Shall We Have West Texas A&M College?

The Executive Committee of the A&M Campaign Association met at San Angelo, May 11, and determined on an active and aggressive campaign throughout the State.

An address was drafted to the citizenship of Texas, which together with the resolutions adopted at the Sweetwater convention, Apr. 5, are to be thoroughly distributed throughout every county in the State.

The committee realizing the fact that this would cost considerable money, appointed a finance committee to prepare an appeal to West Texas to assist in this movement.

Some of the resolutions adopted at Sweetwater were as follows: We favor the establishment by an act of the Legislature of a full A&M College in the western part of Texas in compliance with article 2655 of the revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and would suggest that the same be located somewhere west of the 99th Meridian, north of parallel 30.

Crops and cultural methods west of the 99th meridian are entirely different from that in any other part of the state. We deem it important for a student to learn proper agricultural matters for successful practice in Western Texas by instruction possible to be received at College Station.

On account of the vast territory and widely scattered population makes it necessary that much information be conveyed to the people of this section, and the whole state, and the Executive committee has asked me to give to anyone, desiring to assist in this move, a chance through the columns of our local paper to do so by making your contribution to the editor or send direct to Thomas F. Hodge, Sec. Treas. Sweetwater, Texas, who will promptly receipt you.

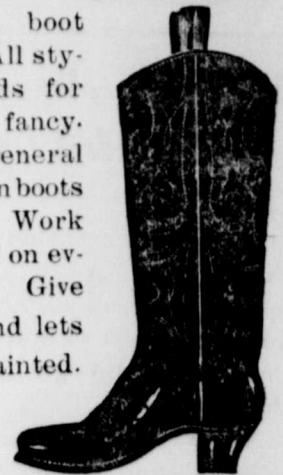

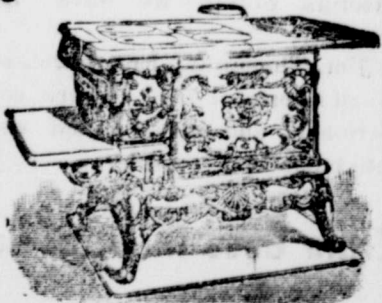
