regard to the outrages perpetrated on our co-religionists in Russia. I was aware then, as I am now, that our government is powerless. Good offices under the circumstances are elemen-

tary, for, unfortunately, the government of Russia itself is in no condition to protect its own conditions. The condition at this juncture is anolmous. The czar, inspired by Count Witte, and compelled by circumstances over which he has no control, has yielded to the demands of the Russian people. A new era is dawning, and naturally excesses are the circumstances of this evolution. It is deplorable and heartrending to realize that our people, as in so many instances in history, have to be the victims of new conditions; but we must be just, although suffering, and concede that out of this terrible slaught er and turmoil the white robed angel of peace and justice will emerge, and that the citizens, irrespective of faith or nationality, will be benefited there-

"Our government is sympathetic and feels most keenly the position in which our people are placed, but there are international laws that govern cases of this character and because many Jews have been the victims of mob violence is no reason why the government of Russia should be held responsible for the immediate effect. Of course, if you go back to the origin of things, then we must hold the government responsible, but we are not dealing with the situation as it ought to be, but as it is. Let us, on the other hand, instead of wasting words, appeal to the Jews of the United States for money and clothes to send to our stricken co-religionists, to put them in a condition to help themselves."

HOW FINE HYMN WAS WRITTEN.

'Onward, Christian Soldiers," Com posed for School Festival.

Probably a greater hymn never had
a more humble origin than "Onward,
Christian Soldiers," which is one of the most popular of our modern hymns. In the October Delineator Allan Sutherland writes:

This suggests the poet Thomas Gray, who was also a man of vast learning, not only in literature, but in all the arts and sciences of his day. and although he left writings enough to form, with his life, a book of four volumes, edited by Edmund Gosse it is by his one poem, "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard," that he will be ever remembered. This may also prove true of Baring-Gould. The few lines hurriedly composed on a Saturday evening as a marching song for a band of little children will doubtless give his name greater fame than all the books he has ever written.


