Waco, Texas. July --- The school population of the state of Texas, for the year ending in June 1912 was 1,280,597, according to a report which has just of Education, Department of Interior. This includes children between the ages of five and eighteen years. The number of children enrolled during the year, was 830,642, and the av rage daily attendance was 560, ous complaints as to dust and 173. The average duration of the school for the season was 132 days. It requires the ser vices of 22,042 teachers to in struct Texas school children, and according to the report, 15. 588 of them are females and 6. 455 are males. The saleries of teachers for one season aggregate \$9,815,000 and the total expenditure for the term is \$14. 498,000.

CONSERVATION OF MOISTURE

Surface of Soil Must Be Kept Loose to Take Care of Rain as Rapidly as It Descends.

(By W. H. STEVENSON, Copyright, 1914.) From two hundred and seventy-five to six hundred tons of water are required to produce one ton of dry matter for most of our common farm crops. In many portions of the United States the rainfall during the growing months is not sufficient to supply these large amounts of water to the crops. This fact lays stress upon two thingsnamely, the importance of large water supplies in the soil not as stagnant waosse. A committee is making ar- ter, but as capillary water, which is angements for the ground on which for the most part available for growing plants, and also the importance of the conservation of this soil water.

The first step in conserving soil moisture is to have and keep the surface of the soil in such condition that most of the rainfall will be received into it and will be carried by gravitation to the lower zones, where the water supply is held until later called exarkana destroyed about 20,000 rail. into use. Whenever the surface of the oad ties valued at between \$8,000 and soil is baked or run together and impervious it is practically certain that a large portion of every rain will not get into the soil, but is lost because of surface drainage. An effort should be made to hold the rains of the entire year, those of the fall and winter and early spring as well as those of the growing season. Fall plowing helps to put the surface in condition to take up the rainfall. The hardened crust is broken, and water enters freely. Moreover, the ridges and hollows of the plowed surface act as basins, which hold snow and rain until they soak into the soil. The second step in soil moisture conservation is to save the water which ssed the senate and carries an ap- has entered the soil. This can best be done by cultivation. The reason is this water is carried from the lower zones of the soil by capillarity. It rises in the soil from soil particle to soil particle, and finally it reaches the surface of the soil and is lost by evaporation unless the upward movement is checked by some agency. Now, cultivation creates this agency-namely, a soil mulch. The principle of moisture conservation by mulches is well established. There is no practical method for saving soil moisture except by the use of the mulch.

GREEN MANURE IS VALUABLE

Owing to the ease and quickness with which these green crops may be decomposed, the stimulation of the independent free nitrogen fixing bacteria is brought about much sooner than with dry material that is coarse and difficult to decompose.

If, during a dry spell, the green manure is added in very great quantities, excessive evaporation may result. Experiments have shown that the acid produced in the soil from this kind of manuring is not great enough to prevent nitrification.

The farmer must use judgment in selecting the most economical crop for this purpose in his particular section. The one giving a luxuriant growth of leaves and costing but little to grow is desirable. A nonleguminous plant is as valuable in stimulating the free nitrogen fixing organisms, pound for pound, as the plants of the leguminous family. The fact that a plant is not from the legume family does not keep it from being of value as manure. This form of manuring bids fair to receive a great deal more of attention in the near future.

IMPROVING STATE HIGHWAYS

Chairman of Maryland Roads Commission Suggests That Local Organizations Plant Trees.

When the question as to whether the state roads commission has made or is expecting to make provision for planting trees and placing watering troughs along the improved state highways was put directly up to the chairman of the commission, the answer was that nothing had been done by the commission in the way of such improvements, says the Baltimore American. The clause in the state road law pertaining to the planting of trees and the placing of watering tanks along the improved roads authorizes the commission to make such betterments, but is not mandatory in this respect. The chairman of the commission suggests that local organizations should look after the tree planting and horse watering.



TWELVE MILLION SOLDIERS MAY BE IN CONFLICT

General European Struggle Would Make Wars of Napoleonic Era Small.

SERVIA NOT TO BE DESPISED

Little Country Has Large Army of Veteran Fighters-Germany's Wonderful War Machine in Readiness to Begin War at a Moment's Notice.

Americans unacquainted with the elaborate military organizations of foreign powers can have but little idea of the tremendous number of combatants who would be involved in any general European war which might arise from Austria's imbroglio with Servia. Austria, large as she is in territory and Nopulation, does not outnumber Servia is available trained men so heavily as night be expected. But the seriousnuss of the situation lies in the fact that, once hostilities between the two principals begin, a general war might be inevitable. And it is safe to say that not even the Napoleonic wars rent the fabric of European civilization as would a war between the powers of the triple entente and the triple alli-

Always supposing that Russia makes good her reported threat to aid Servia in case the Austrians persist in going to extremes, it is believed that Germany and Italy would come to their ally's assistance. In such a circumstance, it is assumed that Great Britain and France, the two remaining powers in the triple entente, would not permit their ally, Russia, to fight such a serious battle alone. This might mean the arraying of Russia, France and Britain-and possibly Rumaniaon the side of Servia, and Germany and Italy on the side of Austria, with the possibility that the other Balkan nations and Turkey may be dragged into the quarrel.

Austria's Fighting Forces.

Austria's army is credited with a peace strength of 415,000 men and 1,880 guns, which the first-line reserves would increase in a few days to \$20,000 men. Behind these could be mustered hundreds of thousands of men of varying ages who have had some military training, and who would fill the gaps in the field army. Little Servia can mobilize all of her male population trained to bear arms to the number of 324,000 in a fortnight's time. although she maintains only 36,000 men in time of peace. As Austria must guard her Russian frontier and leave some troops in the great Slav areas of her own territory to restrain outbursts of revolution, it can be seen that any army she might attempt to throw across the Danube into Serviawould not be of overwhelming strength. Then, too, the Servian army is largely composed of veterans. with a splendid morale, and a record of first-rate achievement in the Balkan

Germany's field army in time of war numbers 1,220,000 men, and her entire system of mobilization and strategy is based upon an invasion of France and a simultaneous resistance to a Russian attack upon her back door. Behind this field army stands an active reserve of 600,000 men of the Landwehr, and behind them still 1,500,000 men who have had military training and are available to make good battle losses. Germany's strong point, as opposed to Russia, of course, lies in her superior mobilization. The vast distances which Russian reservists must travel, and the scanty railroads in the czar's empire all tend somewhat to neutralize the preponderance of Russian troops.

On a peace footing, the Russian army numbers 1.384.0.3 men of all corps, distributed over her European and Asiatic possessions. Many of these men would not be available for use in a European war. But military experts concede that Russia could hurl a great army of 1,500,000 men across the German and Austrian frontiers, these men comprising the regular European army corps and the first-line reservists. Behind them, in turn, are several million trained and partly trained men, for use in making up the ravages of battle and disease.

France, too, would be an effective ally of the Servians on land. The French army is a different weapon from what it was in 1870. The active army within continental France is shought to number about 600,000 men, and although France's limited popula- foin," or "holy hay."

tion does not allow her the immense amount of reserve strength which Germany possesses, the outbreak of war would mean the instant increase of the field army to a strength of 1,300,000, which might be still further increased by the recall of troops from Algeria, and drafts from 700,000 trained reservists of the second line.

Strength of Italian Army.

The Italian army is more or less an unknown quantity. Its value to Austria and Germany would consist in its diverting some of France's attention to her southern frontier. On a peace basis, the Italian army consists of slightly more than 300,000 men. The field army in time of war would muster nearly 500,000 men, and could be raised by drafts from the mobile militia to 800.000. Behind these troops stand the territorial militia, partially trained, forming what the French call the levee en masse, more than 2,000,

000 men, mostly of doubtful worth. Needless to say, Great Britain is not expected to count for much in military operations on land in a general European war. Her allies would expect her to smash or bottle up the German fleet, and then lend her navy to assist France in wiping out the Austrian and Italian squadrons in the Mediterranean and Adriatic seas. Doubtless, several divisions of the so-called expeditionary force of the British home army could be sent over to France. But Britain's most efficient help would undoubtedly consist in attempting to destroy the German navy and mercantile marine and in blockading the German ports of the North sea and the Baltic.

Where it would all end the wisest wiseacre could never say, and the industrial and economic havoc such a war would wreak would probably set the world back a half century, at least. Its expense would run into the billions, almost beyond computation. The figures of armies given here, it must be remembered, except in the case of Italy, include only the active army now in service, and the first and second classes of reserves. Every country in Europe which practices conscription contains additional millions of men, young and old, who are re garded as possible food for cannon Within a month between six an twelve millions of men might be engaged .- New York Evening Post.

U.S. to Remain Neutral in Servia-Austrian Crisis

Washington .- In accord with a pol-

icy of absolute neutrality, should the Austro-Servian crisis develop into war, any attempt by any of the interested powers to purchase American warships would be promptly turned down by the United States, in the opinion of officials here.

It was pointed out that the recent sale of the battleships Mississippi and Idaho to Greece could in no manner serve as a precedent for further sale of ships to any European government. These battleships were misfits in the American navy and on that account congress consented to their sale.

President Wilson might issue a proclamation of neutrality which would cleverly set forth just what commerce would be permitted between this country and the parties of the conflict which European chancellories fear is imminent.

two-cent stamp for reply. The illustrations show a five-room bungalow that is very neat in design and very attractive in appearance. Five rooms seem to be about right for a bungalow. It is difficult to crowd in another room without interfering

with the interior arrangement. The size on the ground is 41 feet 6 inches by 29 feet 6 inches, a plain straight-sided house without a projection except the extension window

built out from the large living room. in this style adds a great deal to the appearance of the room. When it is in the winter, carefully built to keep out the cold and wind a seat of this kind opposite an open fire is one of the most artistic as well as one of the most comfortable lounging places ever invented. A great deal of work may be put on this seat, in fact it is necessary to do so in order to make it right. The width, height of seat and the fitting of the windows must be looked to carefully. They reach from the floor to the ceiling, with drawers and shelves all the way up, and the front of the cupboard is closed over with doors. Supplies are bought daily at most summer resorts, the same as in the city, so the large storage rooms are not absolutely necessary. But cupboard conveniences are appreciated in a bungalow the same as in a larger house, and should be provided at the time of building.

The water pipes for the kitchen and for the bathroom are close together, so they may be very short. If the house is to be occupied only in the summer, special attention must be given to placing the pipes in such a way as to facilitate drainage, as they should be so connected as to be easily taken apart, otherwise the frost will split them and cause considerable annoyance and expense. But they may be fitted with drain cocks and put to gether with unions without adding to the first cost.





PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AMENDING SECTION 24, AR-TICLE 3 OF THE CONSTITU TION INCREASING COMPEN-SATION OF THE LEGISLA-TURE AND EXTENDING LENGTH OF REGULAR SES-

(S. J. R. No. 26.)
Senate Joint Resolution.

Joint Resolution proposing an amend-ment to Section No. 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature. Be it resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas: Section 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of State officers, or at a previous general election, in case general election for the State shall be sooner ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejec tion, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to pro osed amendments thereto, it intended to amend Section 24. Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the nay of members of the Legislature and extension of term of regular ses sions, so that the said Section shal read as follows:

The members of the section 24. Legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200.00) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the Legislature is held, payable in equa installments on the twentieth days of January, April, July and October of the year in which the regular session is held, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session helin the year next succeeding that which any regular session is held. addition to said compensation members of each house shall be en titled to mileage going to and return ing from the seat of governmen which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regard less of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of dis tances to each county seat, now of hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular ses sion shall continue until the busines of such session is disposed of.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, at the first general hose favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their bal-lots the words: "For amendments to stitution increasing compensation o the Legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the Legislature."
