**QUAKE HORROR GROWS IN** ITALY

Relief Work is Hampered by Breadth of the Stricken Districts--Emmanuel Leads Rescuers.

### 40,000 DEAD; 200,000 HURT

Italy was stunned by the great earthguake disaster of January 13 and 14, when 40,000 persons were killed and more than 200,000 hurt. The nation is just beginning to put into operation general relief measures because all lines of communication to the stricken districts were destroyed and motor cars furnish practically the only means of transportation. It is found that whole towns were buried, historic buildings and priceless art treasures destroyed and uncountable property damage wrought by the catastrophe. The Italian government has appropriated a million dollars for immediate relief.

The Red Cross has opened an emergency hospital where the less dangerously injured are being cared for. Those more dangerously hurt are being taken to Caserta.

#### A Cold Rain Falls, Too.

The sufferings of the homeless popu lation have been intensified by a cold, | the misery of the survivors, many of drizzling rain which began early yesterday afternoon and continued steadily. The people have been warned not to reoccupy the houses which remain standing until the buildings have been carefully inspected

The nights have been spent in the open air, where the only heat has been provided by wood fires kindled on the ground. Huts are being erected along the roadside and in fields to shelter the women and children. Food is being distributed by communal officials.

Worshippers Barely Escaped.

Although rain was falling, King Victor Emmanuel insisted upon continuing upon his inspection of the afflicted towns and villages, motoring from one place to another. Rome, Jan. 19 .- Detailed reports re-

ceived in the capital regarding Italy's stupendous earthquake disaster in crease rather than diminish the appalling list of dead and the enormous property loss. The Messaggero, after making a careful computation of all the figures it has been able to gather from the districts and villages hitherto isolated, announces that the number of dead and injured in the Abruzzi alone is thirty thousand, without including the Sora district.

### Die of Cold and Hunger.

San Atolio has 200 dead and 500 injured; Morino, 1,500 dead; Canistro, 600 injured; Cervavo, 300 victims; Borgo fifty dead, and Valleroveto, 1,800. In Civitella Roveto almost the entire population escaped because they were working in the field when the shock occurred.

Frantic appeals for help have been received from Petrellallri, 3,500 feet above sea level on Mount Arango, eight miles from Tagliacozzo. The village was almost destroyed and the survivors say they are perishing of cold and hunger.



FINDING LIFE IN AVEZZAND

Avezzano, Italy, Jan. 19-Fresh troops reached the earthquake area tofunity to knock at his door; he day and the work of rescue was continued with energy. Particular attention is being directed to pulling down unsafe walls, the burial of the dead, distribution of supplies and caring for homeless and orphaned children.

The soldlers present an extraordinary appearance. Entire detachments of them come from the ruins white as millers. They are covered with a fine plaster dust.

It is interesting to note that the number of women being found alive s larger than the number of men. Women appear to have superior resisting powers, Even today, five days after the disaster, several girls and old women were extricated from the ruins. All are injured but the doctors hope to save them. A little boy sorts and a species of distressing also was found alive. He held in his hand a wooden horse, evidently a

Christmas present. The excavators have come upon many persons burned to death. It would appear that in a good many places fire broke out under the ruins. At Cappelle a man 65 years old was brought out with both his feet burned off. He lived only two hours.

It having been established that attempts at looting continued, the mil itary authorities are taking severe repressive measures. Last night two thieves, endeavoring to enter a house formerly occupied by the local branch of the Bank of Naples, were shot. Many priests are taking part in the work of rescue. Some are nursing the wounded, others are collecting money to meet the urgent needs of sarvivors, while still others are work


