LONG TRIP, WITH HEALTH AND PLEASURE THE OBJECTS.

Correspondent Writes of Journey in Texas and Mexico With a Party as Guests of the Southern Pacific Rail. road.

Gilson Willett, special correspondent of Leslie's Weekly, writes entertainingly of a thousand-mile horseback nunt in Texas and Mexico with a party as guests of the Southern Pacific railroad. The members of the party represented twelve different states. At Sabinas, Mexico, he says:

"Over half of the thousand-mile journey has been completed-and the fellows who are here for their health are now hard as nails; those who came along with an appetite for pleasure are well-nigh satiated; and the sportsmen have brought in, day after day incredibly huge bags of ducks, geese rabbits, squirrels, and no end of small game, not to mention big hauls of ieer, bear, wild turkeys and fish. All of which is due to about the most healthful region in the Union; to a section of country where pleasurable diversion is eternally at hand, and to territory that is literally a sportsman's paradise hitherto untrod and unshot and unfished."

Mr. Willett bestows a deserved eulogy on the splendid hospitality of the Southern Pacific and the hearty welcome accorded the party in south-

ern cities from New Orleans onward. Visitors to southwest Texas will not need to be told of the really marvelous work done by the Southern Pacific in building up that section of the coun-

ry. Mr. Willett says: "Then we again boarded our train and railroaded on for the most of a day, through a country in which the Southern Pacific has caused a blade of grass-not to speak of stalk of corn, cane or sugar, and blossom of cottona flourish where none grew before.

Thirty miles farther inland-on the San Diego river-we made our first camp in Mexico. After that our camps were from twenty to fifty miles apart. During the past cen tury the senate degenerated into the position of a useless register of imperial decrees and had become the refuge of governors, generals and civilians of high rank who had failed

In order to regenerate the senate it is proposed that the senate itself nominate persons for appointment by the emperor; that all ukases be first submitted for its approval, and also that it be re-clothed with its power to initiate legislation for the revision of the local and central administration. Most important, however, is the demand for power to try officials of every grade, even ministers, all of whom now enjoy exemption from trial except with the consent of their immediate superiors or of the emperor

Accepted Rebates From Southern Pa cific on Freight Contractors Engaged in Work in the West Under the Irrigation and Reclamation Act.

dren surely will-for they will follow the example set them, and rare indeed Washington, April 12 .- The comptroller, of the treasury has rendered a decision in which he criticises the proposed action of the secretary of the interior in accepting rebates from the Southern Pacific railroad or freight of contractors engaged in work in the west under the irrigation and reclamation act. In a communication to the comptroller on March 20 last would place at the head of the list of the secretary of the interior says:

"On October 13, 1904, the depart ment approved a contract with the Southern Pacific company providing for certain concessions to contractors under the reclamation act in the freight rates on their plant and materials shipped to and from the work on the projects. Other contracts of similar character have since been ne gotiated with the principal roads. The concessions in rates are brought to the attention of the bidders on the work of the reclamation service in order that they make due allowance for such concessions in their bids.

"The attention of this office has been called to a request of Sherer & Company, contractors on the Salt river project, who desire to be advis ed whether they can obtain the bene fit of concessions on some shipments soon to be made by them.

These contractors made their bids before any concessions had been arranged with the Southern Pacific Company, so that their bids do not provide for any benefit to the United States and accordingly this office has decided that the contractor is not entitled to such benefits."

He says:




