Youngster Hurt In Gin Mishap

Keith Smith, nineteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Smith of Oklahoma Lane, is in fair condition following an accident at the Oklahoma Lane Cotton Gin on Friday of last week.

Keith was cleaning the stick machine cylinder when the sleeve of his jacket was caught and his arm pulled into it. The stick machine is one that carries the sticks and trash away from the cotton.

Keith's arm was mangled and all the skin and muscle tissue were torn from the arm. The boy was in the machine two hours before they were able to free him. He was then taken by helicopter to St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock. Dr. McClanahan came from Muleshoe and also paramedics from the area.

Wayne Smith, manager of the gin, who is also Keith's father, said the boy is still in the intensive care unit at St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock, but that he does not have feeling in his thumb and two fingers. One artery was not damaged and is supplying blood to the hand. He was in surgery for eleven hours following the accident.

Mr. Smith said he talked with the boy's mother Monday morning in Lubbock and he was going to be put on a liquid diet, so his condition is definitely improving.

Smith expressed his appreciation to everyone who showed concern and also for the prayers during this time.

Mustangs Face Silverton In Football Bi-District

For the second year in a row, the Bovina High School Mustangs will participate in post-season football play.

The Mustangs, who competed

last year after being co-champions in their 11-man district, made it back-to-back playoffs by winning the championship of Six Man District 1-A, after stepping down from eleven to six-man competition.

Bovina will meet the Silverton Owls at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Amherst. Bovina fans will sit on the home side. Admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

The Mustangs won their district title by posting a 4-0 district record. The deciding game in determining the district title was Bovina's 23-21 win over county rival Lazbuddie on October 28.

The Mustangs and Owls met in the second game of the season at Silverton, and with senior starters Scott Sudderth and Scott Scaff both sidelined with injuries, the Owls claimed a 29-12 win.

Coach Terry Bean is hoping things will be a little different this time around. For one thing, the Mustangs come into the game at near top physical strength.

With injuries playing a major part in Bovina's record during the first month of the season, the Mustangs finished with a 6-3 season mark, scoring 322 points (35.8 points per game), and allowing 182 points (20.2 points per game).

The Owls compiled a 7-2 season record. The Owls scored 313 points (34.8 points per game), and gave up 176 points (19.6 points per game).

Three teams ended up in a deadlock in Silverton's District 2-A. They were Higgins, Silverton and McLean, who all finished with 4-1 district records. A coin toss

was brought into play, with McLean being eliminated. Higgins, another of Bovina's early-season opponents, was given top designation in the district and Silverton the second seed.

Higgins and Lazbuddie will hook up in the other area bi-district game on Friday at Groom. Lazbuddie finished 9-1 for the season and 3-1 in district. Higgins was 7-2 and 4-1.

The Owls have a speedy team, and have been basically a running team this season. They have a hard-running fullback who is only a sophomore, and have quickness to the outside.

If the Mustangs are able to get past Silverton, they would meet District 3 champion New Home in the area round of the playoffs. New Home has a spotless 9-0 record, and drew a bye for the first round.

Mustangs Wallop Amherst By 63-15

The Bovina Mustangs finished out their regular season with a 63-15 win over the Amherst Bulldogs in a game at Amherst.

The game was stopped about midway through the final quarter due to the 45-point rule.

The win gave Bovina a 6-3 record at the end of the regular season.

Scott Scaff and Scott Sudderth hooked up on four touchdowns.

Shaun Pinkston gathered in a ten-yard pass from Sudderth with 7:46 left in the second quarter as Bovina hiked its lead to 12-0.

Denver Riddle scored on a 24-yard pass play, this time with Scaff on the throwing end. Before halftime, Bud Venable got loose on a 55-yard pass play from

Sudderth. He also kicked the two-pointer.

Scaff got the second half scoring underway with 8:41 left in the third quarter with a 24-yard pass from Sudderth.

Robert Guevara ran 45 yards for another score before the quarter ended.

Venable clicked again with a 46-yard pass from Sudderth, and Manuel Porras closed out the scoring with a 21-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Coach Terry Bean credited the second team defense (moved up from the junior varsity) with a great game.

SPS Announces Rate Drop In Rural Areas

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) filed Wednesday, November 2, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) to implement a previously announced 4.3% electric-rate decrease for SPS customers outside city limits, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

This step is part of a process that ultimately will result in all of SPS's residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers in Texas receiving a decrease of 4.3%, or \$20.6 million, compared with rates in effect at the first of the year, Hunter said.

Getting the decrease approved and implemented is occurring in stages, he noted, because of the regulatory process in Texas. Cities have original jurisdiction over base rates within city limits. The PUCT regulates rates for customers outside city limits.

The electric-rate decrease primarily reflects the lower federal income tax rate for corporations, Hunter said.

"If you will recall, in March 1988, SPS implemented a 3.1% decrease for customers within city limits, following approval of the 74 Texas cities it serves," Hunter said. "On July 8, SPS, the PUCT staff, a representative of the cities' steering committee and others

worked out an agreement for a 4.3% decrease for customers outside city limits. SPS announced at that time it would ask cities to approve an additional 1.2% decrease, thus making rates the same for customers inside and outside city limits."

Before these rates for customers outside city limits can be implemented, a PUCT hearing examiner must approve them, and finally the PUCT itself must rule on the agreement, Hunter said.

"That is the stage we are at now," he said. "The hearing examiner is expected to rule in about two weeks. If approved, the interim rates for customers outside city limits would be implemented a few days later."

"It is expected the PUCT will rule on this agreement and finalize rates about four weeks after the hearing examiner rules. At that time, customers outside city limits will receive a credit on their bills reflecting savings accrued since July 8 when the agreement for lower rates was reached," Hunter said.

At the time of PUCT approval, SPS will file with the cities it serves to further reduce the amount of the cities' March 1988 rate reduction, Hunter said.

"If the cities approve, it will be about 35 days after we file with the

cities when the additional rate reduction takes effect within city limits. Then SPS's customers within city limits also will receive a credit on their bills reflecting savings accrued since July 8," he said.

"The process can be hard to follow at times," Hunter said. "But when it's all said and done, all of our retail customers will have the benefits of lower electric rates, and rates within city limits and outside city limits will be identical."

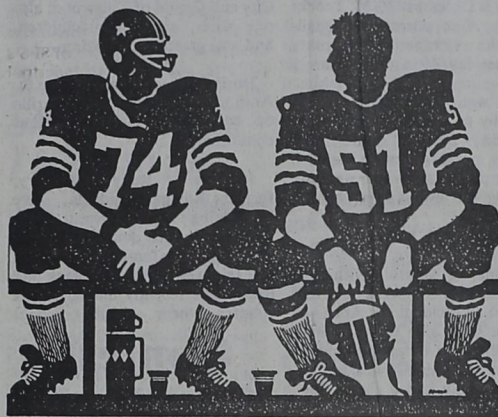

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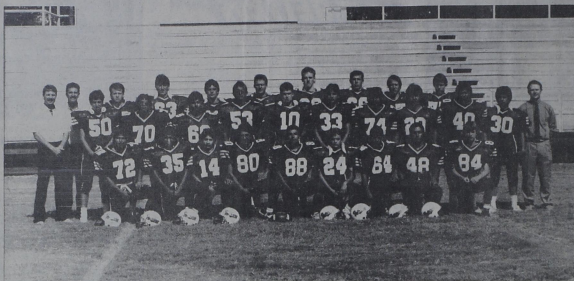
