When such great sums of money are being expended by city government that the inhabitants of towns may have a sanitary water supply, it seems strange that the supply in rural towns should receive little or no attention. This latter population may seem relatively insignificant, but according to the last census it comprises about 40,-000,000 souls. This means that 40,-000,000 people are drinking the water most available, without a thought of springs or small streams, are similarly unreliable for furnishing drinking water. 




A WOOL-TYING BOX.

A very useful device for tying fleeces in a compact bundle is hown in illustration. It is made of one-inch boards hinged together on a central

Her first calf was dropped in 1897heifer-now a valued member of the herd. Her next calf came in 1898, with a successor each year up to the present, making nine calves in all. 

The following is the fomula for making the lime and sulphur dip: Take eight to eleven pounds of unslaked lime and add enough water to slake the lime, sift into this three times as many pounds of flower of sulphur as there were pounds of lime at the outset. Boil the mixture from two to three hours, adding water when necessary. Pour the mixture into a tub, vat or barrel that it may be drawn off through a spigot without sediment. When using this dip, it is greatly important to keep the sediment out of the mixture. The common form of the infection

For many their city. years preceding the war with Spain our regular army numbered only about 25,000 men. With the outbreak of hostilities with Spain came a very large increase. After the close of the conflict, however, there was a steady, radical reduction, until the American wrote: standing army to-day numbers, oaly about 60,000 men. Of these, about onefourth, or in the neighborhood of 15,-

000, are in the Philippines. A small force is maintained in Alaska, and a still smaller in Hawaii, leaving, in round numbers, 40,000 soldiers of the regular army in this country, or an increase of only about 15,000 since the


