



On the whole, the report completely dissipates the prevalent idea that great fortunes are being amassed by illegal and improper methods, em-ployed by western packers, showing that notwithstanding the high prices for beef prevailing in 1902 the busi ness was less remunerative than in years characterized by normal values, gerously. both for cattle and product. He says "that the year 1902, instead of being one of exorbitant profits, as has been commonly supposed, was less profit-able than usual. In fact, during the months when the prices of beef were the highest, some, at least, of the leading packers were losing money on every head of cattle slaughtered.
