HAT A GOVERNMENT AUTHORITY SAYS ABOUT COTTON IN THE PANHANDLE.

Oswold Wilson, of the United States Deartment of Agriculture, says: "If the proper efforts are put forth I do not believe that the oll weevil will ever become a serious pest in the Panhandle of Texas and that section will ecome the most important cotton producing section of the South."

While the past year has been a record breaker n the upbuilding of the Panhandle the coming year will no doubt mark a greater change long this line than ever witnessed before in

The American Stock Farmer says: "There no place in the United States where fertile and tillable land can be bought so cheap as in he Panhandle. Such, however, will not be ne case very long, as many progressive farmin the North and East have discovered this agricultural Eldorado and are selling their holdings at \$40 to \$100 per acre and buying land here at \$10 to \$25."

It is estimated that Texas will have seven million population by the census of 1910 at he present rate of increase. A goodly portion of them will be in the Panhandle section.

"If cotton brings about 10 cents for the next en years," said a thoughtful business man in North Carolina the other day, "the South will again become, as it was before the war, the most prosperous section of our country. I know of no industry in the world which will yield larger returns, in proportion to the capital and the intelligence required, than cotton growing 10 cents per pound." How to Put On Gloves. Open and turn back the gloves to the thumb and powder lightly. 


