### Santa Fe Demonstration Train to Miami, Nov. 11th

Ladies and Gentlemen Invited

Seeking to increase the production from the soil here and all along its lines in and out of Texas, the Santa Fe System is branching broadly into various methods looking to educating and assisting the farmers directly, knowing that incidental gain will be its reward. As a foreword step in this movement a special Educational - Agricultural train has been scheduled to arrive in Miami for a meeting with the people of this city and surrounding country, Tuesday, from 9 to 10:33 a. m., Nov. 11.

Mr. Bainer will talk on 'Better Tillage Methods' including kindred themes, setting forth means for increased production as well as was for handling the products to best advantage. It is true that Mr. Bainer is so well known that he needs no introduction to our people, and yet it is but simple justice to call attention to the fact that his recommendations are based upon actual demonstrations and practice-proven facts instead of theories. Farming is his hobby, and he has tried it out by actually working among the crops, so that anything he may say will have worth behind it.

'Poultry on the Farm' is the subject announced for Mr. L. L. Jackson, poultry expert and agricultural demonstrator from the Amarillo office of the department. Mr. Johnson has long been engaged in the poultry business and comes to his task in connection with the Santa Fe's work with a condensation of best advice and advice to all who would grow fowls for profit.

Mr. J. D. Tinsley, agricultural demonstrator for the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe of Brownwood, will talk on 'dairying and Silos,' giving instructions on how to feed and handle dairy and stock cattle. His talk will include directions on the making of butter and other details.

A real treat has been secured for the ladies of Miami and all who attend this meeting in the form of two lecturers from the domestic science and home management of the Texas University. These ladies will speak to ladies only in a car provided for that purpose, giving plans through which the attractiveness of the home may be greatly enhanced, health conserved and economy installed. They will have on hand a number of printed booklets containing rules, receipts and suggestions, applicable to the management and administration of home affairs. Ladies missing this treat will have cause for regretting it.

Mr. J. L. Pope, chief clerk in the department will act as a bureau of information and will have charge of the publicity work of the train.

This train will carry dairy cows and equipment, silos and their equipment, poultry and equipment, together with other interesting matter. Diversified bulletins will be distributed.

The train is scheduled to be at Mendota Nov. 10 from 3:50 to 5:20 and stop over for the night in Miami.

We want to see a large crowd in attendance and you people who tell the younger ones to get all the education they can, practice what you preach and be here. This is a free education for you.

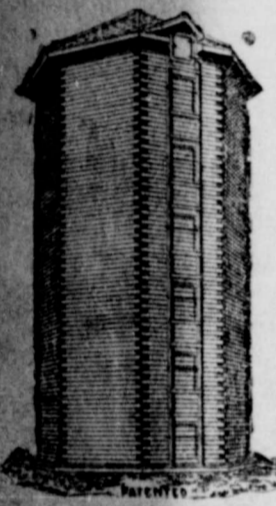
