### TREES IN THE DOORYARD.

Discussion of Varieties to Be Used in Beautifying the Grounds About the House.

In reply to a correspondent who writes to inquire about the beautifying of the grounds about his house, the Ohio Farmer, suggests the inclosing with a snug screen the northerly, Very many of the drownings near and in the most of the narrow lawn free.



If this cutting back is done in a year when all the fruit buds have been killed by the cold, the loss of time is reduced by one year. Some varie-

### FIGHTING PEACH TREE BORER

How This Pest of the Orchard May Be Kept from Doing His Destructive Work.

One of the best preventives to keep

peach tree bore is to draw away the

earth in the fall down to the crown of the roots and coat the stem to one foot above ground with a thick coat of linseed (il and white lead, without any turpentine at all. But even when this is done there will be found occasional borers. Therefore, now is the time to look over the orchard, and wherever a gummy exudation is seen at the base of a tree the borer is at work and should be cut out at once and all the damaged bark and gum removed. Repeat the examination late in summer and you can keep the orchard fairly the fight against the curculio which cause the fruit to be wormy. No amount of spraying will do much for this sucker, for he is not eating the poison. The only way to fight him is to have a broad apparatus like an inverted umbrella made with a light frame covered with cotton cloth. A slit on one side admits it round the tree, and then a jarring of the tree will cause the bitten fruit and the bugs to fall into the receptacle; the curculio will not attempt to fly, but will feign death. Then turn the contents into a pan of water on which some kerosene has been poured, to kill the insects. This jarring must be kept up at intervals until the fruit is more than half grown if you want to avoid wormy peaches. Jarring off the bitten fruit will only make the re-

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

LIKE EDGE OF THE WORLD

Unalaska resembles other northern stations, having warehouses, docks, the inevitable Greek church and a score of wooden cabins. Whalers leave

here for the Arctic regions. Dutch Harbor is a station for our revenue fleet. There is much coming and going of ships of all nations; here are quite a formidable fleet, and only two ships out of twelve carry colors of the same country.

Just before entering the harbor one notices a detached rock high against the side of the cliff. It bears a striking resemblance to a Russian prie: in full robes. Touched by the sunset light, he seemed to stand blessing the harber.

Sailing north out into Behring sea, one looks back at the desolate, silent, treeless islands, which seem to wall the edge of the world. Hundreds of miles west they run toward Vladi-

vestok. Two hundred and forty miles north of Unalaska are the Pribilof islands; not large, but the greatest seal islands in the world. There are many fur seals around the shores of Behring sea and the Aleutian islands, but the great mass of them are bred on the Pribilof group. No white man is permitted to land on these breeding grounds without a permit, signed by the secretary of the treasury of the United States .- Outdoor Life.



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
