

Reinforcements are Rushed by Auto. The fight broke while the infantry band at Fort Brown was giving a Sunday night concert. Of more than 100 automobiles at the concert, probably half the number volunteered to carry machines full of soldiers to the scene of the fight. Two companies of infantry were taken out in this manner, while many cavalrymen jumped in The two troops of cavalry lowed the automobiles closely, leaving Fort Brown at 8:35 o'clock.

Sergeant Arthur Ethridge of Company C. Fourth United States infantry, was in command of detachment attacked. THE ROUND BARN

Practical Farmer Will See at a Glance How Building Makes for Economy.

SILO PLACED IN THE CENTER

Designed So That the Cows and Horses Face In, Which Is an Advantage-Feed and Bedding Utilized to the Best Possible Manner.

Round barns for live stock are growing in popularity because of the ease of doing work in them.

There is another economy that will be appreciated when we learn how to build easier; that is, the increased capacity as compared with a rectangular barn requiring the same amount of material.

The round barn shown in the illustration is built around a 14-foot silo, which really is a plan for building one cylinder inside of another.

The cylinder is the strongest form in which material can be put together in building construction.

In this building the silo supports the barn and the barn supports the

feed is brought to the center and the manure is distributed from the out-

Straw is kept bright by housing it overhead at threshing time and it is made useful at feeding time by permitting the cows to pick it over in the mangers between feeds of silage and clover hay. The mussed-over straw is then passed back to the stalls for bedding, and as it gradually works farther back it absorbs liquid manure, is carried out in the manure carriers, dumped into a manure spreader and hauled at once to the field. This shows the practicability of this kind of round barn to save labor and utilize feed and bedding to the best possible advantage.

The farm stable should be considered in the light of a manufacturing establishment. Manufacturers in cities arrange their factories to admit raw material at one end and to ship the finished product from the other end.

Good practice requires that the different processes of manufacture shall follow each other in systematic order. Once started, a charge of raw material advances at every step; it is never permitted to go backward. When farmers arrange their business so that each step counts, instead of turning back and walking around in circles, then farmers become business men in the best sense of the term.

Another advantage of building cow stalls in a circle is the fact that cattle, and especially dairy cows, are wedge shaped.

The most convenient stalls are wider behind than they are in front, are now children beand they fit the cows better. The work among dairy cows is done at the rear of the stalls. In using milking machines considerable room is needed. The use of milking machines is one reason for placing the windows in the rear of the cows, so that the light is admitted where it is most needed.





Is the Ottoman empire about to fall after 589 years? Whatever its history, the true era of the empire may be said to date from 1326. In that year the fall of Nicomedia was recorded. A few years later Nicaea surrendered, and in 1336 Pergamon, the capital of Mysia was added to the empire of the Turk. "The people of Nicaea were permitted to emigrate and take with them all their goods, archives and relics, and such moderation," says Dr. Stanley Lane-Poole in his volume, 'Turkey," "greatly strengthened the position of the conqueror.

"The little clan of shepherds, who had been graciously permitted to settle in the kingdom of the Seljuks, had now possessed themselves, in two gen erations, of the whole of the northwest corner of Asia Minor, where they commanded the eastern shore of the Bosporus. Here, for the moment, they were content to rest. The Greek emperor was glad to make peace, and the Turks were anxious to gain time to organize their new dominions and prepare for the great struggle which they knew was before them.


