Summarizes His Program in Speech Before the Manhattan Club.

NATION MUST BE PREPARED

Increase of Army, Training of Citizenry and More Rapid Building Up of Navy-Rebuke for Hyphenated Americans.

New York, Nov. 5 .- Setting forth his ideas of what should be done in the way of national military preparedness, President Wilson last night in an address at the fiftieth anniversary dinner of the Manhattan club asked for support for the administration's pro-

We shall, he declared he believed, never again take another foot of territory by conquest, or seek to make an independent people subject to our dominion. Salmon Thrive in Maine. Success has been met by the bu-

reau of fisheries in establishing humpback salmon on the Maine coast, according to reports from that territory. The fish were planted in February, 1914. Many fish weighing five to seven and a half pounds have been taken or seen in Penobscot river, Me., and twenty were captured alive by agents of the bureau near Bangor and held in an effort to obtain ripe eggs. From two of these fish 3,000 eggs were taken September 6, and, after fertilization, sent to the Craig Brook hatchery for incubation. Local fishermen caught and ate large numbers, and an employee of the Green Lake hatchery bok fifteen fish last week. These had passed through the fishways in dams in Dennys river and were dropping down stream in a spent condition; at the same time both live and dead fish were observed below the dams.

CONSERVE MOISTURE IN SOIL

Water Moves Upward Until It Reaches Surface Unless Hindered by Some Kind of a Mulch.

It is of little use to store water unless means and methods are taken to conserve it. Water moves upward until it reaches the surface unless hindered by a surface mulch or consumed by the plant roots. If the water is permitted to come to the surface, it is lost by evaporation. The amount wasted through evaporation alone amounts to more under ordinary methods than is consumed by the plant. The waste can be prevented by forming a surface mulch. TURNING COVER CROP UNDER

Much Depends on Soil, Weather Conditions and Crop to Follow-Planting Corn After Clover.

The state at which a cover crop should be turned under depends upon the soil, weather conditions and the crop that is to follow. Where corn is to be planted on crimson clover land. the clover should be turned under just when the bloom begins to appear. The crop at this stage will contain about the maximum amount of plant food. Besides, it will decay much more readily than if permitted to reach full maturity. It may be necessary to turn the clover under a little earlier, in order to get the corn planted at the proper time.

Duck Feeding.

Don't try to raise ducklings or whole wheat, cracked corn, or com mercial chick feeds. If used at all, these feeds should be well cooked, for, ordinarily, ducks do not consume enough grit to grind dry grain.





SMALL HOUSE AT REASONABLE COST

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Cottage That Has Every Requisite for Health and Comfort of Inmates.

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In the East the word cottage generally means a one-story house with a hip roof of rather low pitch.

It is a popular way to build a small house at reasonable cost, and at the same time to incorporate sufficient tone to command respect.

The accompanying perspective and floor plan shows this type of house built for a rather narrow lot, so that from the eastern type.

that has become decidedly popular for the outside covering of one-story houses. The economical upkeep of shingle siding appeals to a great many owners because of the saving in paint. To keep a wooden house looking respectable it is necessary to give it a good coat of paint about once in two or three years, which generally includes every square inch of surface below the shingles. Sometimes the roof is included.

In this design the color of the shingles never changes, so that paint is unnecessary except for the trim. The columns, bands, fascia boards, brackets and window trim are the only outside features that require attention from the painter.

The rough brick supporting piers and chimneys are left in their natural rough-and-ready coat of prown, which harmonizes with the general color scheme in a very satisfactory manner.



House repair work shows that the greatest wear on the floors is between the stove, the sink, the pantry and the cellarway. Starting with these data architects have labored to reduce these lines of travel to the shortest possible dimensions and at the same time crowd all of the necessary conveniences into this restricted space.

The finish of a modern kitchen is designed and carried out as carefully as the finish of any other part of the house. Modern kitchens are made as light and attractive as possible. Very often the woodwork is finished in white enamel and the walls are made white and washable. Wall paper has no place in a modern kitchen. The wall must have a hard, glossy, sanitary large enough to admit little red ants or insects of any other dimensions.

Not only the comfort of the house wife, but the health of the family, depends on kitchen sanitation. The first law of sanitation is light and sunshine, although cleanliness really is a part of this first rule. When a kitchen is made light, the walls and ceiling hard and washable with a well-laid hardwood floor, then cleanliness follows

easily. The laundry in this plan is under the kitchen and there is an outside cellarway for convenience on wash days. Every housekeeper is particular to have the clothes hung outdoors when weather will permit. The outside cellarway, in combination with a good outside clothesline, means a great deal in helping to produce snowy white linen.
