> It can be authoritatively stated that only five cargoes destined for Italy has been stopped at Gibraltar since November 15. Two of these were raleased within three days and the others as soon as the alelged contraband could be removed. Since December 4 no cargoes destined for Italy have been intercepted by the allies.

> Rubber cargoes destined for American firms and held in English ports probably will be released soon or purchased by Great Britain, which needs much rubber for the manufactcure of tires, bed blankets and boots.

> Constant negotiations are in progtral European countries situated near Germany lokoing to a tightening of the export regulations which will prevent American shipments from reach-Germany and Austria through neighboring countries other than Italy.

> A loosening of the regulations applying to American cargoes, it is said by British officials, will depend largely on the assurances received from neutral countries that they will not assist in supplying Germany, Austria and Turkey with munitions of war.

Although an engine new to warfare, he armored motor car has proved extremely useful, especially for outpost and scouting duty. Fast, silent, and mobile, it covers a vast amount of ground on the splendid roads that crisscross the field of war in western Europe. Most of the cars are incased in a light frame of tough steel plate that ranges in thickness from threesixteenths of an inch to a quarter of an inch, and that is impervious to rifle and machine-gun fire. All the vulnerable parts of the motor, such as the radiator and steering gear, and in some of the newest cars the wheels, are protected by the steel covering. The wheels, both wood and wire, are said to withstand the roughest sort of usage. Accidents to the tires are much less common than anyone would expect. The cars carry a light armament-one or two machine guns so mounted that they can be swung through a complete circle-and a large supply of ammunition. The crew, which may number from four to eight or more men, are armed with rifles and revolvers. Some of the cars have a steel superstructure that rises from the chassis frame high enough to enable the crew to stand upright, and that is capped with a domed roof, from which bullets and shrapnel usually fly off at a sharp angle without even denting the steel .- Youth's Com-





The best architectural practice demands that houses shall be neat and pretty in appearance, as well as practical and comfortable, and the tendency always is for more comfort at less expense. Modern architects are inventors of luxuries. A home like this not only embodies the means of obtaining luxuries, but it combines the artistic with every-day utilitarian economy

This bungalow is supported by a solid basement wall, which extends Little Chance of Conversation Like well above ground, to give plenty of head-room. Most small houses are heated by warm-air furnaces. Seven and one-half feet of head-room is necessary to get the proper angle to the pipes which convey the heat from the litely. "It includes the handkerchief

The double-door archway is wide enough to throw the two doors together when required. Furniture to correspond helps to carry out this combination plan.

The large chimney, built of rough, dark-colored brick, adds to the appearance of the gable end of the building. The projection, which forms a seat in the dining room, also adds to the attractivenes of this end of the house. There is a triple mullion window in this extension designed to admit plenty of light to the dining room.

The manner of placing the house on the ground is interesting. The lot slopes away to the back, so that the low ungalow effect is given to the front part of the house, but the basement wall at the rear is high enough for good-sized windows above the ground. The manner of building shingle siding down to the ground in front also adds to the bungalow ef-

The planting of a house properly on the lot has a good deal to do with its artistic appearance. A pretty house should be placed some distance back from the street line, for the same reason that you stand some distance away to survey a picture on the wall; you want to get the right perspec-

The manner in which a house is surrounded with trees, shrubbery and flowers also has a great deal to do with its artistic appearance when viewed from the street.

The best house designed may be improved or spoiled by its immediate surroundings.


