The Mexia commercial club has closed a deal to establish a pottery there at once. This plant will give employment to about 12 men and the plant's capacity will be about 15 cars per month of jars, jugs and crocks and cooking vessels.



poultry house is with a shed roof. In addition to being fine for the poultry it is also easy to build. The design shown here has a depth of ten feet, which will allow the sunlight to lighted house easily out of what they make for him.

a concrete foundation, as it is very discouraging to rats and mice to attempt to dig through this material. In this little house the concrete walls are carried up 1 foot 6 inches above grade, which forms a very effective through this.

It makes a smooth, tight wall that can be readily painted with whitewash or crude oil and there are no nooks and corners to narbor the vermin that always get into the chicken house more or less. The walls can also be cov ered with matched ceiling which will give a smooth surface that can be easily painted.

Mistake to Stint on Expense The roof can be made of sheathing. which is covered with prepared roofing. The inside wall is made of wall board or of matched ceiling the same as the walls

The roosts are placed in the back part of the house under the roof and are fastened to the droppings board that is placed underneath them. HOME IN STERLING LIVES A

PRUNE TREES IN SUMMER

Farmers Trim in Foliage Season in Order to Check Wood Growth.

Summer pruning, as contrasted with the regular practice, is the pruning of trees while in foliage. Its influence upon the tree in many respects is opposite to winter pruning. The latter stimulates wood growth, while the former tends to lessen wood growth.

As a rule, any practice that checks wood growth tends to induce fruitfulness. Growers have taken advantage of this fact for many years. In England the result is attained by root pruning. The method consists in digging a trench around the tree at some considerable distance and severing some of the roots. This interferes with the food supply and necessarily reduces growth.

In the famous Ozark apple region of Missouri and Arkansas the same result is attained by ringing or girdling the trunk or main branches of the tree, thus checking the downward flow of sap. The roots in this way are partially starved and are, therefore, unable to induce a strong wood growth the following season. The work is done during the growing season and, as a result, the wound soon heals over. A complete or partial defoliation by insects, disease, or spraying injury during the early summer seems to have the same effect .- Farm and Home.





There are a number of different kinds of sprays on the market, and some of them in more convenient shape than ever known for those who dwell in towns and suburbs and have only a few yard trees. But for the farmer and fruit grower, nothing has ever been found that combines cheapness and effectiveness in the degree that the well-known lime, sulphur and salt mixture does.


True, it is a little troublesome to make, but not unduly so when we consider how cheap it is and how easy to procure the ingredients anywhere.

Formulas vary some, but one that has been given a thorough test contains equal parts by weight of three materials, 15 pounds each of lime, sulphur and salt, being taken for 50 galns of water.

Slake the lime with hot water and when boiling pour in the sulphur, which has been dissolved in a little water, and stir it well into the lime, Adult Female Removed From Scale then add the salt.

Boil together for an hour, when the mixture will have become a very dark red. Then add water to make 50 gallons of spray, and if possible, apply it while warm.

FARMING ON DRY LAND

Deep Plowing Gives Proper Subsoil Conditions.

Subsurface Packing Idea Is Over Worked in Certain Quarters-Weeds Are Worst Enemies of Average Western Farmer.

Our agricultural friends who come from the humid states often tell us that dry farming is nothing but progressive farming-good farming. This is a serious misconception of the facts Dry farming is a branch by itself, a new agriculture, writes Maj. J. S. Murphy in Denver Field and Farm. The soil and water physics are entirely different; for, speaking broadly, dry farming is done in capillary waters. while humid farming is done with free water. In dry farming the water is always going down and the top drying up, while in humid farming the free water is always helping out the surface moisture and supplying the roots in the seedbed. Therefore, we find it impossible to raise profitable crops without the right subsoil conditions, which can be obtained by one method only-deep plowing

Some folk think this deep plowing proposition is a hobby with me, and that I am riding it too hard I think differently and I repeat, "It is the essence of dry farming." And there is another thing my experience convinces me of, and it is this: Water that is held in the ground from six to ten months, the longer the better, is much more effective in producing healthy growth than water recently placed there or water placed there about the time the roots are ready to use it. It seems to go through a sort of aging or ripening process-and I believe that more fertility is thus liberated and made available; also I believe it creates and maintains couditions favorable to the preparation of plant food. The gardener and fruit grower in the irrigated country likes to get the water in the ground at least two months before he uses it for the simple reason I have here given: it liberates fertility.

Regarding subsurface packing, which is a great hobby of H. W. Campbell. who has preached a pretty good gospel generally. I do not take so much stock in it. My own experience leads me to the conclusion that this idea is overworked in certain quarters.

The average observant farmer will admit that weeds are his worst enemies. There are thousands of fields in the West which ten years ago were native sod and that are today abounding with Russian thistle, wild oats, sunflowers and other vicious weeds; and in the most of those fields the weeds are taking more moisture and fertility than the crop. The weeds must be eradicated. In the lexicon of the dry farmer it is a crime against heaven and the human race to permit weeds to grow and go to seed. When you become a dry farmer you will grow to so detest weeds that you will get up in the night and walk a mile to kill one. Another practice I find invaluable is harrowing growing grain. I first sweep over the field with a light parrow just as the first blades are coming through the ground and as often thereafter as necessary, depending on the conditions. I have harrowed grain only once after it started to come up, and I have harrowed it three times again, depending on conditions It takes courage, too, when you are unaccustomed to it, to put a harrow into a field of wheat that looks good and
