## Electric Light Talk.

Just what and when we are going to get electric juice is yet a matter of speculation, however, things are developing more toward that end every week.

The council will begin tomorrow by laying the foundation for the engines, so that they will be ready for them when they arrive Monday of next week they will open bids for the erection of the brick building which will be 30 by 40 feet, and for the construction of the concrete tank on Mt. Moriah.

Among the material already on hand is the line wire, transformers, pump motor, engine bolts, etc. The poles which have been shipped for near two months is still on the road, and just where none seems to know, but three transformers are after them, and they may be expected most any time. Contract for the well will also be let at once and this part of the work completed. The casing and sand screens for the well are ready.

As soon as the contracts are let for the power house building, work will likely start on account of the approaching freezing weather, and this should be completed before Christmas.

## Farmers Elevator Busy.

The executive committee of the Red Deer Grain Company met Saturday and hired W. H. Rhodes as local manager for the organization with salary to start Monday of this week. Near enough stock has been subscribed for the building of two elevators. One will be built at Miami and the other at Codman. Mr. Rhodes is busy this week winding up the stock soliciting and collecting.

Mr. Rhodes has already ordered the stock certificates printed and will issue them as fast as the capitol is paid in. The company really mean business now, and we may expect the erection of the elevator to start as soon as the stock is paid in. The company will be incorporated for something like \$12,000.

## Canadian Some Fighters

Our neighboring and peaceful town of Canadian pulled off one of the biggest fights Wednesday night of last week that has happened in the Panhandle since the Adobe Walls battle. Starting about 9:30 round number one resulted in three or four men being "peeled up," round No two started a little later about a block from No 1, this time on the street when a few guns were flashed, but no triggers pulled, the third round was at one of the parties rooms a few hours later when three men went in and beat up a fellow a little. The fourth came about four o'clock the next morning on the street again with only two men engaged, and this ended the night of heavy fighting.

Some eight or ten men were engaged all together, and as a result, only one man has been confined to his bed, and one left town. The trouble seems to have started over a bad check or one that was turned down, supposedly given in a poker game.

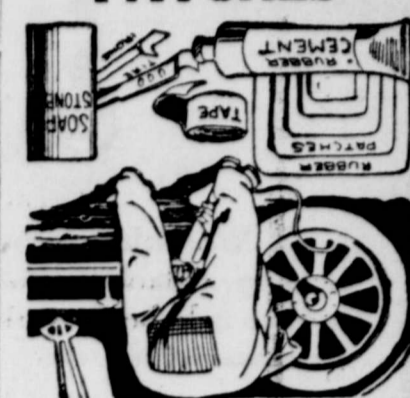

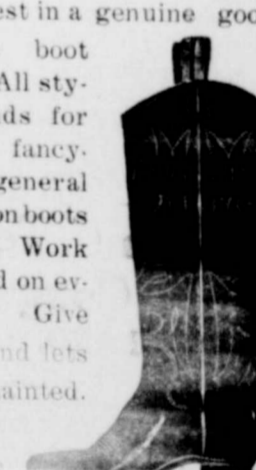
