WE HAVE HAD SOME hail damage in our immediate area, but from the pictures we have seen in area newspapers, and on television newscasts, we would say (at least as of this writing) that Parmer County for the most part has been fairly fortunate, in connection with the recent violent weather.

On two consecutive Wednesdays, we had some bad weather, but in both instances, the cloud more or less "made up" in our area, and became progressively worse as it went eastward.

A report in this week's Dimmitt newspaper indicated that the May 25 storm had caused over \$5 million in property damage alone—to homes, vehicles and business houses. No estimate was given on crop damage, which also was severe.

The storm pounded the Dimmitt area with stones ranging in size from lemons to cantaloupes. The storm lasted for almost an hour in Dimmitt. Roofs of homes were damaged, and one mobile home ruined. Grown wheat and emerging corn was destroyed, and cotton was washed out by the gully-washer that accompanied the storm.

Then, at Nazareth, funnel clouds destroyed a mobile home belonging to Kent and Teresa Birkenfield, who luckily left to find a storm cellar. Their home and belongings were flattened by the storm.

The storm also hit the Lawrence Schmucker farm a half mile from where the Birkenfields lived, and did massive damage to their home. Other farm homes in the Nazareth area were hit, but these two were the worst.

A group of 75 people huddled in the basement of the Holy Family Church at Nazareth. The steel archway to the Holy Family Cemetery was ripped out of the ground on one side, and twisted out of shape.

The funnel-bearing cloud which hit the Nazareth community also caused considerable damage at Tulia, but according to one eyewitness, the city of Tulia could also consider itself lucky.

According to a second-hand, but eye-witness report from Tulia, there were at least two funnels from the massive cloud system. The larger funnel was a black, menacing affair, and had been bearing down on the city, but must have lifted in time to spare the city major damage. As it was, the gin on the west side of town was destroyed, and some homes sustained damage.

In the Dimmitt area, ice from the hailstorm was three to four inches deep in the barrow ditch along Highway 86.

THESE RECENT STORMS should serve to warn us just how much damage can be done by hailstorms and tornadoes, which are common to our area this time of the year.

Residents should have a plan at all times, as to where they will go if the area comes under a tornado warning. You should have a place in mind, whether at home or at work, to go for protection.

If you do not have a storm shelter, an inside room, such as a bathroom, is the best. The idea about lying in a bathtub and pulling a mattress over you has proven a good one, where storms strike such as the one described above.

Just because a tornado "never has hit you before" is no sign that it won't. An ounce of prevention could be just enough to save your life, or the lives of your loved ones.

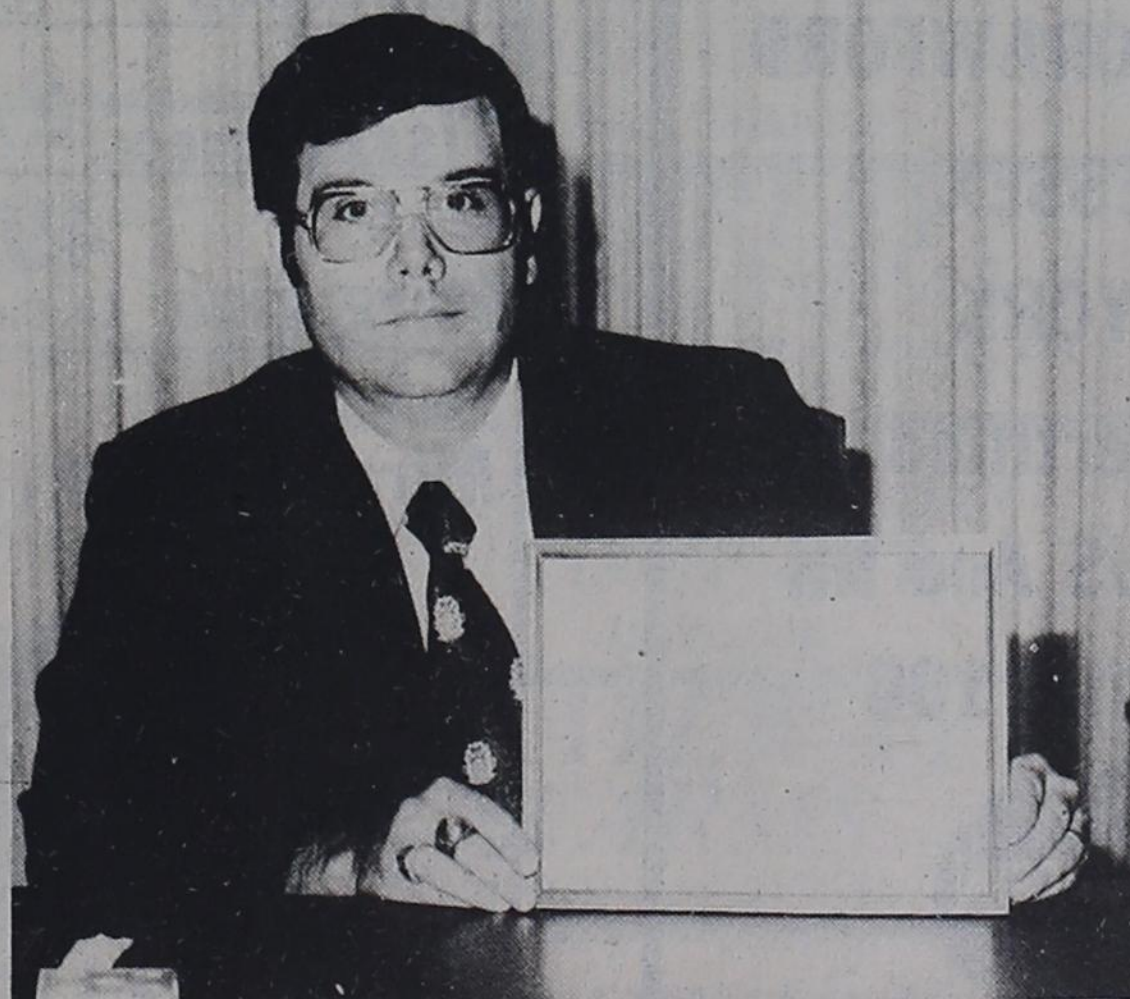
Church Plans Animal Fair

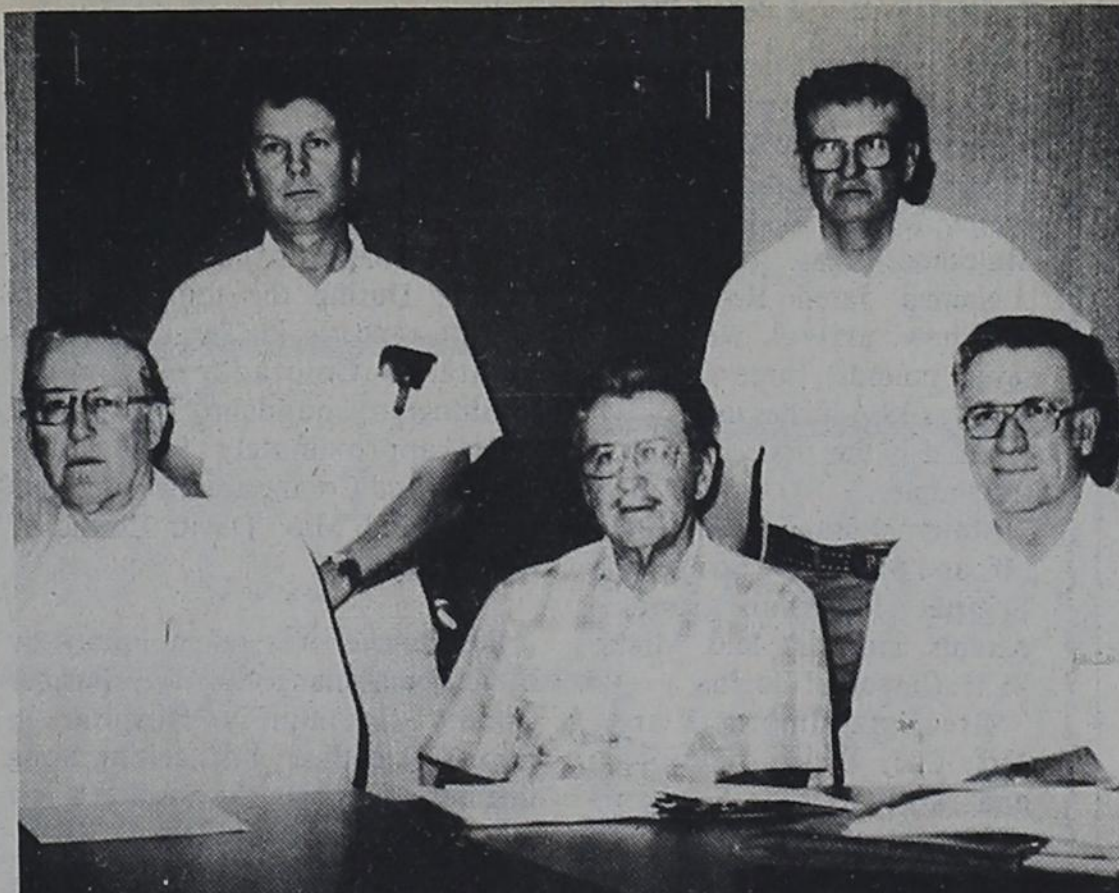

Preston Nix Is New FBC Youth Pastor

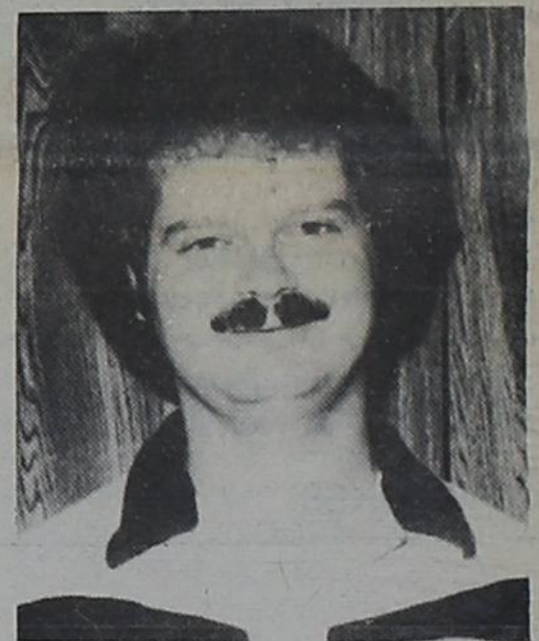
Preston Nix has been hired as Youth Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Bovina.
