Beginning August 26th, and continuing thereafter on every Monday and Saturday up to and including December 23rd, 1903, we will run regular stock trains for Kansas City, St. Joseph and Chicago markets on the following schedule:

These trains are intended to take care of the small shipments which would otherwise have to be handled on way freight trains, but on account of the necessity of gathering these shipments all along the line we cannot guarantee the above schedule at all times. We will continue to handle trainload shipments, with proper notice, on any day of the week as suits the shipper.

Shippers will file orders for cars at least three days before date on which they intend to load, and longer notice should be given if possible.

TERSELY TOLD OF TEXAS

COMMISSION WILL FIGHT.

Injunction Papers Have Reached Austin.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 22.—Judge T. J. Freeman, general attorney of the Texas and Pacific, reached here with injunction papers directed against the railroad commission, enjoining the enforcing of the emergency order promulgated by the commission. Judge Freeman filed the bill in the federal court. Judge Freeman said the order issued by Judge McCormick had the effect of cancelling the emergency rates. He said that the injunction proceedings may be tried any where Judge McCormick directs, but that when the case comes up on its merits will have to be tried here in the federal court. Chairman Storey of the commission said that the commission had not yet been served with the notice of injunction. Clerk Hart of the federal court said that the attorney general or chairman of the commission will not be served until tomorrow with the notice. Chairman Storey, when asked the attitude of the commission, said: "We are ready to fight it."

Commission Hearing. Austin: The railroad commission met in regular hearing for the week with a small attendance. The first case taken up was the complaint by County Attorney Morris of Shackelford county, of the lack of accommodation of train service on the Texas Central railroad between Cisco and Stamford. The complaint was that there was no drinking water on the train and whites were forced to go in the negro coaches for water. After hearing the evidence the commission dismissed the case, as the commission found no grounds to sustain the complaint. The commission then took up the proposition to fix the minimum weight for the transportation of beer at 24,000 pounds per car, 24 cents from Houston and 25 cents from Galveston. The commission took the matter under advisement. The proposition of amending the demurrage rules applicable on tank cars used by railroad companies in the transportation of oil was taken up. Manager VanVleck of the Sunset and Central lines was on the stand all the morning. His testimony was to the effect that the rates should be so amended that the present rates could be increased. This case was on trial when a recess was taken for dinner.

CHARTER GRANTED FOR INTERURBAN

Line From Fort Worth to Mineral Wells Authorized

Austin, Sept. 21.—Articles of incorporation of the Fort Worth and Mineral Wells Electric Railroad company, capital stock \$250,000, with offices at Fort Worth and Mineral Wells, were filed Sept. 20. It provides for an electric road between Fort Worth and Mineral Wells through Tarrant, Parker, Palo Pinto counties, a distance of fifty-three miles. The incorporators are Cleo Smith, D. M. Howard, H. N. Frost, E. J. Waldron and Albert Stevenson.

CROWDS SEE SCENE OF WRECK.

San Antonio, Tex.: No arrest has been made in connection with the wrecking of the eastbound Pavy Crockett at the Fair Grounds Saturday night. The cause of the wreck was the placing of three U bolts on the track. The U bolt is a device used to support steel bridges. It was ascertained today by Sheriff Tobin that the bolts were stolen from the Southern Pacific round house in this city. These bolts are unusual instruments. They weigh sixty-seven pounds each and are forty-three inches long.

Waco, Tex., Sept. 19.—In his charge to the grand jury, Judge Sam R. Scott, of the fifty-fourth district court, referred to the fact that in a recent divorce case in Waco a divorce had been granted on the admission of adultery by the man, who is prominent. He instructed the grand jury to investigate and return a bill against the man for adultery, saying the tendency of society was to protect persons high in social life and that society needed to be directed the other way. The matter created a sensation.

Suicides in Jail. Houston, Tex., Sept. 19.—August Brecker, aged sixty-five, arrested on a charge of forgery, suicided in the police jail with morphine, which was concealed on his person. He was sent to the penitentiary two years ago and then committed suicide, but the poison was pumped out of his stomach. He was pardoned on the belief of his innocence. Rather than face new charges which might send him back he took his life.

Tabor Determined. Houston, Tex.—Dr. George R. Tabor, State health officer, was in the city yesterday evening en route to Austin from Galveston, where he went on official business.

Asked as to his reason for quarantining against Havana, Dr. Tabor stated that he had received private advices from an authoritative source to the effect that there were a large number of cases of dengue fever in Havana.

GERMAN CHILDREN SUICIDE.

Several Have Taken Their Own Life Since School Opened.

Berlin, Sept. 26.—Several distressing instances of the suicide of children have occurred since the autumn school term. This has brought on a discussion of the conditions of school and home life, and endeavors are being made to trace the cause of the increasing of the "entebleness" of the desire to live which it is affirmed the 11,000 suicides of 1903 indicated. The statistics of children's self murder in Saxony show that although only seven persons under 14 committed suicide in 1901-2, the number rose to 21 in 1903. The suicides of youths in Saxony increased in the same time from 1,388 to 1,427.

The causes of suicide in Germany are regarded as being exceedingly subtle. Socialists blame distressing economic conditions. The clerical view is the increase of irreligion and the growth of sensual materialism, while critics of the school system assert that children are forced too much.

Another Russian Loan. Paris, Sept. 28.—It is stated in well informed quarters that the plans of another Russian loan to be divided between Paris and Berlin have been concluded. The amount is understood to be approximately \$175,000,000.

ALL DIFFERENCES SETTLED BEFORE HAGUE TRIBUNAL

Stockholm, Sept. 28.—The Associated Press has succeeded in securing the text of the protocol signed at Karlstad Saturday by the Norwegian-Swedish delegates appointed to arrange the terms for the dissolution of the union of Norway and Sweden, subject to the ratification of the Riksdag and Storting. The historic document, which will become a treaty when ratified by the two parliaments, consists of five main articles and thirty-five sub-clauses. The first article deals with arbitration; the second with the neutral zone and the demolition of the fortifications; the third with reindeer pastures, etc.; the fourth with inter-traffic, and the fifth with common waterways. The agreement provides for the compulsory arbitration before The Hague court of all disputes except matters of vital interest, for the period of a decade, with extensions for other periods of ten years unless two years' previous notice is given of an intention to abrogate it.

ZEMSTVO CONGRESS MEETS; PETITION SUFFRAGE RIGHTS

Moscow, Sept. 27.—The congress of the representatives of the Zemstvos began at the residence of Prince Tcherbatoff, under the presidency of Count Heydon, one of the marshals of the nobility, who presented to the emperor the petition drawn up by the last Russian Zemstvo congress.

A report of General Durnovo, governor general of Moscow, was presented, which contained instructions to stop the meeting if the conditions under which the delegates were permitted to assemble should be violated.

These conditions provide that the sittings should not be public; that the president should not allow any departure from the lines mentioned, and that the speakers should not be permitted to say anything that might cause racial excitement. Representatives of the press, however, were allowed to enter, but the accounts in the Russian papers will be censored.

The congress adopted a resolution calling for the organization of a Zemstvo, and declaring that the representatives of the Zemstvos in the cities should participate in the domain, the lower house of the national assembly, organizing therein a united majority for the protection of their own interests and for the furtherance of their work in the cause of liberty. One or two speakers were in favor of boycotting the domain, a majority of the delegates declaring that it was necessary to participate in its proceedings in order to continue the struggle with the bureaucracy and to exact in the name of the people liberty and equality.

FIVE PERSONS KILLED; REAR-END COLLISION

Philadelphia, Sept. 27.—A rear end collision between the east bound New York limited express from St. Louis and a local passenger train which was standing at the Paoli station of the Pennsylvania railroad, 19 miles west of this city, resulted in the death of five men and the injuring of more than twenty others.

All those who met death were in the private car of General Manager Atterbury, which was attached to the rear of the local train. Mr. Atterbury is on his vacation in Maine.

In the car at the time of the collision were about a dozen men who had been engaged in overhauling the car. Those who were not killed were injured.

The collision was so great that the engine of the express plowed ten feet into the private car and the latter was forced half way through the day coach ahead. At the time of the accident there was less than half a dozen passengers in the local train and they were standing at the forward cars, which were not damaged. The engineer and fireman of the limited were not hurt, but a dozen persons on the train were injured by being thrown against seats on the sides of the cars.

Hundreds of railroad men from the yards came quickly to the rescue. Nearly all the injured were immediately placed on the forward cars of the local train, which was run to this city as a special. It stopped at Byrn Mawr, where a half dozen of the injured were taken to a hospital and the others were brought here and sent to various hospitals.

Four of those who lost their lives were killed almost instantly. The fifth, Richard Garland, died in the University hospital in this city.

Confers With Ministers. Madrid, Sept. 27.—General Bernal, commander of the Spanish garrison at Ceuta, Morocco, has conferred with the ministers concerning the neutral zone separating Ceuta and Morocco proper.

International Navigation Congress. Milan, Italy, Sept. 27.—The International Navigation Congress was opened here in the presence of King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena and the cabinet ministers. Thirty-six nations were represented.

Two Steamers Collide. London, Sept. 28.—With her stern badly damaged, the Ketch Lucy Richmond, was assisted to Dover after having been in collision with the steamer Shemnitz.

Treaty to Special Committee. Christiania, Sept. 28.—Premier Michaels laid before the storting the draft of the treaty providing for the dissolution of the union between Norway and Sweden. It was directed to submit the treaty to a special committee.

MAY CLOSE SUEZ CANAL.

Banks Were Damaged by Explosion in Blowing up Vessel.

New York, Sept. 27.—Czarnikaw, McDougall & Company of this city received the following telegram: "It is probably the Suez canal will be closed 14 days; debris Chatham." The steamer Chatham was sunk in the Suez canal early in the month and it was announced that she was to be blown up with dynamite on Saturday. It is inferred that the banks of the canal were damaged by the blowing up of the vessel, hence the report that the canal will probably close for two weeks until the damage can be repaired.

The closing will delay several cargoes of Java sugar due to arrive at the Atlantic ports during the latter part of October and November. The time allowed for the steamer to make a trip from the Suez canal to New York is about 24 to 25 days.

Race Horse Trainer Shot. Stanford, Ky., Sept. 28.—John F. Farris, the race horse trainer, was shot to death by R. E. Lee Sims, owner of several thoroughbred horses, and for whom Mr. Farris trained a two-year-old. There were no witnesses to the trouble.

A headquarters staff and garrison may be maintained at Fredricksten to the same extent as prior to erection of the new fortifications. No extension of the Kongsviner group of fortifications will be permitted, nor of the new forts erected within six and a quarter miles of the old fortress of Kingsvaer.

Indians Speak Turkish. The students of the University of Campeche, Mexico, have discovered that the language of the Indians there is almost identical with Turkish. Turkish coming directly from their country to Mexico did not difficulty in making their wants known to the Indians, and within a few weeks are able to talk the language fluently.

LACE FROM TREES. Their Inner Bark Yields Lace in Sheet Form.

There are in all about half a dozen lace-bark trees in the world, so called because the inner bark yields a lace in sheet form, which can be made up in serviceable articles of apparel. In the natural state lace-bark is of a delicate cream-white tint. When the outer bark is removed it can be unfolded and unwound in one seamless piece, having a surface of a little more than a square yard. Washing and sun bleaching give it a dazzling white appearance. The fabric is airy light, and is used in the West Indies for mantillas, cravats, collars, cuffs, window curtains—in fact, for every purpose that ordinary lace is used.





Fever in Mississippi.
Jackson, Miss., Sept. 27.—The yellow fever infection in Hamburg is spreading rapidly, nine new cases, four suspicious cases and one death being reported.

Will Start for Japan Soon.
Odessa, Sept. 23.—The government has chartered the American steamer Garrone, which, with the Angara and the volunteer fleet steamers St. Petersburg, Kostroma and Nizhn Novgorod, will start for Japan soon to repatriate the Russian prisoners.

RETURNS FROM CUBA

Delayed Election Returns Reached Havana.

VICTORY FOR GOVERNMENT.

This Important Move Means the Re-election of President Palma in December—Order Prevails Through out the Island.

Havana, Sept. 27.—Complete returns from the entire island, which have been delayed owing to the bad condition of the telegraph service, show that in the election last Saturday for members of the election boards the supporters of the government were victorious in every province, having not lost one important place. The victory was so important that it means the re-election in December of President Palma.

Colonel Ferrera, secretary to Governor Gomez, the Liberal candidate for the presidency, was arrested, charged with seditious and revolutionary utterances. This makes the sixth charge now pending against him, the others including participation in the burning of the city hall at Cienfuegos. Colonel Ferrera is an Italian, but he is a veteran of the last Cuban war and one of the most prominent lawyers in Havana.

The mail brought to the Liberals recently the first reports from their adherents in Cienfuegos of the riots there Friday last, which resulted in the killing of Congressman Enrique Villendez and Chief of Police Illance. This report differs very little from former accounts, except that it lays on the Moderates the blame for starting the disturbances.

Additional reports from Cienfuegos received by the government say that the chief leaders in the alleged dynamite plot were two Italian anarchists named Humberto Bruni Bovo and Julio Grau, who have been making seditious speeches there and elsewhere for some time.

Order continues to prevail throughout the island.

RATES BY PACKERS.
The Railroads Are Made to Come to Their Terms.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—The packers fix the rates, declared A. B. Stickney, president of the Chicago Great Western railway, testifying for the defense before the interstate commerce commission regarding freight rates on livestock and livestock products from the Missouri river to Chicago.

In answer to questions as to whom the charges were made President Stickney replied: "In fixing the rate on dressed meat we don't have very much to say."
"The packer generally makes the rate. He comes to you and always makes you feel that he is your friend. Then he asks you how much you charge for certain shipments of dressed meats. The published tariff may be 23 cents per hundred, but he will not pay that. You say to him: 'I will carry your meat for 18 cents.' He says: 'Oh, no; you won't. I won't pay that.' Then you say: 'Well, what will you pay for it?' He then replies: 'I can get it hauled for 16 cents.' So you haul it for 16 cents per hundred. He generally tells you that if you want the business you must haul the meat for the price he names."

President Stickney denied that his road had paid any claims for damages or rebates since the "Grosscup in junction."

STANDARD IS FAVORED.
Iowa Oil Company Files Complaint for Alleged Discrimination.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Complaint was filed with the interstate commerce commission by the Marshall Oil Company of Marshalltown, Iowa, protesting against freight rates on oil shipping in less than car lots. The complainants own refineries at Oil City and Warren, Pa., and they allege that rates granted on car loads of oil unjustly discriminate in favor of the Standard Oil Company. The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, Missouri Pacific, Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, Iowa Central, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Union Pacific railroads are the defendants.
