## Demonstration in Public Health

For many years the Agriculdemonstrating the advantage o scientific farming by establish ing demonstration farms in di. ferent points in the Counties a need not cost much money the climate, the rainfall and a conditions affecting agricultur.

> The Same plan has been adapted in Public Health work In Leon, Harris and Polk counties, three demonstration districts in each county will be selected. Every feature affecting the health of the inhabitants will be studied.

The plan of this intensive health work begins with a series of lectures on the prevention of sickness, delivered as nearly as possible in every locality in the county to both whites and blacks Upon the interests shown in the lectures will depend the selection of the three demonstration districts. Each district will include approximately 1,000 people and will be typical of the conditions in the county.

When districts are selected, a sanitary survey will be made showing on the map every road, home, well and every disease producing condition. A labro tary will be established a canvas will be made, the home and its surroundings, as well as public buildings inspected, and all unsanitary conditions pointed out.



The upper part of this barn is of frame construction, and the roof covering it is of the gambrel type, supported by trusses. This type of roof is becoming almost universal because of the fact that the entire upper part of the barn is not obstructed by any columns or pillars.

A modern ventilating system is installed with intakes at the upper part of the concrete wall and outtakes through the ventilators shown on the roof.

The silo is built at one corner of the barn and is of the monolithic concrete type. It is large enough so that plenty of silage can be kept to feed all the dairy cows and other stock in the building. It is very important that dairy cows especially have silage so that they will keep on giving a good supply of milk during the months when the price of milk is high. If a farmer expects to add to his herd he should make provision for all the cows that he will be likely to feed in the future, and build his silo to accommodate them. It is better to waste some silage than to run out when it is needed the most. Care must be exercised to keep the silage from spoiling, by

We give the statements of two farmers in this issue as follows:-

STATEMENT OF M. P. TYSDAL I lived near Lee, Illinois, for 46 years. I came to Saskatchewan in the spring of 1912 and bought land near Briercrest. I have farmed this land, 1,680 acres, ever since. I have had grand crops. In 1914 I had 100 acres of wheat that yielded 40 bushels to the acre. I sold this wheat at \$1.50 per bushel.

I like the country and my neighbors. My taxes on each quarter section (160 acres) are about \$32 a year. This covers municipal tax, school tax, hail in surance tax-everything. There is no war tax, so-called. I like the laws in force here. There is no compulsion to me in any way. I am just as independent here as I was in Illinois, and I feel that my family and I are just as well protected by the laws of the province as we were in our old home in Illinois. What I earn here is my own. I have seven children and they take their places at school, in sports and at all public gatherings the same as the Canadian born.

I was born in Wisconsin, but moved with my parents when a boy to Stephen Co., Iowa. I was there farming for 50 years. I sold my land then for over \$200 an acre. I moved to which congress may pass to bring neighbors. I feel quite at home here the same as in Iowa. We have perfect safety and no trouble in living up to the laws in force. My taxes are about \$65 a year, on the half section for everything.


