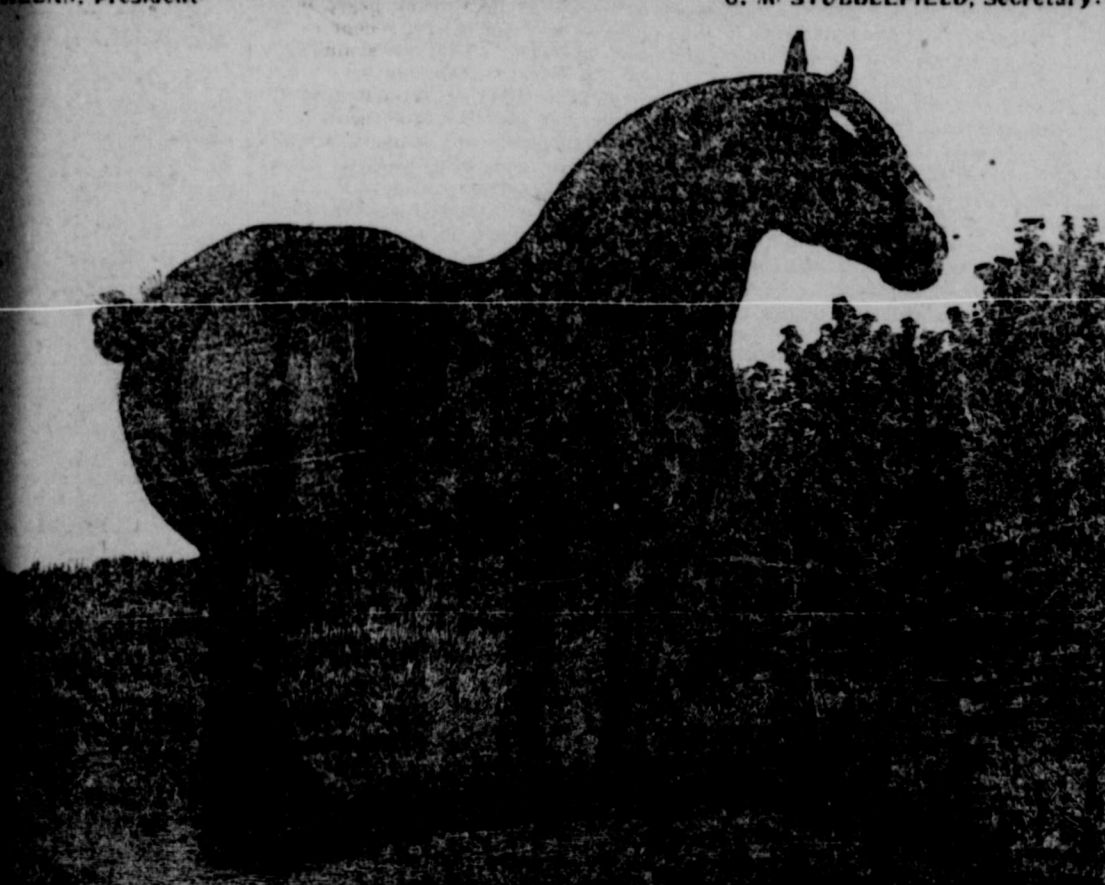

### Origin of the Name Texas.

Edwin W. Hensinger of San Antonio has just added to the collection of old rare books a geography which was published in 1774. The maps in this book are remarkably well executed, and are interesting in that they show the parts of the world as they were known at that time. On one of the maps the northwestern part of North America is shown as "part undiscovered." Australia was also only partly discovered, and it is shown as the land of "New Holland," with New Guinea and "Van Niesson's Land," now called the island of Tasmania, as one supposed continent. New Zealand, too, is shown as a partly discovered land. The Hawaiian Islands had not been heard of.

The Atlantic Ocean was at that time called the "Western Ocean." What is now the Pacific Ocean was called the "Great South Sea," and the Caribbean Sea was then known as the "North Sea." Another important map in those days was that of Mexico, known as "New Spain," and what is now Texas was then the "Province of Louisiana."

The French settlement of "Natchikoches" is shown, and the countries of the Natchez and Apache Indians are indicated, and it is interesting to note the source of the Rio Grande, then called the Rio de Norte, which according to this wonderful map, rises among some mountains in a land about where South Dakota now is.

Mr. Hensinger says one important factor in the text of this work is the description of certain Indian tribes "towards the North River" (Rio Grande), known as the "Texas," who live in villages. "Texas" was then the name for the reformed Indians living in missions, for it speaks of them as "having embraced Christianity," and being the more passionate lovers of the Spaniards. Texas was therefore, no doubt, derived from the word "Texas," says he.—New York Tribune.

### A Panhandle Fire Mountain.

The Channing Courier tells of a small volcano in the Panhandle that still gives evidence of terrific internal discord. The Courier says:

There are doubtless but few people in this section who are acquainted with the fact we are living almost within sight of a volcano. This evidence of internal fire and discord is situated not far from Tascosa, and has been harmlessly active for many, many years. Though no doubt violent outbursts have occurred within the memory of the oldest Indian fighters of the plains, the fact yet remains that the volcano is an ever-present reality and some day may allow its pent-up forces to belch forth in a storm of thunder, ashes and lava. Evidences of former terrific eruptions are not wanting. Beds of ancient lava are plainly discernable showing beyond doubt that hundreds, or may be thousands of years ago, this apparently mild volcano of today, spread horror and devastation for miles around. # MONEY IS AVAILABLE

CAPITALISTS OFFER TO ADVANCE MONEY FOR PURPOSE.

ONE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS

The Names of the New York Capitalists Are Not Given—The Offer is Under Discussion by the Local Finance Committee.

San Francisco, May 3.—The first definite provision for sending money on a large scale to San Francisco for the purpose of rebuilding some of the burned sections was made public when it was announced that a syndicate of New York capitalists had agreed to advance \$100,000,000. The news came in a telegram received by W. F. Herrin, chief counsel of the Southern Pacific from United States Senator Newlands of Nevada, who had a large interest in the burned Palace hotel. Senator Newlands stated that he had submitted the plan to the New York financiers and that they had virtually consented to supply the money on a bond and mortgage basis. The names of the New York capitalists are not given. The offer is under discussion by the local finance committee.

Railroad Building in Canada.

Railroad building is so active in Canada that the local steel mills are unable to supply the demand for rails, and large orders are accordingly being turned to the United States. But the present Canadian duty on steel rails is high enough to make importations expensive, and so the Grand Trunk Pacific company has petitioned the government to remit the duty on the ground that it was imposed purely as a protective measure and the local mills cannot meet the demand.

All Japs Looked Alike.

Not long ago a Japanese war vessel stopped at Cork and a number of sailors were given shore leave. They were seen everywhere, being objects of great interest. It happened that on the same day a country woman was in Cork seeing the sights and for the first time saw a native of the mikado's land. All Japs looked alike to her and after she had observed a street car half filled with them, she exclaimed: "Glory be, but she was a wonderful woman that had all them sons. Everywhere I seen them this day and they have all the same faces on them, the little cratures."

# MONEY IS AVAILABLE

CAPITALISTS OFFER TO ADVANCE MONEY FOR PURPOSE.

ONE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS

The Names of the New York Capitalists Are Not Given—The Offer is Under Discussion by the Local Finance Committee.

San Francisco, May 3.—The first definite provision for sending money on a large scale to San Francisco for the purpose of rebuilding some of the burned sections was made public when it was announced that a syndicate of New York capitalists had agreed to advance \$100,000,000. The news came in a telegram received by W. F. Herrin, chief counsel of the Southern Pacific from United States Senator Newlands of Nevada, who had a large interest in the burned Palace hotel. Senator Newlands stated that he had submitted the plan to the New York financiers and that they had virtually consented to supply the money on a bond and mortgage basis. The names of the New York capitalists are not given. The offer is under discussion by the local finance committee.

**Mangled by Train.**

About 4 o'clock Wednesday morning the West bound passenger train struck a man on the track when about four miles this side of Canadian. The train stopped, picked up the wounded man and brought him on to Miami, where it was found his skull was fractured over the right eye, right hip bone broken, the upper bone of the right arm fractured and a number of less serious bruises. By papers on his person it was found his name was W. H. Pierce and that his parents lived in Illinois, and a telegram was sent conveying the news of the sad accident. The parents being old and feeble and having a daughter living near Gage telegraphed her to come to the wounded man, so the man's sister and a lady cousin from Gage arrived Thursday morning. The man remained unconscious about twenty-four hours and when he had apparently gained consciousness he could not give a satisfactory explanation of how the accident happened. A plausible story is told by the engineer of the train, who stated that the man was probably asleep near the track but entirely out of danger. Hearing the rumbling in the distance caused him to dream of the approach of the train and that he was on the track. The noise becoming louder and the electric headlight flashing on him he became frightened and dazed and in fleeing for safety ran into danger, for as near as can be told he was leaning the train when struck. The wounded man during his stay here was at the Cottage House and Dr. Gunn, assisted by Dr. Teas of Canadian, dressed the wounds and reduced the fractures. On Thursday night the parties, accompanied by Sheriff Carter, left for Wichita, Kansas, where the sick man will be placed in a hospital.

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
