WORK OF THE YEAR

STATISTICAL REPORT AS TO COUNTRY'S RAILWAYS.

Total Mileage Shows Enormous In crease-Large Additions to Locomotives and Care in the Service-The Salary List.

An abstract based on summaries in cluded in the eighteenth annual statistical report of the interstate commerce commission for the year ending June 30, 1905, has been issued by the commission giving the mileage and capitalization of railroads and treating of equipment, employes, capitalization of railway property, public service of railways, earnings and expenses and railwa; accidents.

The report shows that the total single track railway mileage June 30. 1905, was 218,101.04 miles, an increase of 4.196.70 over the previous year. The aggregate length of mileage, including tracks of all kinds, was 306,796.74 miles. These figures show increase of 9,723.40 miles in the aggregate length of track of all kinds, of which 35.48 per cent. was extension of yard track and sidings. The report represents 2,167 corporations.

On June 30, 1905, 48,357 locomotives were in service, an increase of 1,614. Of this number 27,869 were freight engines. Cars of all classes in service numbered 1.842,871, an increase of 44,310. This census does not include cars of private corporations. Of this number 1,731,409 were freight cars and 70,749 were in company serv-

Of the total of locomotives and cars in service, 1,641,395 were fitted with train brakes, an increase of \$5,623. Of the total, 1,871,590 were fitted with automatic couplers, an increase of 48,560. Passenger service stock was nearly all equipped with train brakes, and al! but \$2 locomotives had automatic couplers. Nearly all of the freight locomotives had train brakes and automatic couplers, and a large proportion of the cars in the service were equipped with train brakes and automatic couplers.

The immensity of the wage propoployes were on the rolls for every 100 miles of line, a total of 1,382,195. total, 54,817 were enginemen, 57,892 tenders. The total salaries paid was \$839,944,680.

On June 30, 1905, the par value of standing was \$3,805,258,121, or a capitalization of \$65.926 per mile for the railways in the United States.

The total number of casualties to persons on the railways for the year was 95,711, of which 9,703 represented persons killed and 86,008 injured. Casnalties occurred among three general classes of railway employes as follows: Trainmen, 1,990 killed and 29. 853 injured; switch tenders, crossing There were 341 passengers killed and tenders and watchmen, 136 killed, 883 injured; other employes, 1,235 killed, 36,097 injured.

The number of passengers killed in 1905 was 537 and the number injured 10,457. In the previous year 441 passengers were killed and 9,111 injured. There were 341 passengers killed and 6,953 injured because of cellisions and derailments. The total number of persons other than employes and passengers killed was 5,805; injured, 8,718. These figures include the casualties to persons trespassing, of whom 4.865 were killed and 5,351 were injured. The total number of casualties to persons other than employes from being struck by trains, locomotives or cars was 4,569 killed and 4,163 injured. One trainman was killed for every 133 employed, and 1 was injured for every 9 employed.



"The time of year has come when, in accordance with the wise custom factory at Manchester, England. The of our forefathers, it becomes my daty to set aside a special day of thanksgiving and praise to the Almigaty because of the bressings we have recived, and of prayer that these blessings may be continued. Yet another year of widespread well being has passed. Never before in our history or in the history of any other nation has a people enjoyed more abounding material prosperity than is ours; a prosperity so great that it should arouse in us no spirit of reckless pride and least of all a spirit of needless disregard of our responsibilities; but rather a sober sense of our many blessings, and a resolute purpose, under providence, not to forieit them by any action of our own.

"Material well being, indispensable though it is, can never be anything but the foundation of true national greatness and happiness. If we build nothing upon this foundation then our national life will be as meaningless and empty as a house where only the foundation has bear laid. Upon our material well being must be built a superstructure of individual with the laws of the highest morality, or else our prosperity itself will in stead of a blessing. We should be both reverently thankful for what we have received and carnestly bent up on turning it into a means of grace and not of destruction.


