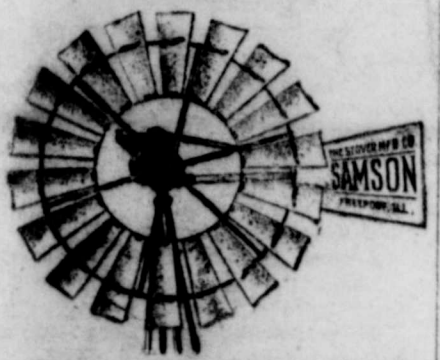

The following story was the best written by Theory class A, and belongs to Tennie Seiber DVORAK

Dvorak was born in Bohemia and died 10 years ago.

Dvorak was a butcher's son and his father also ran a hotel. His father did not want him to be a musician, but a butcher, and his father did not want him to study music, but in that day it was taught in the school, and he persuaded the teacher to give him a few lessons on the violin. While he was studying music he made his living by playing for dances, and churches and weddings. He made about \$9.00 per month. Once there was to be a concert near his home and as he did not have the 4c to get in, he had the drummer to let him slip in and sit in the corner during the concert.

After a while he became a great musician and was then made president of the New York Conservatory. His salary here was \$15,000 per year. While he was here he became interested in negro songs, as he heard them he would write music for them. He wrote "Humoreske", it means a little funny piece, and later he went back to Bohemia where he died, 1904.

Dvorak was born in Bohemia and died ten years ago.

His father was a butcher and a hotel keeper. He wanted his son to be a butcher but Dvorak wanted to be a musician. He went to school where music was taught free and his teacher gave him a few lessons on the violin.

He did not have much time to practice as he had to work in the shop and hotel. He learned mostly by himself, but when he wanted to find out anything he did not know, he would ask, and that is the way he learned music.

One time there was going to be a concert the tickets only cost 4c but he did not have the money and was afraid he would not get to go but he got the man who beat the drum to let him come in and sit down in one corner.

He made his living by playing at dances and weddings and playing and singing in the church.

This amounted to about nine dollars a month. After some time he was invited over to New York as director of the conservatory, his salary to be \$15,000 a year. While here he took great interest in negro melodies and good music out of them.

One day someone asked him which teacher helped him most and he answered "I studied with God, the birds, the trees, the rivers and myself"

Dvorak wrote "Humoreske" which means a little funny. It has been a very popular piece and is thought to be taken from a negro melody.

Dvorak went back to Bohemia and died there in 1904.

The Federal Reserve Banking System

The fundamental change made in our banking system by the Federal Reserve Act of Congress of December 23 1913, is of interest to all of our people. For years the great need for an elastic currency had been felt, but it was necessary that the government should provide safeguard against undue expansion or contraction.

This was done by the creation of the Federal Reserve Board with extensive powers over banking institutions. The U. S. has been divided into twelve districts, which have been apportioned with due regard to the convenience and customary course of business. In each of the districts a federal reserve city has been designated in which a federal reserve bank has been established.

The federal reserve fund in each district is composed of the national banking association in the district and is required to have a capital stock of at least \$4,000,000. In case the national banks in the district fail to take all this stock, private individuals and the U. S. may take it, but the stock will have no voting power. The enforcement of the federal reserve law is trusted in the Federal Reserve Board, consisting of five members appointed by the President of the U. S. in addition to the secretary of the Treasury and the Comptroller of currency, who are ex officio officers of the board. The board has its office in Washington D. C. Two members of the board are required to be experienced bankers. Ten years is the term of office, and every two years the term of one member expires. The salary is \$12,000 a year.

The most important powers and duty of the Federal Reserve Board are to exercise general supervision over federal reserve banks; to suspend temporarily the requirements of the law as to the amount of reserve funds banks shall maintain in their vaults; to regulate the issue and retirement of federal reserve notes, to compel the banks to write off worthless assets from their books, and if need be suspended and wind up and federal reserve bank.

Assisting the Federal Reserve Board is an advisory board composed of members selected by the reserve banks of the twelve districts.

The federal reserve banks have authority to issue circulation notes secured by deposit of two percent government bonds.

The financial situation during the past year or two has been high strung, and it has been the part of wisdom to proceed cautiously in adopting the radical changes brought about by the law. The sudden and unexpected advent of the European war, with its consequent destruction of foreign trade and commerce, has served to place a greater strain upon the country. Already the Federal Reserve Board has shown its usefulness by approval of the plan to raise a \$1,000,000,000 gold pool to maintain our credit abroad. With the closing of the stock exchange there was no way of assembling the financial resources of the country, and the carrying out of the gold plan will doubtless relieve us from embarrassment.

TURKS ASK PEACE; ALLIES MISTRUST

OTTOMAN GOVERNMENT HANDS POWERS APOLOGY FOR ATTACKS BY WARSHIPS.

CAN'T BACK OUT SO EASILY

Entente to Demand Craft Be Taken From Black Sea and the Army From Egypt—France Points Out Turkey Hasn't Been Neutral at All.

London.—The grand vizier of Turkey has apologized on behalf of his government for the warlike operations of the Turkish fleet under German commanders in the Black Sea.

It was disclosed in a statement just issued by the French government that Turkey in reply to a note presented by Russia, France and England on Friday last agreed to recall her fleet from the Black Sea.

There is every reason to believe that, despite the apology of the grand vizier, which it is understood comes from the peace party in the Turkish cabinet and may not be adhered to by Enver Pasha, the minister of war and his young Turk followers.

This would give Russia such superiority in the Black Sea that there would be no danger of Turkish raids. It is suggested also that demobilization of the Turkish army would be demanded, which would mean that those troops which have crossed the Egyptian frontier must be withdrawn.

An added difficulty to the situation is that the ambassadors of the powers have left Constantinople, which will make it troublesome to ascertain whether the whole Turkish cabinet concurs in any agreement reached.

Meanwhile a report comes from Constantinople of the seizure of another Russian steamer and also that Bulgaria, which had been asked to choose the side on which she would fight, had commenced to mobilize her second line troops.

"According to a Constantinople telegram reaching here by way of Berlin," says Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent, "the Russian steamer Korpaljevo Olga was seized at Constantinople recently. A Turkish crew was put aboard the vessel and the Turkish flag hoisted."

RAIL MEN FACE JAIL INDICTMENTS

Twenty Leaders in New Haven Deals Are Indicted Criminally For Violation of Anti-Trust Law.

New York.—A few hours after a federal grand jury issued indictments accusing 20 present and former directors and the former general counsel of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad of criminal violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

It was reported that several of these named in the indictment would claim immunity on the ground that they appeared as witnesses in the investigation of the New Haven's affairs by the interstate commerce commission.

The indictments today were the outcome of a grand jury inquiry which had been in progress for several weeks. Charles S. Mellen, former president of the New Haven and principal witness in this inquiry, was not indicted. His name appears, however, in a list of officers and former directors mentioned as "conspirators." The late J. P. Morgan is named in this bill as one of the "conspirators."

Egypt Under Martial Law. Washington.—Martial law has been proclaimed by Great Britain throughout Egypt. An official notification by the British charge d'affairs at Cairo was delivered to American diplomatic agents there.

Botkin's Wife Near Death. Leavenworth, Kan.—Mrs. Jerry Botkin, wife of J. D. Botkin, warden of the Kansas penitentiary, was probably fatally injured in a runaway accident here.

Q.—What is the meaning of I Corinthians 15:22, "As in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive?" (D. N.)

Answer.—As the entire reign of sin and death came through Adam's disobedience upon the whole world, so the entire release from the curse will come to every member of the race through Jesus. The broad basis for this work has already been laid in the death of Jesus. "Christ died for our sins, according to the scriptures" (I Corinthians 15:3). Jesus Christ, by the grace of God, tasted death for every man. "He is the propitiation for our sins and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world" (I John 2:2). As all the race were involved in the death sentence, the one redemptive work was all that was necessary for the releasing of all. In God's arrangement He has divided the redeemed into two great classes, both of which will attain everlasting life. One class will receive it on the spiritual or heavenly plane, while the other will get it on the earthly plane. This does not signify universalism, for while these two classes are to be saved, the Bible distinctly tells of some who will receive the grace of God in vain, and die the second death (Revelation 21:8). A better translation of your text is: "As all in Adam die, even so all in Christ shall be made alive." The world now dies because children of Adam; such as receive life will get it because of being related to Jesus.

Q.—Is it proper to have a creed? (K. E.)

Answer.—One could not be a Christian without a creed. When a person says that he has no creed he usually means that he has no written creed aside from the Bible. For the sake of convenience many Christians accept some short statement of what they consider to be the teachings of the Bible. Manifestly all such creeds should be very elastic and the mind prepared to change or drop them entirely should they at any time be found out of harmony with the Bible. Inasmuch as the light of divine truth is progressive (Proverbs 4:18) no creed could be expected to last long. The creed of every disciple of Christ is the Bible and whatever other statements of belief he may give assent to must have been proven to his own mind to be founded on this "sure foundation." To gather our forces around inflexible standards would be an expensive mistake, for the few great truths which we have gathered from the rubbish heaps of the dark past are only a few of the many lost centuries ago. Special features of truth are constantly being discovered. Of these we would be entirely deprived. God's Word is a great storehouse of food for hungry pilgrims on the shining pathway. There is milk for babes, and strong meat for those more developed (I Peter 2:2; Hebrews 5:14); and not only so, but it contains food adapted to the different seasons and conditions; and Jesus said the one faithful in service should bring forth "meat in due season" for the household of faith—"things new and old from the storehouse" (Luke 12:42; Matthew 13:52). To bring forth "things new," "meat in due season" we will have to progress.

Q.—Since our Lord did not pray for the world would it be proper for Christians to pray for unconverted people of the world? (O. C. E.)

Answer.—No doubt you are referring to our Lord's words, "I pray not for the world, but for those whom thou hast given me" (John 17:9). Similarly, our prayers and appeals do not need to be put forth on behalf of the world in general, but in the interest of those who have the ear to hear and the heart to respond to the heavenly calling of this Gospel age. We are to remember that now no man can come unto the Son and into the blessed privileges of the present trial except the Father draw him, (John 6:44). This does not imply that we are to feel careless respecting the interests of the world in general, who are included in our petition when we pray, "Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." It merely means that the Lord's people, who are aware of the Divine program, know that the heavenly Father has a great blessing in store for the world in general, the great blessing mentioned in the text: "He hath appointed a day in the which He will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom He hath ordained." Christ the head, and the church His body. When the world's judgment day shall have come it will not be for the purpose of deciding whether or not the people of the world are sinners. That is already decided. By the corrective judgments of that period they are to be released from their bondage to sin if they choose to accept the assistance then offered. If we were to fall to pray for the world, in harmony with the model prayer given us by the Lord, it would indicate that we were not in harmony with the Father's purposes and that we had not yet acquired a proper degree of love. On the other hand, if we were to ask the Lord to give the world their blessings now, or to take them to heaven, we would thus prove ourselves either ignorant of the divine purposes or out of harmony with them. Only in His time and way will He bless them.

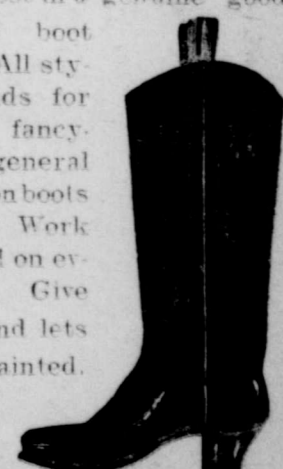

SUITABLE FOR SUBURBAN USE

Small Cottage Houses May Be Built for Comparatively Small Sum.

COMFORT AND HEALTH

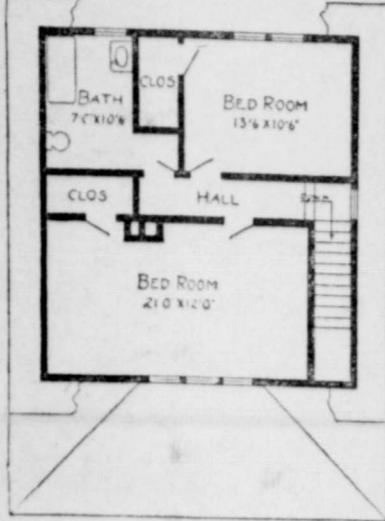
Getting Away From Cramped and Badly Ventilated Quarters is Worth Much More Than the Money Expended in Building Homes.

The building of small cottages has lately assumed the dignity of an art. Adjacent to large cities are tracts that may be reached by surface trolley roads; and in the vicinity of the larger cities are outlying sections where steam roads have a specialty of carrying city commuters back and forth at very low rates. Usually the price of suburban lots range from \$400 to \$1,500, including walk and sewer. There are lots

used for a seat or for a built-in sideboard. It is useful and looks well in either capacity. This little cottage is supposed to have a good cellar and a hot-air furnace for heating. It is so small that the grate in the living room and the range in the kitchen will keep it comfortable, except during the colder winter months, so that the coal bill will not be very heavy. The living room is a fine, big, attractive room. It is worth very careful attention at the stairway end. There are possibilities of building a comfortable cozy nook under the turn of the stair, with a hood over it which will add greatly to its appearance as well as its comfort. A seat placed by the side of an open stair is drafty unless protected in some way. You don't want a door to shut off the draft, because you wouldn't like the looks of it, and because one great value of an open stair is the service it renders in the way of ventilation. There is always a current of air go-

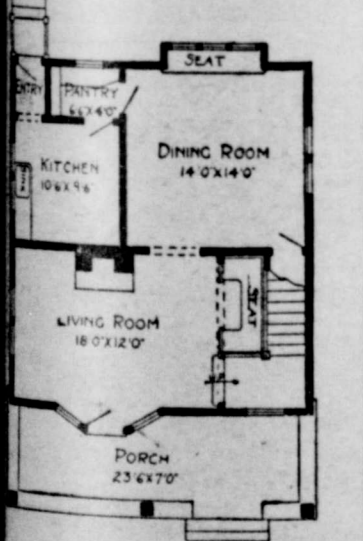


Second Floor Plan.

ing up or down. The air goes up when the air in the living room is warmer than the air upstairs, and this may be taken advantage of to keep the air in the small house pure and wholesome.

Who wish to commence life upon the best social conditions open to them on a salary such as the ordinary office man receives. A little house like this may be built for a small amount of money that a young man could build it and pay it in a few years at about the same rate. In the meantime he can improve the property by planting the lot to choice flowers and the kinds of fruits, and probably sell the house is 26 feet in width by 30 feet in length, and has a large fireplace in the living room. MARTIAL AND MILITARY LAW

Regulations Are by No Means Identical, as London Magazine Has Pointed Out.

By an order in council Great Britain has been placed under a modified form of martial law, which, however, must not be confounded with military law.

Martial law may be defined, London Tit-Bits says, as that military rule or authority which exists in time of war, and is conferred by the laws of war, in relation to persons and things within the scope of active military operations, and which extinguishes or suspends, for the time being, civil rights so far as this may be necessary for the purpose of war. In other words, it is the application of military government to persons and property within its scope.

Military law, on the other hand, is a body of rules and ordinances prescribed for the government of the military state considered as a distinct community. The object of the recent order in council is to give the military authorities extensive powers over individuals and their property. Buildings may be destroyed, lands and roads may be occupied, inhabitants may be required to leave given areas as necessity dictates. People may not trespass on railways or loiter about bridges. It is an offense to publish information as to the movement of troops, while the spreading of reports calculated to cause disaffection or alarm may bring the offender into grave trouble.

Lived With Eight Bullets in Him.

Reports indicate that it sometimes takes a lot to kill a modern soldier. Sergeant Fougere of France received eight bullet wounds, a broken arm and other injuries, and although shot in the calf, thigh and ankle, escaped being captured by Germans, and limped ten miles to his regiment. Another French soldier received six bullet and three bayonet wounds, and is recovering. The French war office estimates only two men are killed out of every 100 hit. The penetration is so clean one soldier did not know he had been hit for three hours, and another bullet went clean through two soldiers and lodged in a cavalryman's saddle.

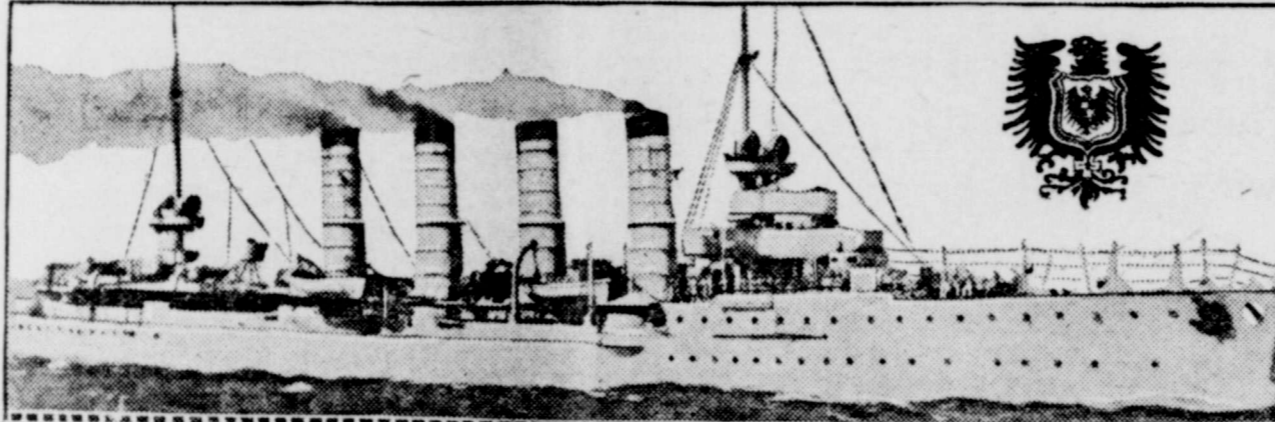

GHASTLY SCENE IN THE FOREST OF MESNEL



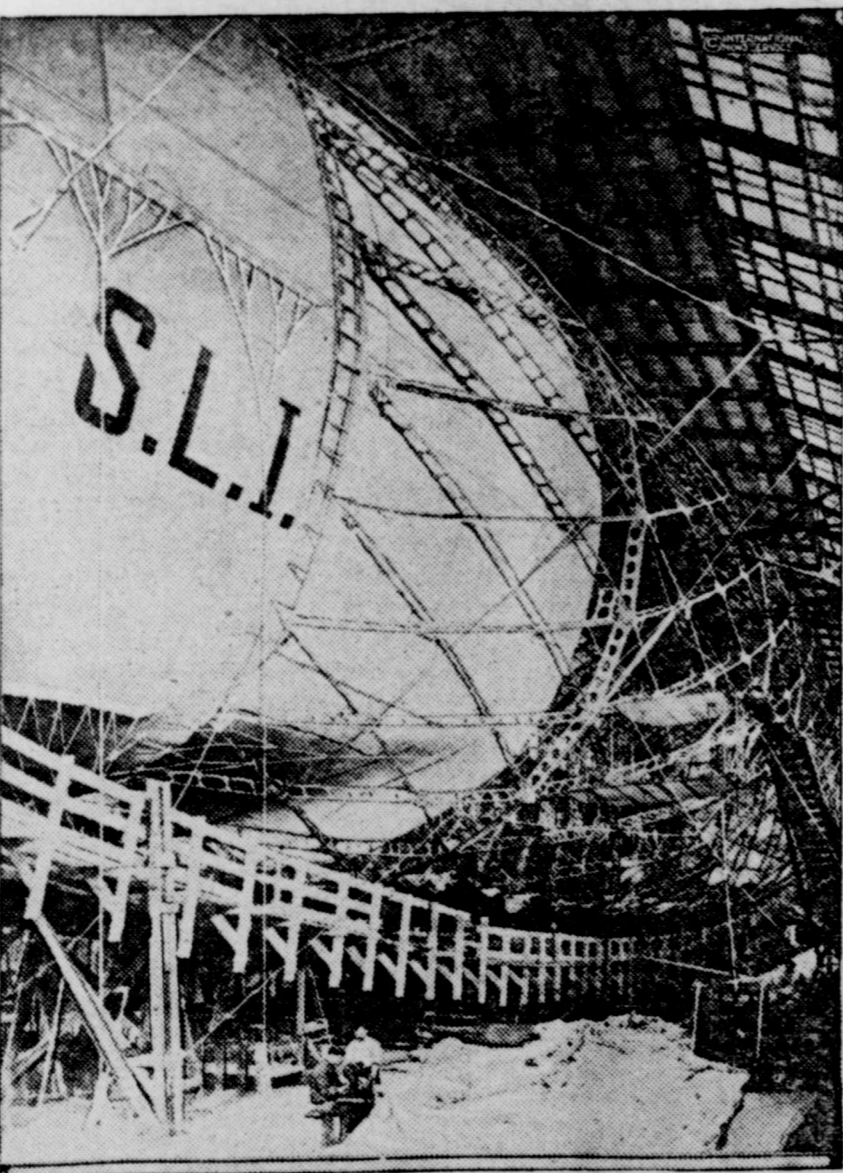
Gruesome photograph showing an entire regiment of French infantry, which was surprised by the Germans in the Forest of Mesnel, near Peronne, and completely annihilated.

TEXAS NEWS CONDENSED

Work has started on a new school building at Lyons.

An overall factory is to start soon at Wichita Falls that will employ 25 people.

A strong flow of artesian water was struck at Kerens last week at a depth of 3,400 feet.

Cleburne is figuring on putting in a new sewerage system. A bond issue is proposed to finance the deal.

The total number of warehouses for the storage of cotton to be established under the emergency warehouse act is 31.

The Clifton High School building has been delivered by the contractors. The building represents an investment of \$25,000.

The Santa Fe railroad is now making a preliminary survey and obtaining estimates of a cutoff from Tulsa to the terminus of the Kansas City-Tulsa division to Cushing, on the main line to Texas points.

The railroad commission gave notice that it will, on Nov. 10 consider proposed amendments to classification rule No. 8, so as to provide for the including of live poultry with shipments of emigrant movables.

The Lubbock Irrigation company has sold its entire property, which consisted of 11,808 acres, lying nine miles east. Several hundred acres of this land is already under irrigation. Consideration is \$35 per acre.

The McKinney city commission has let a contract for a new building for the city water and light plant. The improvement in the system is expected to cut the fire insurance key rate 20 per cent.

Lincoln Beachey, the aviator who made several flights at the state fair in Dallas recently, has proven his contention that the air currents had no horrors for the experienced aviator. He made a flight with perfect ease when the wind was blowing very hard. The loop the loop and flying upside down were his principal feats.

The charter of the Dallas & Southwestern Motor Way company, formed for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a toll road extending from a point on the Red river in Red River county to Del Rio, Val Verde county, an estimated distance of 800 miles, has been filed in the office of the secretary of state. The principal place of business is to be in Dallas and the capital stock is \$75,000.

With the single exception of one section of land in Hardin county, judgment for defendants was rendered by District Judge Wilcox in the case of the state of Texas vs. Houston Oil company et al. Notice of appeal was given by the state. Originally the case involved approximately 80,000 acres of timber lands in East Texas which the state sought to recover. The number was cut down to about 60,000 acres by the court's rulings on demurrers.

Gov. Colquitt made it plain that he has not abandoned his inclination to call another special session of the legislature before he retires from office. He asserted that he believes the people want it to provide relief against the present tolerable trade conditions, and that the demand for it will become so strong later that he may be forced to call another session. It was learned that the two special sessions which closed Thursday cost the taxpayers approximately \$110,000.

The biggest rise in 20 years swept down the Rio Grande last week. The under-the-hill part of the city of Eagle Pass was inundated and the frail shanties and jackals of the Mexican inhabitants were carried away along with much of their household goods. The flood reached 32 feet.

The city commissioners of Electra have let the contract for the erection of a 65,000-gallon standpipe for the city water works. Contract price is about \$4,000.

The attorney general's department, in an opinion given the secretary of state, ruled that house bill No. 4, being the permanent warehouse bill, recently enacted at the second called session of the thirty-third legislature, became a law immediately upon the signing of it by the governor.

George C. Deming, senior editor of the Daily Visitor, and one of Palestine's oldest and most highly respected citizens, died last week. Deceased was 90 years old.

W. W. Johnson, president and organizer of the Forest Oil company of Wichita Falls, and widely known throughout that section, died at Mineral Wells last week at the age of 65.

Advices received by a Wichita Falls cotton firm from a source seemingly authentic are that American cotton is reaching German ports, despite general belief to the contrary in this country. The cotton was received at Bremen, according to the authority quoted.

Taken From "Iowa Homestead" Farm paper Of Jundis, Durability of wooden Silos

"In May 1893 I erected a wooden stave silo in the place of a stone silo which was giving poor results. The stone seemed to cause a great spoiling of silage. The next year I put another stave silo and the two silos are standing to day, and are in good condition. They have been filled every year and in some cases have been carried over for summer silage. This makes the stave silos TWENTY and Twenty One years old. The hoops have been tightened only once during all this time and there has not been any need for replacing staves or any parts. I see no reason why these silos should not last 15 or 20 years longer. The cement base of these silos have been acted on by the acid until they are weak and chalky. I find the lactic acid whether in buttermilk or silage works on cement. For this reason we find it necessary to replace the cement floors in our dairies every few years."

The above by T. L. Hoeker of the Minnesota Experiment station will interest not only to those who have stave silos but to those who are contemplating building in the near future.

Q.—What was the trouble with the teachers among the Jews in our Lord's time? Were they not laying too much stress on works? And why do we find conditions similar today? (K. M.)

Answer.—In these latter years doctrines are considered in very few Christian pulpits. Doctrinal preaching is considered obsolete and has been replaced largely by what is termed "practical preaching." In other words, the preaching of "good works" has taken the place of the doctrines preached by Jesus and the Apostles. Able ones of all denominations, in the pulpit and in the pews, are ashamed of the doctrines which they professed when they became Christians. The preachers, therefore, wisely laid these aside and their congregations were glad to forget them. The preaching of doctrines occupied a principal place in the teaching of Jesus and His Disciples, but as this phase of Christian work has been laid aside the preaching of "works" has been forced into prominence. This condition is slightly different from that which existed among the Scribes and Pharisees of our Lord's time. They were preaching doctrines, but had substituted the doctrines of men for those of God. Great stress was laid on the importance of "works" and, as Jesus said, the burdens were laid on the hearers rather than on the preachers.

Q.—Since the Book of Revelation is a Book of symbols why should we take the number 144,000 as literal; and if the church is composed of the Twelve Tribes of Israel, where will the gentiles get in? (Revelation 7:4.) (E. L. L.)

Answer.—The Book of Revelation is as you suggest a Book of symbols and although Bible scholars have in the past taken some of these symbols literally, they have never done so on Divine authority. For instance, the "Lake of fire and brimstone" many have been supposed to be a literal place fitting that description, while in reality, as the Revelator says, it is a pictorial representation of that which will befall those who go into death a second time—their utter extinction. As far as we know, however, there are no symbolic numbers in Revelation. Those that have been fulfilled, or are referred to in other portions of the Bible, we find to be literal numbers. It is the thing which is referred to in connection with the number which is symbolic. In the case to which you refer the twelve tribes of natural Jews are used to represent the completed Church—Spiritual Israel. The number is literal but the tribes of natural Israel represented spiritual Israel. There will be some Jews in this number as well as people from other kindreds, nations and tongues. "Narrow is the way, and few they be that find it."

Q.—Is death the natural destiny of man, and after the Resurrection, will men still be subject to death? (Constant Reader.)

Answer.—It is not the Divine purpose to perpetuate evil as an active principle in any part of the universe. Eternal life is conditional upon obedience. The lower animals as unmorals are naturally subject to death, but through disobedience death entered the circle of the human family (Romans 5:12; 1 Corinthians 15:21). Death was necessarily introduced to destroy sin and imperfection, and it would have been complete destruction, as with the lower animals (not preservation in torment), but through Christ's ransom sacrifice it became a sleep, because there will be an awakening. In the Resurrection, if any, after being brought to a full knowledge of both good and evil, persist in an evil course, such will die a second time, and have no subsequent resurrection. Then when all sin has been destroyed, death itself will cease, because the whole universe will then be clean.

Q.—What can we know respecting evil spirits—fallen angels? (J. M. L.)

Answer.—We can know what God has been pleased to reveal on the subject in His Word, for "these things are written for our admonition (our instruction) upon whom the ends of the world (ages) are come." (1 Corinthians 10:11) The Apostle Peter tells us of these fallen angels, who now masquerade as our dead friends and claim that they are now more alive than they ever were. They have intimate knowledge of mankind, as well as ability to read our very thoughts, and hence have no difficulty whatever in impersonating the dead, with all the peculiarities by which they were known to their friends. These angels, according to St. Jude, "God hath reserved in everlasting chains under darkness until the judgment (trial, testing) of the great days (verse 6)—until the end of this age. This time, it seems from the Scriptures, is now upon us. While God has, for a considerable time, shielded mankind from their debasing influence, "He will bring to pass His act, His strange act," by releasing these restraints, and permitting them to operate along lines of hypnotism and suggestion, breaking down the human will,—as a test to themselves, peradventure some of them may have repented; and as a lesson to angels and men of the lengths to which depravity would go if not restrained of God. Upon the wreck and ruin of this reign of evil, Messiah's kingdom will be established and demoniacal power destroyed.
