

### DAYS OF SLAVERY IN ENGLAND Last Sale on Record Is of a Boy in 1771, for \$160.

the judges to be contrary to the law of England, but during the years immediately preceding this date, slaves were commonly sold.

In the previous year a Birmingham paper advertised for sale "a neg.o boy, sound, healthy and of mild disposition"; while in the same year another paper records (and condemns) the sale, a short time previously at Richmond, of a negro boy for \$160. This is believed to have been the last actual sale of a slave that took place

White slavery was very common in the English colonies in the 17th cen-tury. Cromwell seized Irish boys girls and women "by the thousand." and "sold them in the slave markets of Barbadoes," as may be seen in num-

Wharves of Its Ports Subside Five Inches and Fears Are Entertained

Barbadoes, British West Indies. Feb. 27.-Mont Pelee, in Martinique, is again active, and the inhabitants of the island are in terror of a recurrence of the great eruptions of four years

Before the crest of the volcano it self fell below the horizon the sailors aboard the vessel saw molten sand crater in overwhelming masses, rolling down over the plantations on the eastern slope of the mountains and presumably flowing over the twiceburied city of St. Pierre.

# KOREANS ARE IN SLAVERY.

THE EMPEROR LIVES IN TERROR OF JAPANESE.

San Francisco, Feb. 26.-Archdeacon W. W. Jeffries, an Episcopalian minister, who has just returned from the Orient, says that the Koreans are being greatly oppressed by the victorious Japanese.

"When a Korean objects to the confiscation of his property," the minister says, "he is falsely charged with being a spy and is probably shot or hanged the same day.

The executions in some cases, Dr. That That Island Will be Engulfed Jeffries says, are of a horrible nature, and he has brought with him a number of photographs to prove the truth of his assertions. He says that even women are not immune and that it is no uncommon sight to see them suspended by the necks on one of the streets of a Korean city. The bodies, he says, are allowed to hang in the streets for days as a warning to the inhabitants.




