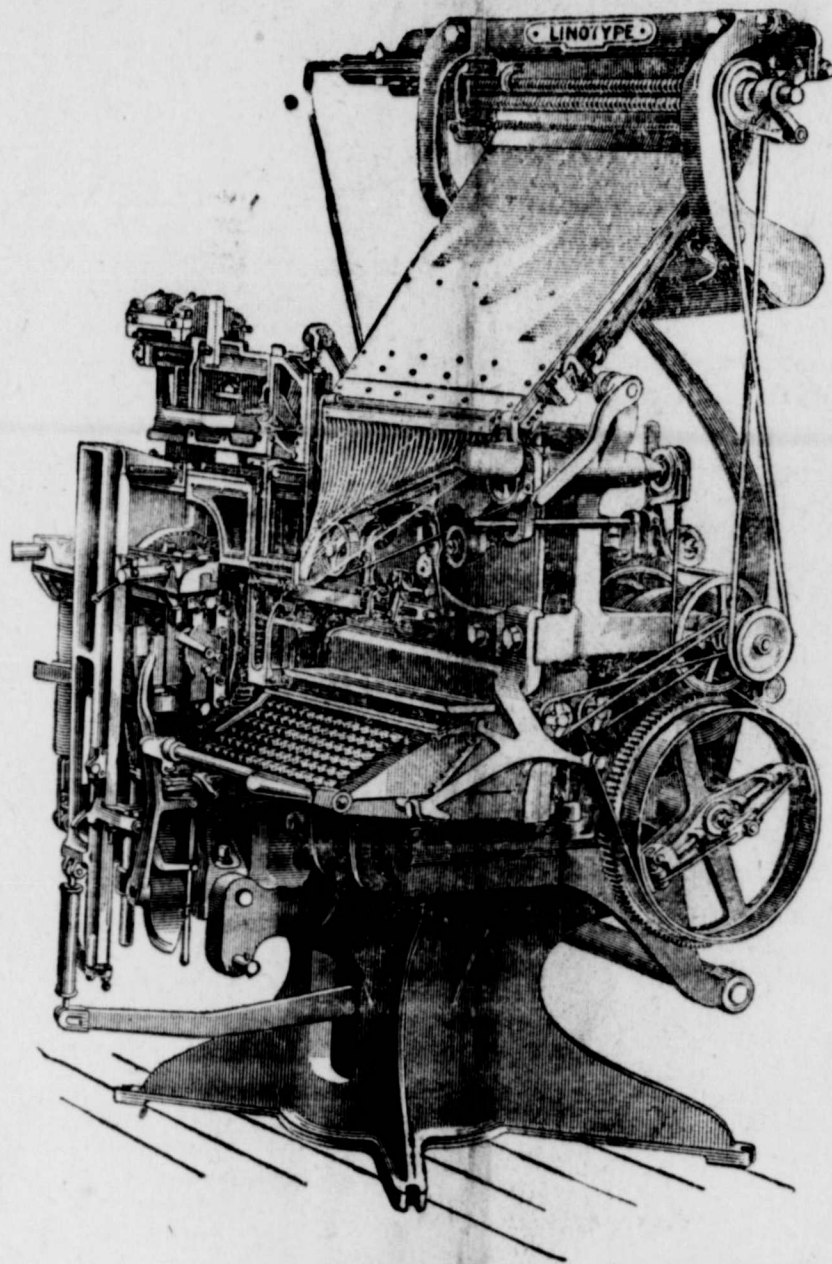
Socially Speaking.
