Runaway Cycle Takes Six Lives.

Newark, N. Y., Sept. 8.—Eddie Hasha of Waco, Texas, holder of several world's records for motorcycle racing, plunged over the rail of the course at the Newark motor-drome into a crowd late this afternoon, causing the death of six persons, including himself, while six are dying and thirteen are badly injured.

The only two of the six dead positively identified up to a late hour tonight were Hasha and Johnny Albright, a Denver motorcycleist, who was riding third in the race. The other four dead were boys and young men among the spectators.

Five thousand spectators were witnessing the finish of a four-mile free for all race when the daring Texas rider, going ninety-two miles an hour, took his fatal plunge. He was riding high on the bank of the track when the wheel of his heavy machine swerved and struck the upper rail. He was pitched head first fifty feet into the air. He must have been instantly killed in the collision.

His body was shapeless from broken bones when it was picked up almost at the feet of his wife, seated among men and boys in the bleachers.

Albright was thrown head first in the other direction into the inclosure of the track, when the champion's wheel came sliding down the steep bank and struck him. He was picked up for dead but he lived in an unconscious state for more than two hours after removal to a hospital. He finally succumbed to hemorrhage of the lungs.

James B. McNamara Is Operated Upon.

San Quentin, Cal., Sept. 8.—James B. McNamara, serving a life sentence in San Quentin prison here for murder in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building, was operated on Thursday at the prison hospital for appendicitis. This became known today with the announcement that he would recover.

McNamara was released from solitary confinement about six weeks ago.

The Spirit of Masonry.

It was but a dewdrop hanging from the finger of the Great Author. And yet it was a world set apart for the use of mortal man and dedicated in the presence of angels to the universal brotherhood.

It has even been a stronghold of rectitude and justice, catching glints (even thru the quagmires of the superstitions of heathen nations, or the jungles of obscure faiths) of that celestial light which must endure forever and forever."

Negroes Attack Posse Of Officers.

Brooksville, Fla., Sept. 8.—Eleven negro prisoners were rescued from three deputy sheriffs 8 miles from here this afternoon by a band of armed negroes, who fired and slightly wounded two of the officers. A posse has gone in pursuit of the negroes and a serious clash is feared.

Deputies Neal Law, Bertie and Lawrence Smith left here last night to go to a turpentine still to arrest negro gamblers. They made a raid early this morning and started to Brooksville with their prisoners. They had not proceeded far when they were attacked by an armed band of negroes bent on rescuing the eleven prisoners, all of whom were handcuffed together.

The officers with the prisoners sought refuge in a house which was quickly surrounded by the negroes. Not less than a hundred shots were fired into the house, both Smith brothers receiving loads of buckshot in their feet. The officers made their escape after dark and came here to report the trouble. In this event the negroes show fight it is expected that a pitched battle will result.

Treatment of Seed Wheat to Prevent Smut.

During the past season a great deal of smut has developed in the wheat crop, which has caused serious loss to the growers. It not only causes a loss in yield but also in the selling price. It is safe to say that the grower of smutty wheat does not receive over one half the profits from it that would come from clean wheat.

By carefully looking over the wheat field at maturing time, heads may be found which have been entirely destroyed. The wheat kernels have become nothing more than a black mass of spores. When the crop is threshed, many of these spores cling to the grain and are carried back to the wheat field at seeding time. Soon after the wheat kernel germinates, the smut spores also germinate. The germinated spore or fungus develops a thread like structure which enters the wheat plant. This does not appear to damage the wheat plant very much during its growing period but it is there, ready for work, as soon as the wheat heads appear.

There are two kinds of wheat smut, loose smut and stinking smut. Both can be prevented by treating the seed and rotating the crops. The spores of both kinds of smut are carried by the seed, but the spores of loose smut may also be carried in the soil from one year to another. Treating the seed prevents stinking smut, but loose smut requires that the seed be treated and that the ground on which it grew be planted to another crop the following year. The stinking smut is the kind most commonly found, it destroys the kernels only, while the loose smut destroys the grain and chaff entirely, and the sooty mass of spores remain. The stinking smut gives off an offensive odor when broken.

The following "Formalin Treatment" will prevent stinking smut in the wheat also the smuts which commonly affect barley and oats.

Formalin Treatment—There are several methods of treatment. Hot water treatment, blue stone treatment and Formalin Treatment, the last of which is safest, most reliable and cheapest.

Secure a 40 per cent. solution of formalin at a reliable drug store. One pound of formalin is sufficient to treat from 2,000 to 2,500 pounds of wheat. Before mixing the solution get the seed wheat ready. The treating solution is made by care-

fully mixing one pound bottle of the formalin with 40 gallons of water.

The seed may be treated by dipping or sprinkling. To dip, the seed may be placed in a gunny sack and the solution in a barrel or tank. The wheat should be immersed in this for at least ten minutes and then taken out and allowed to drain back into the barrel for a short time. The wheat should then be emptied into a pile in a clean place and covered with sacks or blankets for two hours, after which it should be thoroughly dried before sowing.

To sprinkle prepare a clean place on a canvas or smooth floor. Thoroughly sprinkle the place with the solution before spreading the wheat on it. Now thoroughly sprinkle the spread-out wheat and at the same time shovel it over. Continue to sprinkle and shovel over the wheat until it is thoroughly moistened. Next shovel the wheat into a pile and cover with sacks or blankets for two hours, after which it should be thoroughly dried before sowing. Do not allow the wheat to remain wet too long after treating, as the germinating qualities may be injured.

Place the dried wheat in sacks

which have been dipped in the solution. It is also advisable to sprinkle the grain drill with the solution before using it. Exercise every precaution not to bring the treated seed in contact with any that has not been treated or in bins which have contained smut wheat. The wheat should be treated but a short time before sowing it.

See to it, parents, that the teachers have your support in this great work.

UNCOOKED FOOD LATEST FAD

Advocates of Idea Say Nature Should Be Allowed to Do What Cooking Is Necessary.

Going back to first principles, the latest food fad is uncooked or sun cooked food. The advocates of this idea say that "before the use of fire primitive man took his sustenance as birds and wild animals still do, and there is evidence that he had better teeth, a harder body and was exempt from many of the ailments from which people suffer today." Therefore they urge that nature should be allowed to do whatever cooking is necessary.

"In all nature," say these people, "every animal but man finds food ready prepared. Then why should human beings boil and roast and fry and in the end be worse off than those that eat raw food? In fact we have eaten some kinds of uncooked food for years, and so the step to a complete diet is not great.

"Lettuce, tomatoes, celery and fresh fruits are all uncooked. They are not predigested so that the stomach is not deprived of its rightful tasks. The real fact is that uncooked food calls for strong organs, and while it calls for strong organs it produces them. No lion or tiger or cow has cooked food; no fish requires it; no bird or flower gets a boiled dinner. Why should we?"

Calls Out Montenegrin Army.

London: King Nicholas of Montenegro has called out the whole of his army, and there is great excitement on the frontier, where fighting proceeds, as though war has been declared. Both sides have suffered heavy losses, according to reports, which are urging the Porte to settle the quarrel. King Nicholas has signed a decree of mobilization and it is feared that Austria has occupied Novipazas, east of Montenegro.

State Department Budget.

Austin, Texas: The State Department estimates its needs for the next two fiscal years at \$50,000. The last appropriation was \$33,580, and Secretary McDonald includes in the requested increase the creation of the office of Inspector of Corporations, with \$1,800 salary and \$1,200 expenses allowance; an additional employe as cashier and general clerk, with \$1,500 salary, and an additional stenographer at \$1,200, extra help \$1,800 a year, a sistant bookkeeper \$1,200 a year.

American Starved for Funds.

El Paso, Texas: Two American officials of the Mulatos mine at Dolores, Sonora, are being carried by the rebels now invading that State is the statement of American arrivals at Douglas, Arizona. The rebels demand \$40,000 and are slowly starving the prisoners to enforce payment of the sum. Arrivals from the west coast say the rebels there are inflicting such terrible indignities upon their own people that it is foolish for American women to remain and risk similar treatment.

Sunday School Workers Plan State Wide Visitation Sept. 28, 1912. September 29, Rally Day Of All Sunday Schools.

Plans are being made in every county and city, under the direction of the Texas Sunday School Association, for a house to house visitation, in the interest of the various churches and Sunday Schools, Catholics, Jews and Gentiles will work together. People will be extended an invitation to attend the Church, Synagogue and Sunday School of their choice.

The plan is to have every city and county divided into districts, with competent supervisors over each district and when the time arrives every one will be at his or her post, and will go two and two up and down the streets previously assigned to them, courteously securing the information desired, also leaving an invitation inviting the people to the church of their choice.

The visitors will be at work in the interest of every church, and will never be permitted to invite anyone to their own church, but to the church they are already inclined toward. The visitors will not tell which church they are from.

The visitors will find out who and where people are, what church and Sunday School they prefer, getting the ages of the children and such other information.

The visitors will meet at the close of the visitation at some appointed place in the district. Then the cards will be carefully looked over and distributed to the ministers of the churches which the people have expressed a desire to attend.

The local churches are expected to have previously organized a force of local visitors sufficiently large to look after every card turned over to them, and immediately they will call and extend a personal invitation to these parties who do not attend any church or Sunday School, and they will continue to call upon and keep in touch with them until they have secured every one as a member of their church, or at least an attendant.

Local churches will have special committees to meet and help the strangers get acquainted who will be at their church on Rally Day, Sept. 29.

This is not a new plan. It has been thoroughly tried out in many cities. Texas has held several state visitations before, so with the experience of the past, this promises to be the best and most thorough campaign ever made.

Richmond, Virginia, held a Home Visitation last May. It took one hour to complete the work. They had enlisted over four thousand six hundred men and women to help in the campaign. The Governor of Virginia issued a proclamation endorsing the movement; the Mayor of Richmond issued a proclamation recommending that all employes be excused for the work; the Board of Education declared a half holiday in all the city schools; the Chamber of Commerce, the Clearing House Association and Business Men's Club endorsed the movement. Bishops, Priests, Rabbis, Ministers, Doctors, Lawyers and Bankers helped the campaign. Kansas City met with much the same results and all were enthusiastic over the success.

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WATER SUPPLY ON DRY FARM

Plant for Average Home Need Not Be Elaborate or Extensive to Be Convenient.

(By PROF. E. S. KIENE, Dean of Engineering, North Dakota Agricultural College.)

An adequate and well arranged water supply system contributes to the comfort and well being of the family to a greater measure than any other form of household convenience. Such a system not only lightens the burden of household drudgery, but adds immeasurably to the contentment of those who enjoy its service. When there is added to the convenience of such a plant that of a system of sewage disposal, the equipment becomes as complete as can be obtained where city water supply and sewer service is available. That plants of this kind are in general use is a matter of common knowledge, and that they are successful in service is attested by the number of companies engaged in their manufacture.

A water supply plant for the average home need not be elaborate or expensive in order to be convenient. The water may be taken from any suitable source of supply, and the plant may be made to suit the available conditions, no matter what they may be.

The system is simple in construction, not at all difficult to operate, and contains all of the essentials necessary to the demands of the average home.

The source of supply is a rain water cistern sunk below the level of the basement floor, the top of which extends above the level of the floor. The water is pumped from the cistern by a common tank pump and forced into the pressure tank, where it furnishes a supply of water as desired. The tank is an upright cylinder made perfectly tight and constructed to withstand the necessary pressure required to perform its service. It may be galvanized as a precaution against rust, but this is not absolutely necessary.

The pipe which conveys the water from the pump enters the tank near the bottom, and as the water enters the contained air is compressed into the decreasing space above its surface. The pressure developed by the compressed air furnishes the force by which the water is driven out of the tank and through the distributing pipes as the supply is demanded. If the air of the tank when empty of water is compressed until it occupies one-half of its original volume, then the pressure will be twice the original pressure, which in this case will be about 15 pounds to the square inch. The higher the water rises in the tank the greater will be the pressure developed. This may be as high as 125 pounds to the square inch if occasion requires, but 40 pounds pressure is generally sufficient for all the requirements usually demanded in a house plant.

The plant is relatively inexpensive, simple to operate and gives the house a supply of water that furnishes every necessary convenience. Modifications may be made to suit any condition or size, location or source of water supply.

MEANING OF "AT HALF MAST"

At First Universal Symbol Was Token of Submission and Respect For Enemy.

Perhaps you have noticed that whenever a prominent person dies, especially if he is connected with the government, the flags on public buildings are hoisted only part of the way up, remarks the Toronto Mail and Express. This is called "half mast." Did you ever stop to think what connection there could be between a flag that was not properly hoisted and the death of a great man?

Ever since flags were used in war it has been the custom to have the flag of the superior or conquering nation above that of the inferior or vanquished. When an army found itself hopelessly beaten it hauled its flag down far enough for the flag of the victors to be placed above it on the same pole. This was a token not only of submission, but of respect.

In those days when a famous soldier died flags were lowered out of respect to his memory. The custom long ago passed from purely military usage to public life of all kinds, the flag flying at half mast being a sign that the dead man was worthy of universal respect. The space left above it is for the flag of the great conqueror of all—the angel of death.

MANY BENEFITS FROM SHEEP

No Kind of Live Stock That Can Be Handled More Advantageously With Dry Farming.

(By W. F. STEVENS, Live Stock Commissioner of Alberta.)

There is no kind of live stock that can be handled as advantageously in connection with extensive grain growing in a dry-farming country as can sheep.

This is due to one fundamental fact—the large number of weeds that sheep will eat. Of the 300 grasses and weeds known in Canada, sheep will eat 260. Horses and cattle will eat only about one-fourth that number.

The most serious problem confronting the average grain farmer in Western Canada today is the weed problem. While the weed problem can be handled by proper cultivation, this cultivation can be greatly facilitated by keeping the right kind of animals on the land, and in addition to solving the weed problem the productiveness of the soil will also be maintained.

Anything that will destroy weeds is worthy of the farmer's attention; anything that will maintain the fertility of the land demands his attention. Sheep will do both, and are therefore entitled to the attention of every grain grower in a dry-farming country.

A winning lottery ticket of \$100,000, in connection with the Nobles Bank was recently presented for payment at the State Bank in St. Petersburg, and it now transpires that the owner is an eight-year-old orphan, an inmate of the Orphanage at Pskoff. The lottery ticket was her sole possession. Her relatives have hitherto done nothing for the child, but when the news of her good fortune became known they were one and all eager to adopt her. The authorities have placed her in the charge of an arch-priest, a distant connection of her father.

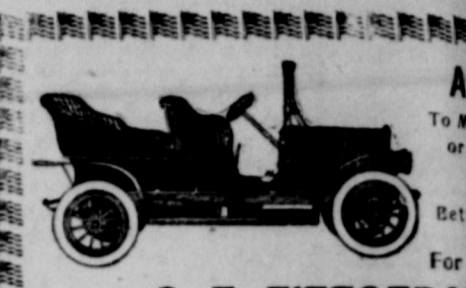
