it will be essential that the victor recognize China's complete authority over Manchuria. It will be natural for the victor to expect spe cial privileges within the territory forming the theater of war, but China's rights in Manchuria being unquestionable neither belligerent can claim privileges growing out of coming to fight upon our territory. If any single power gains special privileges in Manchuria it will operate against the interests of all other powers. Therefore, it is to the interest of the world at large to foresee the conclusion of the war and guard against either of the powers obtaining a privileged position Manchuria. The court at Pekin is now considering certain measures for reform and it is quite possible that one of the chief results will be the extension of the open policy to Manchuria and certain other parts of the empire which thus far have been

outside the range of the open door. "The Russian embassy has temporarily assumed the aspect of a hospital, owing to the arrival there of a number of survivors of the battle of Chemulpo. Some have lost arms or legs, but all are in an advanced stage of recovery. The wounded are proceeding by easy stages to St. Peters

RECOUNTS A STORY.

Russian Exchange Shots . Through Mistake of the Admiral.

London, Nov. 23 .- The Daily Mail's Copenhagen correspondent recounts a story from a member of the Russian cruiser. Aurora, to the effect that Vice Admiral Rojestvensky's flagship Kniaz Suvaroff, mistakenly in the fog off Dogger Bank, bombarded the Aurora. whereupon the Aurora signaled, "We are being fired at," herself fired 50 shells at the British trawlers and the ly avers that there were two Russian torpedo boats with the first division of the Baltic squadron to which the Aurora belonged.

RETURNED TO WORK.

Teamsters Secure Some Additional Pay by Their Strike.

Chicago, Nov. 23 .- Teamsters whose strike against the Manufacturers' association was the cause for the rioting in the down town streets last week returned to work. The employers signed an agreement with the drivers promising that there should be no discrimination against union men in the hiring of teamsters. The employers also agreed to pay the teamsters for two horse wagons \$14 a week. This is an increase of 50 cents above the pay last year.

PROGRAM OF SHIPS.

Small Torpedo Boats Will Be Shipped From America.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 23. - Grand Duke Alexis, general admiral of the Russian navy, has presented to Emperor Nicholas a program of ships to be built at Russian dock yards.

The small torpedo boats which Lewis Nixon is building in the United States will be shipped in sections to Sevastopol, where the parts will be assembled. Subsequently the boats will be transported by rail to Vladivostok.
