LIOMIZ TOWN BACKACHE

AMERICA MIGHT COPY THESE

English Towns and Villages Shown to Be Far Ahead of Those of This Country.

Those who read the report of the Stanley investigating committee, which arraigned the methods of the United States Steel corporation in dealing with its employes, will be impressed by an account of an English village, which was printed recent-ly in the Yorkshire Observer of Bradford, Englanl. The condition of the average small wage earner in the mine and factory districts of the United States is not enviable. Social surveys have afforded the general public opportunities to study the way in which these poorer Americans live. In contrast is the successful experiment conducted by the Yorkshire Main colliery at Edlington, near Doncaster, England.

Land near the mine was sold to a reputable land development company. which in turn sells or leases plots to private builders. The latter are required to conform to a sanitary and architecturally pleasing plan approved by the colliery company. The site of the village is 120 feet above the sea level. On one hand is a picnicking woods and on the other hunting grounds and the picturesque cliff of Levitt Hagg. The streets are wide and have grass plots and trees in the center. There are ample yards, the business houses are confined to one particular district and space has been allotted to four churches. Two recreation grounds have been laid out with a combined area of four acres. In the center of another four acres is the village school. At present there are 850 cottages, but with an addition under way, the number will soon be increased to 1,400.-Indianapolis News.

CO-OPERATION IN RURAL LIFE

Governor of Oregon Has Appointed a Commission Which Seems to Promise Good Results.

The governor of Oregon has appoint-

ed a "Rural Life Commission" of 15 members, four of them women. Its slogan is "co-operation," which at the very outset is applied to good roads, betterment in housing, improvement in in farm products and marketing. better teachers and increased pay for them, one church for one community, and a lot of things which would not FAD FOR MASCOT JEWELRY and a lot of things which would be be attempted by the individual. I have in mind several cities near here that have spent all of their money, bonded themselves to the utmost, and are now practicallly bankrupt, having exhausted their resources for expensive paving, wrote Daniel H. Burnham. Their death rates are high, yet they can do nothing for their people, because of their orgies of street building. They have no health department, no hospitals, no laboratories, no school inspection, no building inspection, no anything which runs straight to the welfare of the people, because of their street im-



IMMENSE DAMAGE BY DROUTH

Much Loss Could Be Averted by Paying More Attention to Conservation of Soil Moisture.

The damage directly attributable to drought represent an enormous annual loss to farmers. If we would devote more attention to the work of conserving soil moisture during the spring and early summer, the summer droughts would be far less destructive to our growing crops.

There are few seasons when there is not sufficient moisture to mature good crops if proper methods are employed in handling our soils so that the moisture will not be lost through evaporation, during the primary growth of the crops.

The growth of crops should not be retarded at a time when it is within our power to provide them with moisture.

The average farmer begins every spring with an average supply of moisture in his soils to supply the crops through a rainless season, but most of our farms the lack of drainage and indifference to the conservation of moisture reduces the yield of crops.

After the soil moisture has been allowed to evaporate we are powerless to provide a new supply for the crops that have been robbed. Summer draughts can be avoided in no other way than by improving the waterholding capacity of the soils and shaping the methods of tillage and cultivation so that we may prevent the loss of the moisture with which they are saturated at the beginning of the season.

On many soils under-drainage is necessary and will produce wonderful changes in the character of the soil. It improves its action toward heat, light, penetration or roots, and the implements used in preparation and cultivation and stimulates bacterial action, which we are just beginning to appreciate as an important factor in soil fertility.

GOOD OF SILO ON DRY FARM

Saves All Corn Grown From Roots to Tassel and Adds 50 Per Cent. to Value of Crop.

(By PROF, ROY C. POTTS, Dairying Ex-pert, Oklahoma Agricultural College.) A silo saves all the corn you grow in the hill, from the roots to the tassel It saves the part of the crop that evaporates, dries up and blows away when you shock the corn. It adds 40 the old way of harvesting. When corn is stored in a silo you can feed it at any time.

A silo should be filled at a time when the corn is at its best, and if left in the field longer would lessen its value. You have your corn crop where it can the class, be fed this year, or next, or in three years from now, with no loss by age. The total cost of filling a silo is only one-half of the cost of shucking the

corn crop. None of the silage is wasted or refused by the stock-they relish it every day in the year. A man with a silo is independent of

wet and dry weather, poor pasture and late springs-and he will have an abundance of good, succulent feed for the entire year. The silo is the insurance that should

be taken against scarcity of feed. Kafir corn for the silo can be grown in the southwest during the most severe drougth. Invest in a silo and insure your stock against drought. If you keep live stock-and every

farmer who has 25 acres of land should-make arrangements to build a silo and plant corn to fill it. You can plant a crop to fill it and build the silo any time convenient.

Wet Mashes for Poultry.

The wet mash as feed for poultry is fast going out of fashion. It requires too much time to prepare it and handle it There is more or less danger in feeding moist ground food. It is apt to sour and ferment in the crop, causing indigestion and more serious intestinal poisons.

The dry mash serves the needs of the fowls, and when fowls accustom themselves to eating it they seem to relish it more. Provided the dry mash kept under cover it is clean and wholesome until eaten by the fowls.



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
