Water And Lights Coming Very Nicely

City Will Do House Wiring

Our water and lighting system proposition seems to be getting along nicely, and if no hitch comes, we may expect some money on hand to begin operation in the very near future.

The City Council was in session this week, and decided to make a standard of wiring all houses, to see that it is properly done and that all houses are equipped with wiring that will be the least dangerous from fire. In order to do this, they will hire a competent electrician to do the house wiring wherever it is wanted, and at prices in line with the class of work done and material put into it.

Word was received from the warrant purchasers this week that their attorney has approved the warrant issue, the warrants were being printed, and would soon be here for the signature of the City Council. As soon as this is done, they will be returned, with draft attached.

The engineers of Dallas have had a man here this week looking over the engineering part of the work, making some surveys, locations, etc. and promises to have his part of the work up as soon as possible.

Scattered Rains

"The Lord maketh it to rain upon the just and the unjust" is words of consolation to the more reverend of late. If it had just rained on the just then there would be a few Panhandle people wondering upon what they have been basing their religion.

Good rains have fallen over many parts of the Panhandle. The west side of Roberts county has received a nice part of its share. The east side and all of the Mobeetie country have not received any. Where it has been raining, feed crops are looking nice and grass has already begun to live up some, and much good has been received from the rains generally. The entire Pampa country has received good rains.

Foot Ball

The thoughts of the local High School football men are turning toward the opening of school as this means the opening of the football season over the country. The locals have secured the services of E. M. Giblette as coach. Mr. Giblette is an old football man having played on Indiana State University for three years and coached several winning High School and College teams since that time. The boys are intending to work hard and put the best team that Miami has ever had in the field.

City Council Meet

The City council was in session yesterday morning and made a few changes. They also passed a very strict house wiring code relative to installing electric lights. They also contracted with Chas. Halstead of Canadian to take charge of our lighting system. Mr. Halstead is among the best electricians in the state, and will likely move to Miami at an early date and begin his part of the wiring.

Jack Wilson was appointed street commissioner succeeding Gus Severson. Mr. Wilson was also appointed fire marshal succeeding Claude Carr.

Over The Plains

Valuable potash deposits have been discovered in a cliff near Amarillo. The Government has asked for contracts; and they predict that a munitions plant may be established there.

Plainview is having her troubles with carnivals, the city has issued an ordinance to the effect that no Carnival Companies may operate within the city limits.

Pampa, is going to put her electric light plant in a new building in the near future.

Several new town sites will be laid out along the proposed North Texas and Santa Fe Railroad in the north tier of counties. Several towns such as La Kemp, and Gray Okla. have unaimously voted to move "Bag and Baggage" to the new town sites.

Lee Gunter of Wheeler County was re-elected sheriff by a majority of 160 votes over E. J. West.

The Socialists of the Panhandle will hold a big three days camp meeting at Wellington Aug. 29, 30, 31.

J. L. Day near Petersburg has 200 acres of broom corn which is about ready to harvest. He expects to get 40 tons and as the price is now \$250 per ton he is to receive \$10,000 for the crop.

The Lipscomb County Fair will be held at Higgins on September 7th, 8th, and 9th.

Heavy rains have been reported over the Panhandle this week and the farmers and cattlemen are rejoicing thereby.

M. Huselby of Mobeetie and a prominent cattleman of the Panhandle has one of the best calf crops this year that he has had in years. Mr. Huselby last week branded 400 head. The calves are in good shape and will bring a good price on the market.

Ground has been broken at Canadian for the hospital, which when completed will be a valuable addition to the Panhandle. Dr. H. C. Caylor is erecting the plant.

Wheeler County watermelons are coming on the market and also being shipped to other parts of the state.

Newman Buys Store

J. A. Newman closed a deal last week with Locke Bros and C. C. Stockstill whereby he becomes owner of the B. Z. Williams store and Miami residence. Mr. Newman will take charge Sept. 15th. We are glad to state that Mr. Newman will enter business in our town and he has many friends and customers who will also appreciate it.

Vote in Miami Saturday

A ruling has been made to the effect that voters who live in Roberts county can vote in Miami Saturday on the Culberson-Colquitt race, provided no election is held in their precincts. We understand that some of the smaller boxes were not fixing to hold an election and this ruling was made in order that every one who wanted to vote could get one. Don't forget that Saturday is election day.

Farmers Congress

Delegates we mentioned in last weeks Chief are this week attending the Farmers Congress at Amarillo which is being held the last three days of the week.

The local farmers Institute is seriously considering the erection of a farmers elevator at Codman and Miami. This they can easily do with the co-operation of all, and there seems to be a determined effort among many to build it. There are many other advantages to be derived from an elevator in the way of handling coal and feed stuffs, and this move would undoubtedly be a great benefit to them.

We will be glad to see co-operation among our farmers and let them get every cent that is coming for their wheat, etc. and this can only be done by proper co-operative methods.

Rail Road Improvements

The Santa Fe is doing quite a lot of improving in Miami. Last week they began the erection of a large steel water tank just north of the old one. Teams are busy this week grading for an additional switch on the south side of the track.

Commissioners Court

Roberts county Commissioners Court was in session last week and allowed the usual run of bills, approved the quarterly reports of the Sheriff, Treasurer and Clerk.

They canvassed the returns of the Road Bond Election and give the official vote of 50 against and 173 for the bonds. This places the road bonds to where the clerk will make up the official report to the state, and as soon as the bonds are approved by the Attorney General, they will be issued.

Canadian Texas, Aug. 20—George W. Henson, age about 45 a well known insurance man of this place met his death near Childress, Texas, this morning about 9 o'clock while driving his Dodge car at a fair speed but not extra fast. One of the wheels of the car came off, which caused the car to turn over pinning Mr. Henson beneath, bruising him internally which was the cause of his death.

Mr. Henson was well and favorably known throughout the entire Panhandle of Texas, he having lived in the plains country for twenty years and had lived in Canadian for three years. His home prior to his coming to the Panhandle was Dallas, Tex., He was an agent for the American Central Life Insurance Co. of Indianapolis, Ind., and has been awarded a number of worthy prizes given by this company. The remains will be brought here on tomorrows train and the funeral take place Tuesday afternoon.

Stock Loss Great

The loss of livestock from disease on the farms of Texas during the past years has been above normal. We lost 39,000 horses and mules valued at \$3,500,000; 327,000 cattle valued at \$9,820,000; 90,000 sheep worth \$359,000, and in 192,000 hogs valued at \$1,534,000, making a total loss of 648,000 animals valued approximately at \$15,213,000. This makes a heavy drain upon the farmer and he should write the A. & M. College, the Texas Sanitary Livestock Commission and the Federal Bureau of animal industry for bulletins and information on the health and treatment of diseases common among animals.

Mr. Sohns and Miss Marie Andrix were married in St. Louis, Mo., in 1895 and the union were born seven children, six of whom survive. They are: H. P. Sohns of Groom, Mrs. Andy Sohns of St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Kuehn of Miami, Mrs. Emma of Plainview and Miss Eva who lives with the parents.

The Sohns family moved to the Panhandle in 1905 and remained here up to the time when they went back to St. Louis and have resided there since. The family has a large Panhandle acquaintance, and a host of friends who will mourn the loss of this section will mourn the loss of the sudden death of a beloved friend. He was a member of the Evangelical church and a devoted Christian.

Texas Compulsory School Law

W. F. Dangleby, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has issued a bulletin on the compulsory school law which goes into effect in Texas September 1st of this year. The bulletin outlines the law as follows.

Every child in the state who is eight years and not more than fourteen years of age shall be required to attend the public schools for a period of not less than sixty days for the school year, beginning September 1st 1916, and for a period of not less than eighty days for the school year beginning September 1st 1917 and for the school year 1918-19, and each year thereafter a minimum attendance of 100 days shall be required.

The period of compulsory school attendance at each school shall begin on the opening of the school term authorized by the district school board.

The following classes of children are exempt from these requirements of this act: Any child in attendance upon a private or parochial school or who is being properly instructed by a private tutor.

Any child whose bodily or mental condition is such as to render attendance inadvisable.

Any child who is blind, deaf, dumb or feeble-minded, for the instruction of whom an adequate provision has been made by the school district.

Any child living more than two and one-half miles by direct and traveled road from the nearest public school supported by children of the same grade and color of each grade, and who are free transportation provided.

Any child who is attending a school which is not a public school, and who has completed the work of the fourth grade of a standard elementary school of seven grades, and whose service are needed in support of a parent or other person standing in parental relation to the child.

The law also provides free text books where parents are unable to provide their children with books, and prohibits the employment of children of school age during school hours. The law also provides for the punishment of delinquent parents and for bonding of incorrigible children.

Building Activity

Miami is putting on her real appearance—that of a sure enough live town, and doing the building act right.

B. Z. Williams purchased two lots yesterday of Mrs. Hogan, located directly across the street from Mr. Daughetee and will soon begin the erection of a splendid new house, modern throughout.

The splendid new Thomas O'Loughlin residence was completed last week.

Construction work on the magnificent new Jim Wells home is progressing nicely.

The foundation on the new C. S. Seiber house has been laid and construction will begin at once.

There are several other new residences that are being planned which will be built and will likely begin within thirty days.

It is needless, I am sure, for me to mention the many advantages to be derived from an organization of this kind. The tourists travel is growing each year and the better posting of the different highways is causing the tourists to travel the lines that are best posted and concerning which they can get the best information. Amarillo at this time is enjoying a tourist travel of approximately 125 cars a day. The writer has been compelled, owing to the condition between Canadian and Higgins, to route cars in the past away from you. He hopes and understands that the road from Canadian to Higgins is being completed and with an organization perfected so that this road may be logged and signed, numbers of cars each day will pass through your city that have been detoured around in the past. We are very anxious at this place to perfect this organization and are ready and willing to do everything we can to assist in the organization work.

We trust that you will see that a representative from your city will be at this meeting in Amarillo and vested with power to vote for the coming good of all concerned. The expense will be very small and the benefits to be derived will be very great.
