Highway Meeting Tuesday.

Tuesday was the appointed day from the second meeting of the Amarillo-Higgins Highway. The meeting was held at 1 p. m. in the Odd Fellows hall and was interesting, though not attended. President E. C. Gray and E. Longden of Higgins, Judge J. Jennings and B. F. Teepe of Canadian and C. C. Cockrell of Amarillo were the outside representatives present. A large number were intending to come, but were prevented on account of the heavy rains Monday night Tuesday morning. Logging and sign committees were appointed as follows, E. C. Gray, of Higgins, B. F. Longden of Canadian, N. S. Locke, of Miami and Sam Vaughn of Amarillo. Another meeting will be held in Canadian on Friday, Dec. 15th, at which time it is expected that the entire line will be opened and ready to be logged.

School Notes.

Mr. Cunningham is quite busy this week, installing the gasoline cooking plant in the Domestic Science Department.

Due to the damp weather, short recesses and an early adjournment has been the rule this week.

The new sanitary drinking fountains have arrived and are being installed. This is a much needed improvement.

Practice will soon begin on a school play, "Engaged by Wednesday." The play will be staged here about Thanksgiving for the benefit of the Household Arts Department and will be taken to Canadian for the benefit of Athletics.

The High School has been notified that the "Lass-O," the weekly publication of the State College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas, will be sent to our library since we have been approved by the State Department of Education.

Word has been received that "Amarillo Foot ball boys will be here Saturday in all their war paint and feathers." The Miami boys are preparing to scrape the paint off and pull the feathers out.

Toggery Changes

A deal was closed yesterday whereby Mr. Martin sold the Toggery to Flake George who took charge this morning. Mr. George will continue the business in its present location. Mr. Martin has not given out what he intends to do.

Indians Coming to Canadian Oct. 27th.

Canadian will, on the 21st of the current month, show to the people of this portion of Texas, the receding history of the red men under the direction of Prof. T. C. Moore.

A band of 75 Cheyenne Indians have been employed to come to Canadian. They will arrive here on Thursday night and go into camp within the limits of the city of Canadian. On Friday night they will give the War Dance. On Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock they will kill the long horn steer, that is the longest horn institution that can be provided in this section of the Panhandle.

This performance will be pulled off by a large bunch of buck Indians riding bare back with the war paint on and the feathers pointing high. And it will be an absolute reenactment of the early days of the Texas plains. Immediately after dinner the spectators will be permitted to see the Indians in actual camp life before proceeding to the grounds where this band, together with 100 volunteer Cowboys will give a shambattle, during which time an emigrant train will be captured and destroyed. The carturing of women and children will be reenacted and the scalping of the cowboys will be again brought into vogue.

This will afford the people of this section of the country to review in a most realistic fashion the scenes of the early frontier.

Woodwards husky bunch of football players invaded Miami last week and defeated the locals after a hard fought game to the score of 21—0.

The visitors did all of their scoring in the first period and in the remaining periods Miami held her heavier opponents to a standstill. Miami contracted to play a high school men and next time elephants and hippopotomuses will be barred. "Big Ike" woodwards left tackle, and weighing 200 pounds was a thorn in the flesh of the locals offense, and as their were several other men among the visitors a close second to this big fellow, Miami's path was strewn with difficulties.

Gray and M. Coffee got away with several nice end runs, and Carter at full pierced the heavy Woodward line for many nice gains. Coffee plunges off right tackle showed that a little man can hit the line as well as a big man. Mathers got away with a nice forward pass in the second quarter, and if he hadn't fell he would have scored. Capt. Mathers, at the end and Dickerson at tackle put up gilt edged work on defense, and Jones and Talley were not far behind, after the first quarter the game went Miami way and the heavy visitors were out played but umpires decisions, and time out kept them from scoring time after time.

Taking it all together it was one of the best games seen in Miami for several seasons, and the locals covered themselves with glory and are to be congratulated on the showing they made against a bunch that out weighted them 25 pounds to a man.

Woodwards, right guard Culler, was there with the forward pass, and this is what caused the defeat of the locals.

Hard practice will be the order of the week when the strong Amarillo team comes next Saturday and Miami, hopes to retrieve herself.

Electric Light Sparks

Not quite sparking yet, but will be some time. Manager Halsey is expecting a car load of light poles to arrive first of next week, which when here will be erected at once. Wires, etc. have been ordered and will likely be here at any time. The City Council closed a deal this week for a lot to build on and located the place for the plant. They purchased land of Mr. Edge, on the half block north of W. H. Rhodes residence.

Manager Halsey went to Dallas Monday night to be in conference with the engineers and purchase machinery as soon as practical.

Already about 25 houses have been wired, and likely by the time the juice is turped on, a sufficient amount of wiring will have been done to make the plant self sustaining from the start. The Council is making every possible effort to get the plant in operation before Christmas.

Game Laws.

H. L. Stewart, deputy game warden, submits the following information on the seasons for game, for the benefit that it may do:

Doves.—Sept. 1 to March 1. Ducks and Deese—Oct. to February 1.

Quail—December 1 until February 1.

Deer—Bucks only Nov. 1 until January 1.

Turkey—December 1 until April 1.

Plover and Snipe—Nov. 1 until February 1.

There is no open season on cranes, curlews or swan until after September 1, 1918. House Sparrow, hawks, buzzards, blackbirds or owls or not protected.

No license is required to hunt in the county of your residence or counties adjoining the county of your residence, but a state license costing \$1.75 is required for hunting outside of these counties. The non-residence license is \$15.

The Federal law prohibits the hunting of any game between sunset and sunrise.

The limited amount of game each hunter is permitted to take is as follows:

Doves, quail, prairie chicken, ducks and Geese—15 in a day.

Deer—Three bucks in a season.

Turkey—Three in one season.

A peculiar condition pertaining to the hunting of prairie chickens comes about through the law formerly operative on their hunting terminating before another can be passed by the next session of the legislature next year. This makes an open season on prairie chickens and will continue until the next legislature takes action. The first five year period on them expired June 12, 1916 and unless the next legislature renews this law persons will be allowed to shoot these birds Nov. 1 until February 1.—Panhandle.

Commissioners Court.

The Honorable Commissioners Court of Roberts county was in session Monday of this week. The usual run of bills were allowed, and the selling of our road bonds confirmed. The bonds have been sold at par and interest, with a \$500 forfeit on them. A road was not laid out connecting us with the Hemp-hill county line, but laid over for the present meeting.

The entire court will go to Higgins soon to investigate what Lipscomb county is doing and how they are proceeding to get the most good from the money spent on roads.

Over the Plains.

Collinsworth County will vote to morrow on a \$100,000 bond issue for improving their public roads. Indications are that it will carry by a large majority.

A strip six miles wide and across the south part of Wheeler county have ask the Commissioners Court to order an election to vote \$20,000 worth of road bonds for the district. Money if received will be put on the Ozark Highway.

1500 automobiles loaded with people visited the Buffalo Hunt on the Goodnight ranch last Friday. People were there from all over the entire Panhandle and parts of Oklahoma.

Plainview has recently started a cooperative dairying scheme and has sent a buyer east to purchase 200 thoroughbred cows for various farmers.

Miss Ollie Buster of Hereford, was instantly killed last week when thrown from an automobile. The car struck a rough place in the road and was going fast, and threw her out breaking her neck.

A petition is now before the City Council of Higgins asking for an election on the 18th day of Nov. to vote \$20,000 water works bonds on the city.

Highways over the Panhandle are creating more good road enthusiasm than anything that happened lately. A big portion of the Panhandle counties are voting bonds, holding good road day workings, monthly donation lists and using other available methods to get better roads.

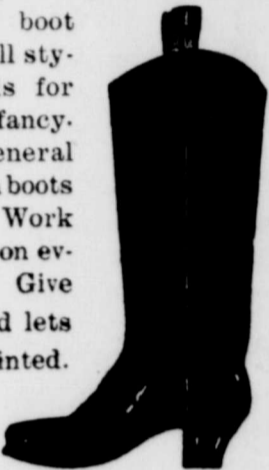

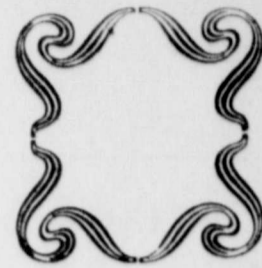

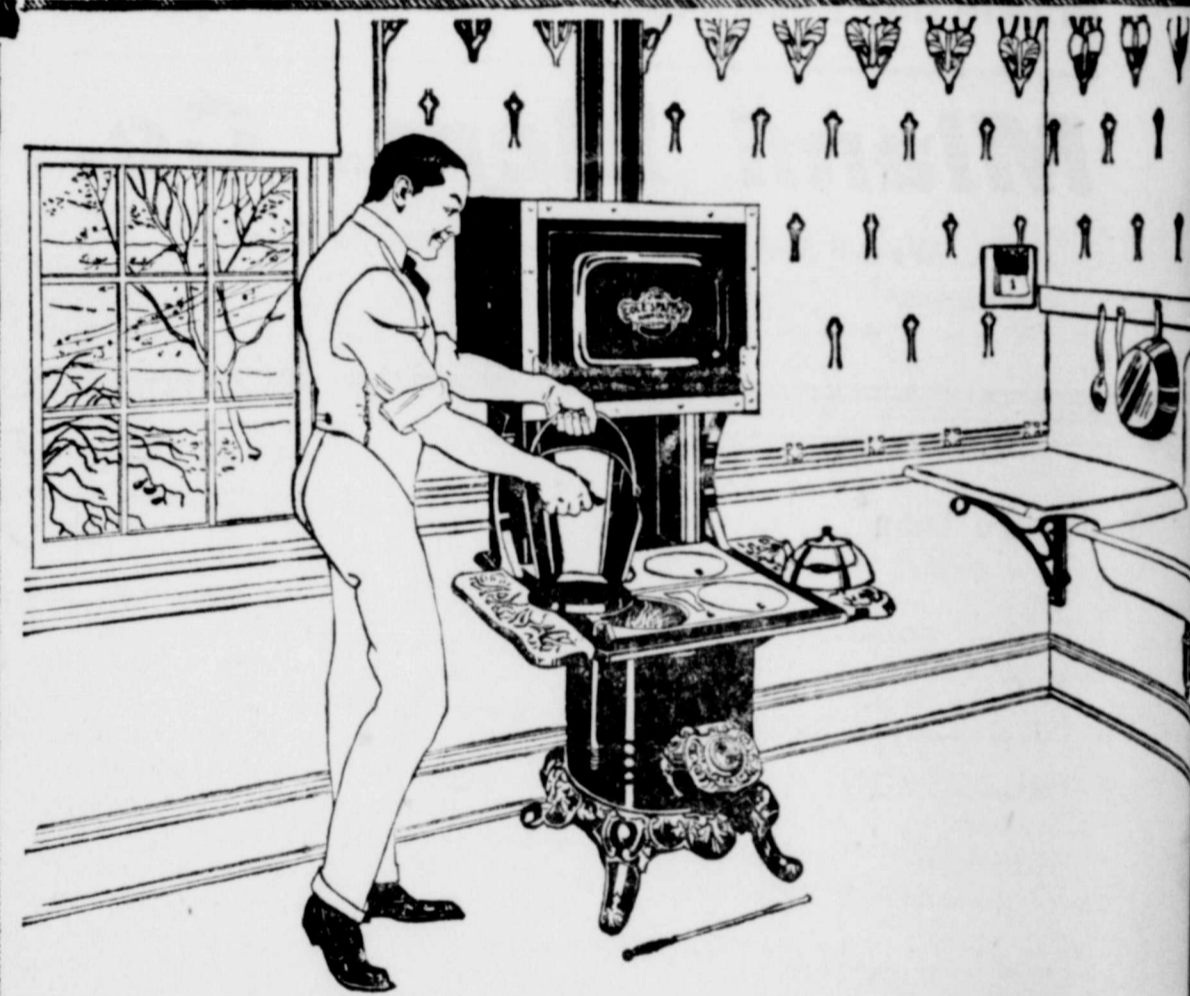
