CARNEY SWEEP BY FLAMES.

A Blizzard 500 Miles Wide Doing Business Here.

Fort Worth, Tex., Jan. 25.—Reports here by the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company indicate that a blizzard is raging across a territory 500 miles in width. The blizzard extends from Oklahoma City, where sleet is falling, thence in a southwesterly direction across the table lands of the Panhandle to Big Springs, about 300 miles west of this city, on the Texas and Pacific, where it is bitterly cold, with a combined sleet and snowstorm in progress, accompanied by a stiff north wind.

San Marcos to Be Site of New Baptist Academy.

San Marcos, Tex., Jan. 25.—This city is rejoicing over the unexpected good fortune which came to it through the change of plans for the erection of a Baptist academy here. The original plan was for the construction of a \$50,000 building, but at the meeting of the trustees held here Tuesday, Dr. Carroll submitted plans for the construction of buildings to cost at \$100,000 as the first investment. The matter was thoroughly discussed and finally adopted unanimously, and enthusiastically. The change of plans is due to the fact that Dr. Carroll has received sufficient encouragement from persons of means to justify him in concluding that the erection of the larger plan can be accomplished more easily than a smaller one.

Negro School Breaks Dirt for Library.

Marshall: Ground was broken a few days ago for the library at Wiley University. The new building will be 75x45 feet square, two stories high, built of pressed brick and stone trimmings on a concrete foundation. The upper floor will be used as an assembly room and the library and reading room will be on the ground floor. An drew Carnegie gave the university \$15,000 to build the building if they would equip and maintain it.

Japs Coming to Texas.

Eagle Pass: Two hundred and eighty Japanese came into the United States Saturday from Japan. They have no particular destination. Many of them are dressed in fragments of Japanese uniforms and many in full uniforms and provided with fine army coats. All have a liberal supply of funds. In getting exchange they displayed very little Mexican money, but had considerable Japanese money, clearly showing that they had not been in Mexico very long.

Prominent Newspaper Man dead.

San Antonio: Frank Grier, owner and manager of the San Antonio Daily Express, died in the Hot Wells Sanitarium, after a lingering illness of several weeks. Mr. Grier was stricken about a year ago and his life was despaired of, but he rallied and was a short time seemingly restored to his usual health. About a month ago he suffered a second attack and had not been able to leave his bed since that time.

Barrel Belonging to Alex M. Anderson of Hillsboro burned Tuesday night and three valuable horses were burned to death in the building.

Shot in Hotel Lobby.

Dallas: Albert S. Johnson, a traveling salesman of the Rock Island Plow Company, was shot and critically injured Tuesday evening shortly after 6 o'clock in the lobby of the St. George Hotel. W. O. Brown, president of the Brown Wuggy Company, was later arrested at his home on a warrant charging assault with intent to murder. His bond was fixed at \$1,000, which he gave.

Want Long Staple Seed.

Clarksville: Several orders for long staple cotton are still being received daily by farmers in the vicinity of Clarksville. Hundreds of bushels of the seed have been shipped to practically all portions of Texas during the past month, and while the local supply is now very limited, but little decrease is noticeable in the number of orders received. A majority of the seed has been sold at \$1 per bushel.

Died on the Train.

Orange: A sad death was that of Mrs. Bettie Walker, who breathed her last just as passenger train No. 8 pulled up to the water tank at Orange Thursday, and on which train she deceased was en route with relatives from Uvalde, to her home in Bellemeek, Tenn. Mrs. Walker had, with her husband and sister, been to Uvalde for her health, she having been a sufferer from tuberculosis.

Turkey Raisers Do Well.

Waco: From two to three carloads of turkeys are being shipped out of here every week now, consigned chiefly to Chicago. These turkeys are dressed and scores of negroes are finding work picking the fowls. The demand seems to be steady and farmers are making the raising of turkeys a part of their business and are doing well. Turkeys, too, are fierce enemies of boll weevils.

Bad Wreck near Brownwood.

Brownwood: A bad wreck occurred at 7:15 Sunday morning when a train on the Frisco went in the ditch, ten miles north of Brownwood and four miles south of the first station, Delaware. The train was making good time and is said to have been running at thirty miles an hour when the rails spread and all the coaches went in the ditch except the Pullman. Some twenty persons were more or less seriously injured.
