Joint Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fif-teen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary o pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred pointments. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

Joint Resolution to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 2, of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit "All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by eneral laws, exempt from taxation public property used all the local orange-growing territory for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not there are probably not more than held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and own- 1,200 carloads of fruit on the trees or sary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from

The bourgeois of Paris, like every bourgeois, has his Sunday tie and his Sunday coat; his wife has her Sunday bonnet; his daughters have each a dress of turquoise blue and heliotrope; when they have donned their finery the bourgeois and bourgeoise are "en-Hence follows this advantage: No one, seeing them, can be dubious as to the day; the heliotrope puts an end to all perplexity-instantly you can safely wager, you may swear, even if you have been an invalid for months or a traveler for years, even if you have lost all count of time, that it is Sunday.

Still, one incongruity is noticeable: Each person carries a basket; not a fancy thing, not the little pannier into which the heroine of a melodrama packs fresh eggs and honeysuckle; but stout basket, a veritable market basket. All foods are stored in it, enough food to last from Saturday until Wednesday.

As Sannois holds its bi-weekly "conrersazione"-for this it is-the basket becomes laden, heavy. The villagers, at last dispersing, cheerfully bear off their burdens: but the aristocrats seek an idler, a ne'er-do-well (Sannois has many ne'er-do-wells) to carry the baskets to the six-roomed villas in exchange for sous. A dozen idlers present themselves and are engaged. Most of them are scrubby, clumsy; but the readjest, the most agile of them all, is Jacquon-"le Follet," as they call him, as he likes to be called; shock-headed, with tow-colored hair, light, restless eyes, a loose mouth, a lean face; the lank figure of a boy of 17, the brain of a child of seven, but in reality-so the villagers affirm -30 years of age or more. He is hailed as Jacquon, and he laughs. He laughs again as he takes the basket, and as he raises it, and when he rests it on his shoulders. He laughs stupidly, and his mouth twitches when he laughs.

No one feared Jacquon le Follet when we encountered him on the market place some months ago. "He is insane." Sannois admitted "but never harms anyone. He only

laughs-laughs continually." And it was true-Jacquon laughed continually; but his laughter was so ithin the precincts of familiar that the villagers did not

even shudder when it rang out sud-"Jacquon is returning from the station," was all they said; for Jacquon was hired sometimes by the Sannois

aristocrats to light them with his lantern to the station; or to light them home, as the way was rough and dark. They trusted Jacquon; and yet he

was an uncanny spectacle in the moonlight, with his lantern and his laugh. 

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
