More Money for Schools

House Joint Resolution 30 passed by the 34th Texas legislature, submits an amendment to the state constitution to be voted on by the people at the general election to be held in November, 1916, providing that the legislature may enact a law permitting common and independent school districts to levy local school tax not to exceed one dollar on the \$100 of assessed property valuation by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, and also permitting counties to levy a county school tax of 50 cents on the \$100 of assessed property valuation to supplement the county school funds if a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county desire to do so.

The adoption of this amendment does not, therefore, impose a tax upon any one, but simply removes the constitutional handicap which forbids many localities having efficient schools, and allows the people of school districts and counties where they desire to do so to provide adequate financial support from their own funds for the proper maintenance to their own schools.

In many sections of the state the schools are suffering seriously on account of insufficient funds. The people of such districts desire better schools for their children, but the constitution stands in the way. Is this right? If you do not need the amendment in your county or district, will you not help your fellow citizen in some other section who does need it.

The state of Arkansas has a constitutional limit of seven mills for locals school purposes as against five mills in Texas. The people of Arkansas are asking that this limit be raised to only 10 mills. Oklahoma already has a state school tax of 15 mills.

It is an acknowledged fact that Texas is considerably below the average among the states of the United States from the standpoint of an efficient public school system, and the main reason for this state of affairs is attributed to the facts that many of the schools of Texas are hindered by a constitutional restriction which forbids the people to provide out of their own means sufficient funds to maintain good schools, although, in a majority of instances, they are eager and willing to do so. Should not the constitution and laws serve the educational needs of the people?—Ex.

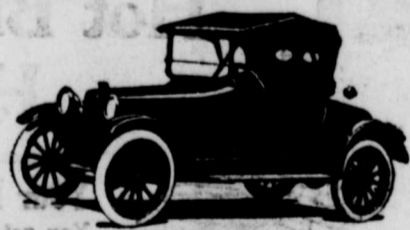

M. E. Church Note

In coming to the conclusion of my years work on the Miami charge, have thought it might be of interest to some, to know of my record during the six and one half years spent as pastor of the Methodist church at this place. Will say for the benefit of those who possibly do not know, that I served as pastor at this place the years of 1907, 8, 9, and 10. After this I spent one year at Shamrock, and two and one half years at Panhandle, upon the death of the much beloved and lamented Brother Lowry, the Bishop returned me to this work, to finish the unexpired portion of the year. This having been done, I was returned for the years 1915 and 16, making almost six and one half years as pastor of the Methodist church at this place. These have been years fought with much labor, joy and sorrow. I have seen many of my friends during these years, pass from darkness into the marvelous light and liberty of the sons of God, and are now making a good fight for the faith once delivered to the Saints. I have also stood near and witnessed others of them as they passed out into the great beyond, leaving behind them every evidence that the way was clear and the victory had been won. So these years have been full of labor, but in a large measure, years of pleasantness. I have tried to be true to every interest of the Kingdom committed to my care, and wherein there may have been failure, I am sure that it was not intentional. The charge, I think, will be left in most excellent condition, and should the present pastor succeed himself or be succeeded by another, the charge will be found well organized. Harmony prevails throughout the entire membership. No pastor ever had a more loyal, faithful and agreeable board of stewards and officials to deal with, during these six years and more, that I have been with them, there has never any jars or discord, but our work together has been most pleasant and satisfactory. In all of these years there has never been a deficit at this place either salaries or conference collections. I have always carried a clean balance sheet to conference. The church and parsonage are both in splendid repair, and without a cents indebtedness on either.

There has been a steady growth in the church membership. The membership now numbers two hundred and ninety. I have tabulated the following facts, with the data that I have in hand, which I think, is approximately correct:

I have received by baptism,

vows and certificates	180
Infants Baptized	20
Funerals preached	30
Marriage Ceremonies	25
Sermons preached	289
Collected for all purposes	\$15,315

It should be remembered that only half of my time was given to this place during all of these years with the bare exception from last April, when Miami assumed the dignity of station work. The above was almost duplicated at Pampa and Moebette, which received the other half of my time. The above was collected aside and apart from any church or parsonage building as there was no church or parsonage built during these years at this place, only some repairing. During the interim of my first and last pastorate, the work was served by three other pastors who did much in building and repairing, and adding many to the church.

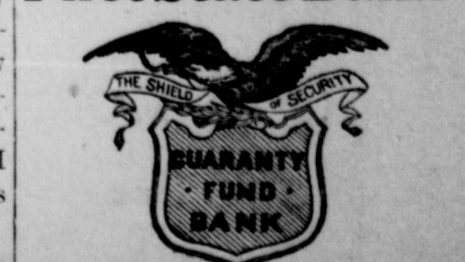

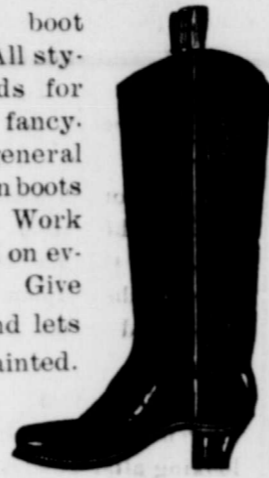

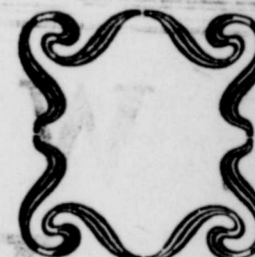
