In the preceeding three weeks of November thirteen other new ships were completed for the Corporation. They ranged in size from 2,900 to 10,475 tons. They were a few of the

Altogether 426 ship have been! commandeered in order that work on them might be hastened. Of these, thirty-three have been finished. They are full size ships averaging 7,800

Most of the commandeered ships are in an advanced stage of construction. Scarcely a day passes that does not see at least one of them added to the shipping resources of the Allies.

CARING FOR FARROWING SOW

Exercise Should Be Given and Corn Ration Decreased-Don't Feed Too Rich Ration.

Exercise the sow daily before farrowing. Decrease the corn ration and increase the tankage rather than the middlings. For 24 hours after far-"Yes-it's what might be called the rowing do not feed the sow, or feed lightly. Water should be supplied. Care should be taken not to feed the sow too rich a ration. More milk may be available than the pigs can

take, and milk fever may result. After farrowing, the pigs should be given plenty of exercise, to prevent thumps. Rails about the sides of the pen will keep the sow from lying on the pigs. If colony houses are used, a lighted lantern hung inside on very cold nights will help to keep the houses warm.
