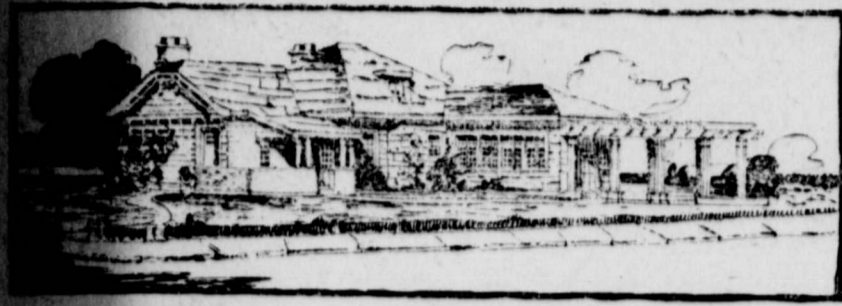

The accompanying photograph is a representation of what the Caylor Hospital at Canadian will look like when completed and assurance are abundant that the inside will be as modern with all appliances know to the medical fraternity and the adoption of the latest approved methods of administering to the suffering as one would naturally conclude from the outward appearances.

The staff is now being organized from physicians upon the Panhandle field and further assurances are given that the very best professionally trained nurses will be at the service of those whose are called upon to take advantage of hospital treatment thus afforded.

About April first this building is contemplated to be brought into service and at that there will be a general congregation of doctors in Canadian to participate in the opening at which time a program and dinner will be served that promises a pleasant and interesting diversion to those who attend. And monthly thereafter it is planned to hold a clinic which will give a training similar to a postgraduate course without the time and money necessary to go the large cities. Dr. Caylor desires the cooperation of the people of the north Panhandle to the end that human suffering may find great relief.

School Notes.

High School Inspector for the State University, Mr. Fletcher, spent Friday in Miami. He thoroughly inspected the work that is being done in our High School, visiting the various classes and obtained information regarding the courses that are being followed. Local Oil Company Organizes.

A company composed of Miami citizens have went into the oil business, or at least expect to do so soon and lower the price of gasoline.

Judge T. M. Cunningham went to the Caddo Oil fields in Louisiana and after a thorough investigation, located a tract of land practically surrounded by paying oil wells and purchased same. He has recently formed a company and sold out a portion of the feild, and the company are now preparing to put down a well where evidence shows that they are sure to get a good strike. The money for digging is now practically secured and they expect to start work by Feb. 15th.

The location of the Miami companies land is a choice of the feild and being located as it is, practically surrounded by big producing wells, it looks as if there is hardly a chance of them not getting a big strike.

Practically the entire number of lots that are for sale at all in this feild have been sold. The stock holders who have investigated this are very enthusiastic over the matter and it will be hard to get stock in this company at any price.

A meeting will be held to-morrow evening at Judge Cunningham's office at which time they will fully organize, name the company and elect a man to go the feild and remain until the well is completed. In all probability Judge Cunningham will be the one in charge.

Home Science Club.

The Home Science Club, in session with the president, Mrs. B. F. Talley, on Thursday afternoon Jan. 11, made some radical changes in the regular time of work.

The club name was changed from "Home Science" to "Home Progressive," and varied programs on Art literature, music and current events were adopted for the remainder of the Club year.

The Club still remains its supervision over the Home Science department of our public school, and will co-operate with the board of trustees in whatever is deemed best for the maintenance of the department. As soon as the Board feels able to sustain the department alone the club will turn its attention to providing the necessary means for installing Manual training in the school.

Old Timer Passes.

John Corcoran, the oldest known resident of Wheeler and Roberts county that was living here at the time of his death, died at his home in Miami Saturday morning. Mr. Corcoran got up Saturday morning and built a fire and returned to bed, stating that he did not feel well. His wife then arose and cooked breakfast, and when she went to awaken him, found that he was dead.

Mr. Corcoran, was 81 years old, and has been in the Panhandle country for over 40 years, coming here with the U. S. Army, and served as a Sargent at Ft. Elliott. He was also a soldier in the Union Army during the civil war, and drew a pension from the Government. Mr. Corcoran seemed at all times in good spirits, and had many interesting things to tell of early days in this part of the country.

His remains were laid away in the Mobeetie Cemetary Sunday, and a Catholic Priest from Canadian conducted services. Many of the old timers and friends of Miami went over.

Mr. Corcoran leaves one living son, P. P. of Mobeetie, and his good wife to mourn his loss.

Who Runs the Paper?

In an eastern state a clergyman took the editor of a local paper to task because the editor accepted a certain advertising contract. The good man forgot that for years the editor had given freely of his space to help the church; had printed columns of notices of services, meetings, suppers, entertainments and lectures, all free. In donating this space the editor had given more than equivalent of cash. He had given publicity, and thus had done more to support the church and pay the minister's salary than any three members of the church had done. An editor has but two sources of income, his subscription list and his space. Yet, in this case, when he sold his space he lost a subscriber. Of course, no one need subscribe to a paper unless he wishes to do so, but no subscriber should want to dictate to the editor as to what he should publish. Many editors will not accept certain lines of advertising. Other editors cannot afford, perhaps, to be so independent. Business conditions often govern these matters. A rich and prosperous Philadelphia weekly of national circulation for years declined the advertisements of cigarette manufacturers. Business has fallen off lately for many of the big magazines. Now that paper is accepting cigarette advertising. Perhaps the editor needs the money and who shall blame him if he sells his space to the American Tobacco Company? Collier's too we hear, is letting down the bars, just a little. That's all right. Let them down a little further, as long as fakers, and grafters and swindlers are kept out. No one can run a paper to please everyone, be that paper big on little. It is the editor's paper and it is his living. He is the one who should judge what should and what should not be published in its columns.

**THE NEED OF A PUBLIC
 CITY LAW.**

An effort will be made by
 the Texas Press Association
 to have the present legislature
 pass an adequate publicity law,
 one that will meet the demands
 of a growing state, to take the
 place of the present makeshift
 which was passed possibly fifty
 years ago, when there was not
 an average of one newspaper
 to each county in Texas. The
 passage of such a law as pro-
 posed is one of the crying
 needs of the times for several
 reasons. Local notices that
 are now posted on bulletin
 boards should be published in
 newspapers where people will
 read them. Every act of the
 county commissioners should
 be published as paid advertis-
 ing, and every dollar of the
 public's money should be ac-
 counted for through the public
 prints and paid for. Such a
 law would be a good thing in
 more than one way. It would
 inform the taxpayers as to the
 disposition of their money and
 at the same time make county
 officials more careful in the ex-
 penditure of public funds, as

well as put an effective check
 on official grafting. Here in
 Angelina County about every
 two years the district judge ap-
 points a finance committee to
 audit the books of the various
 county officers. The work
 usually requires two or three
 weeks, at an expense to the tax
 payers of several hundred dol-
 lars. Their report is finally
 made and pigeon holed, and
 not one citizen in a hundred
 ever knows what the report
 contains. They pay for the
 auditing, and should know
 what they are paying for—but
 they don't. The city of Luf-
 kin recently employed an audi-
 tor at an expense of several
 hundred dollars to audit the
 books of the city. We are
 told on the quiet that this
 auditor saved the city more
 than the amount paid him, but
 what do the taxpayers know
 it. Not one line of that re-

port has ever been made public
 and the people who paid the
 auditor are as much in the
 dark as to his findings as is the
 Emperor of China. They are
 entitled to a full, fair and im-
 partial report of the auditor,
