Grain, Fruits, Vegetables, Enterprises, Etc. in the Miami Country.

The acreage in wheat, oats and in the Miami country is greater in any other section of the Panhandle proper and the average yield per acre last year was better than other part. The average this year about the same as last, which is better for hard wheat. This is the basis for our assertion that the richest part of the plains is that the south plains country adjacent Miami and around Pampa.

More Panhandle grown wheat is marketed in Miami than anywhere in the Panhandle.

More binders were sold to farmers one day in Miami than were probably sold in Amarillo the whole season, and we feel sure the number of binders during the season is greater than that sold in any other part in the Panhandle proper.

Miami has a flour mill, the machinery just being installed. Also a steam elevator just completed. Only one other town in the Panhandle has flour mills.

Probably the largest vineyard in the Panhandle is that of Judge Carter's one and a half miles from Miami. Fifteen hundred thirty vines, being into bearing three years ago and making three crops. Yield is good and the fruit large and well colored.

An apple tree with forty bushels of fruit on it is not a bad sample of what the soil here will produce in fruit. There has been several loads of apples marketed here this year from the Mars orchard on Northfork. This orchard is an apple tree measuring sixty-two inches in circumference and the crop on this tree this year is estimated at forty to fifty bushels.

There are a number of good orchards in this section and the fruit finds ready market in Miami. There is a native plum that grows wild. It is large and well flavored and a large number are sold every season for preserving and eating. The same varieties thrive. Berries grow prolific. Currents and grapes also grow wild.

Watermelons grow to an enormous size. Cantaloupes do splendidly. The home market is supplied with home grown cabbage, tomatoes, beets, cucumbers, turnips, etc. One of our farmers marketed 60 worth of Irish potatoes from three-fourths of an acre besides what he reserved for home use.

There are many fields of alfalfa and the crop flourishes. Alfalfa and hogs is engaging the attention of many of our prosperous stock-farmers.

Three steam and two gasoline plowing outfits operate in the country adjacent to Miami, slice the sod from the fertile prairie ten and twelve feet at a swath.

A larger line of farming implements is carried in Miami than in most places in the Panhandle even much larger. This shows the business men have confidence in this section as a farming country.

Miami has a press brick plant. Arrangements have just been made to install electric lights.

Population about 500.

Miami has two immense general merchandise establishments—one of them has more floor space than any institution of its kind in the Panhandle. Has one exclusive dry-goods store, one exclusive implement and hardware store, one drug store, one printing office, one livery stable, two hotels, one restaurant, one two chair barber shop, one meat market, one bank, three law firms, two lumber yards, one blacksmith shop, two real estate firms, one harness shop, etc.

Miami has the most substantial stone and brick business buildings of any place its size in the Panhandle. And also many pretty homes.

Several yards in Miami evidence how well flowers do here, and show a rank growth of shade trees.

Miami is a city of churches. The Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterians have neat church edifices here. The Christians have an organization but no house of worship yet.

Not another public school in the

Panhandle surpasses that of Miami. The wells in Miami are from 40 to 100 feet deep and on the plains about 300 feet. The water is cool, clear, soft, and free from organic matter and the supply inexhaustible.

Recently more thought has been given to raising good horses and mules and it is quite a change over old conditions to see the fine two and four horse teams of horses and mules that line the street.

Miami is situated in the valley of Red Deer Creek. Either side north or south from the railway depot 2 1/2 miles will bring you to the perfectly level rich plains lands. The crop yields on this land have been quoted by real estate men all over the Panhandle as "yields in the Panhandle" which was true only as it applied to this particular section. All of the plains land of the Panhandle is good, but being favored with just a little better seasons and the soil just a little richer the crop yields of this section are usually a little heavier.

We don't believe any section can show greater industry than that displayed by the people in the Miami country. We have the large fields, the straw stacks, the new homes, the new fields, etc. to show for themselves.

Prospectors and homeseekers when they get a drenching in the Panhandle and find bicycles laying off duty because of muddy roads, acknowledge some surprise. Some land buyers and settlers come from Northeast Missouri and other sections, where the corn is stunted and the grass is parched and dead. They open their eyes in amazement as it dawns on them that Panhandle seasons are as safe or safer than in states where land sells for \$50 to \$75 an acre. They wake up to the business policy of selling their \$50 land and of buying in the Panhandle at \$10 and \$15 per acre, where the soil is fertile and the seasons just as good.

There would not be any \$10 or \$15 land left if the Northern and Eastern farmers were posted. They have been dropping in here singly and in small groups for several years, then going back without purchasing land. Now they come and buy, and, with regrets painful to express, tell what they were offered one, two, three and four years ago.

Because buffalo grass doesn't grow as high as rag weeds, and because they carried in their minds notions about the seasons, that the Amarillo weather bureau station has settled beyond cavil (for people who go to the proper source for information) they struggled their shoulders and went home, leaving land selling for \$5 per acre.

The above table indicates the annual precipitation as registered at the government weather bureau at Amarillo, showing an average for ten years of 24.11, which is ample to insure an abundant yield of most crops. Mr. Campbell, the great soil culturist, says 14 inches of rainfall is sufficient to make good crops. No year in the ten did the rainfall go beneath 20 inches save in 1898.

Miami, being 45 miles east of Amarillo, probably has a greater average rainfall by 2 or 3 inches, if the principle applies here the same as on the Gulf coast, where the government has demonstrated the rainfall decreases an inch for every fifteen miles west of Galveston. The Miami country is the Eastmost portion of the PLAINS.

We want it strictly understood that we believe any portion of the Plains is safe for farming but in the portion where the rainfall is a little better the average yields will probably be a little heavier.

This copy of THE CHIEF with the above table in it should be kept for future reference or be sent to friends in the East. This should be conclusive evidence that the Panhandle is not merely a broad waste of desert country, as it was once considered, and as was taught in the school geographies years ago.

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LARGEST OAT YIELD.

The largest yield of oats thus far reported this year is that of a fraction over ninety-seven bushels per acre on Dave Davis' place south of Miami, which were threshed the former part of this week.

SUGAR BEET FACTORY.

Specimen of beets weighing 12 and 14 pounds is sufficient evidence that growing sugar beets would be a paying industry here if there was a factory to insure a market. This would afford an opportunity for further diversification of crops and to this extent better insure the continued prosperity of this country. Sugar beet factories are secured in countries adapted to beet growing usually by a guarantee of a certain acreage being planted and cultivated. Beet growing sections are usually prosperous and this would indicate that the crop is a paying one. The sugar factory project in one of the Miami people must investigate.

GOOD CORN.

Two stalks of June corn grown on the Webster place three miles from Miami adorn our sanctum walls. The specimens are eleven feet high and each stalk bearing two good ears. The yield of Indian corn this year will average about fifty bushels per acre.

Some of these are now buying land of their own and with an average crop will pay for same. Cotton is almost a certainty, and Greer county has the distinction of being the banner cotton county of Oklahoma, and is fourteenth in the list of cotton producing counties of the world. Last year Greer county produced 50,000 bales of cotton, worth \$2,500,000. Several farms produced more than enough cotton to pay for the claims. As the boll weevil is not traveling in this direction, new Oklahoma and Northwest Texas will yet prove the solution of the boll weevil question."

YIELDS OF SMALL GRAIN IN THE MIAMI COUNTRY.

Rain has interrupted threshing and but few crops are finished, and with those that are threshed the yield was about the same as last year. For this reason we give some last year yields in the following: J. R. Henry has raised wheat 10 miles from Miami for 7 years, and his annual average for the 7 years has been 18 3/7 bushels per acre. H. P. Chisum, living 3 miles from Miami, one of our solid farmers and county commissioners, raised last year 24 bushels of wheat, 88 7/16 bushels of oats per acre and has raised 12 consecutive crops of kaffir corn and estimates the least number of bushels per acre during that time at 35, and the best yield at 75 bushels. Lee Cunningham who farms 5 miles from Miami, last year threshed from 115 acres 3,187 bushels of wheat. A. B. McAfee, who farms 14 miles from Miami, made last year 54 bushels of barley and 35 bushels of wheat per acre. D. C. Davis, 12 miles from Miami, raised last year 24 bushels of soft wheat, 29 bushels hard wheat and 90 bushels of oats per acre. F. M. Totty, living 14 miles from Miami, has raised Indian corn for the past 8 years and never made a failure, or anything like a failure. We could quote many other farmers who have done as well, but we mention these names so that when you stop at Miami and ride out in the country these statements can be verified by the parties named. This character of land can be bought for \$10 to \$25 per acre near railroads, or about one-half this price for lands distant from railroads, in either instance the difference in price in the same grade of land is owing to improvements.

Let us expect many thousand more people will locate in the prosperous Panhandle this fall and winter.

Land in the Panhandle will not depreciate in value and may be classed as a cash asset. Purchase a farm at prevailing prices, cultivate the soil intelligently and live at home if you are interested in the future of your family.

THE CHANGING WEST.

Two years ago if a person had suggested a cotton platform for Miami they would have been given the horse laugh. But the railway is building a commodious platform in Miami for cotton. Something like fifteen hundred bales will probably be shipped from this point this year. This reminds us when the first cotton came in two years ago, our station agent, H. E. Baird, who has been here fifteen years, was working hard to get several five hundred pound bales off the platform in the warehouse to protect them from a threatening rain, believing it would ruin the cotton to get wet. Just an illustration to show the experience the people meet in the changing of a country. Intimation of a flour mill for Miami three or four years ago would have been pronounced idle talk.
