INTENDED FOR LARGE FAMILY

Splendid Cellar Is One of Its Chief Advantages-Porch Arrangement Most Pleasing-Especial Feature is Effect Given by Window Lights.

The manner of building a wide roof gives the opportunity of planning several rooms in the attic. The house shown in this design makes good use of the roof space that is ordinarily given to the storage of old shoes.

This is a good-sized house for a large family. It was designed especially for a town or village where the lots are liberal in size. It has a goodlooking, prosperous appearance, as though the family feels proud to own such a house.

It is built with a good cellar for the foundation, the wall of which is put up just above grade line. From the cellar wall the construction is of studding in the ordinary way, except that the joists of the main floor do not rest on the sill. The cellar wall is four or five feet in height, according to the depth of cellar required, so that the joists are supported by a ribbon set into the studding three or four feet above the sill. From this studding ribbon up to the peak the house is built in the usual way.





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
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



Senate Engrosses "Race Track" Bill. Austin, Texas.-All capitol departments were closed in observance of Washington's birthday, but both houses of the legislature worked steadily all day, and in fact labored longer than is their custom. The senate engrossed the Clark "race track" bill, to create a state racing commission and allow the use of parimutuel machines at Texas race tracks, by a vote of 13 to 10, after rejecting many proposed amendments and debating the question at length.

Austin, Texas.-Rumors have been current in Austin for some time to the effect that legislation would be proposed during the session which, if enacted, would permit the return to Texas of the corporate successor of the Waters-Pierce Oil company, and the return, in a corporate capacity, of the successors of other foreign corporations which have been convicted of violations of the Texas anti-trust laws, if such return can be made with "clean skirts."

Mr. Valentine of Tarrant county has introduced a bill in the house which proposes amendments to the Texas anti-trust laws of the character just suggested. Mr. Valentine says his bill would affect not only the Waters-Pierce company but all other corporations previously convicted of violations of the anti-trust laws of the state and permit re-entrance in Texas, provided the orporation can produce "a clean bill of health" and show that it is not now violating the anti-trust



BLOCKADE ON GERMANY IS PROCLAIMED

GREAT BRITAIN TO SHUT OFF ALL TRADE TO PORTS OF ENEMY.

NEW POLICY CHEERED BY PEOPLE

Premier Asquith in Historic Address to Parliament Says Starvation War Decree Is Effective at Once-Is Answer to German Sea War.

London, March 2 (10:10 a. m.)-If the combined fleets of Great Britain and France can prevent it, no commodities of any kind except those now on the seas shall henceforth, until the conclusion of the war, reach or leave the shores of Germany.

This is England's answer to Germany's submarine blockade, and it is to be effective forthwith.

Preimer Asquith, reading from a prepared statement, made this announcement in the house of commons vesterday at a session which will be historic. Studiously avoiding the terms "blockade" and "contraband"for these words occur nowhere in the prepared statement-the premier explained that after this day the allies considered themselves justified in attempting, and would attempt, "to detain and take into port ships carrying goods of presumed enemy destination, ownership or origin.'

The premier emphasized, however, that vessels and cargoes so seized were not necessarily liable to confiscation, and begged the patience of neutral countries in the face of a step through which they were likely to suffer. He added that in making such a step the allies had done so in self defense.
