Run your clock up an hour, says a bill passed by the last U. S. Congress, on April 1st of each year, then back an hour in the fall. Every clock in the United States will be pushed forward an hour, if they keep time with government. Many of the big experts and big men of our nation say this will save an hour of daylight every day and maby it will, but hang-ed if this getting up at five o'clock isn't going to come pretty early for us after the first of next month.

The date for the Panhandle Press meeting are set for Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25th. APRIL 1 LAST DAY FOR FEDERAL RETURNS

Penalties for Income Dodgers Are Severe—Get Your Return in if You Are Liable.

April 1, 1918, is the final day allowed under the federal income tax law for the filing of federal income tax returns. Persons who are required to file returns under the provisions of law and who fail to get their returns in on time are subject to severe penalties, as follows:

For making false or fraudulent return, not exceeding \$2,000 or not exceeding one year's imprisonment, or both, in the discretion of the court, and, in addition, 100 per cent. of the tax evaded.

For failing to make return on time, not less than \$20 nor more than \$1,000, and, in addition, 50 per cent. of the amount of tax due.

If on account of illness or absence from home you are unable to render your return within the time prescribed by law you may obtain an extension of 30 days if a request therefor is filed with the collector of your district before the due date of the return. In this request you must state the reason why the return cannot be filed within the time prescribed by law.

Collectors of internal revenue are not authorized to grant extensions of more than 30 days, but the commissioner of internal revenue has authority to grant a reasonable extension beyond 30 days in meritorious cases. If you desire an extension of more than 30 days your request should be addressed to the commissioner and should contain a detailed statement covering the reasons which make it impossible for you to file your return on or before April 1.

The internal revenue men are now completing their tour of the country, during which they were in touch with the people of every city and town. If you failed to get in touch with the deputy which visited your section it is not too late to get advice. Consult your postmaster as to where the nearest deputy is now. Get your blank form, study the directions and the requirements as shown thereon and make your return without fail if your income was sufficient to come within the bounds named in the law.

It is pointed out by Commissioner Roper that it is important that the people comply with the federal laws as fully as they are complying with the drafts for men and the conservation of foods and fuel. "The war must be paid for," says Commissioner Roper. "Congress has as much right to conscript a just portion of income as it has to conscript our boys. The tax for 1917 is designed to reach moderate as well as large incomes, so that all persons who are in financial position to bear a portion of the heavy government expenses can be assessed in proportion to their ability to pay."

"The man who is barely making a living or barely supporting a family is not affected by the 1917 law. But the man who is able to bear a share of the burden has been reached by the new law, and he should accept his responsibility in the same patriotic spirit that our young men have shown in offering themselves for this great purpose of the country to make the world safe for people of all kinds to live in and to govern themselves."

This tax is one which recognizes women as an equal basis with men. The unmarried woman or the married woman with a salary must make tax return just the same as any man. Only the woman supporting her mother or other members of her family may take out \$2,000 exemption.

Under the law the head of the family is the one whose earning power contributes to the family's support.

Similarly a widow with small children to support can take out \$2,000 exemption and \$200 additional exemption for each of her children under eighteen. Thus it is intended that the law shall work no hardship to women having to struggle to get along. But each must file the return if her income is \$1,000.

A man whose wife dies and who is left with small children to support upon a moderate income may also take full exemption under the new tax law and also claim \$200 exemption for each of his children under eighteen.

The widower under the law is a single man and must make tax return accordingly. Married men need not file returns unless they are earning \$2,000 or more.

"This is as much a national obligation as the reporting for duty of a man drafted for service with the colors," says D. C. Roper, commissioner of internal revenue. "As it stands, it is much a matter of the man or woman's own conscience. It is for him or for her to determine just how far he is liable to the tax. He must figure his own income and if it reaches the figures named in the law must make faithful report upon it to the proper authority."

"This tax is distinctly a war measure and will be in effect during the war."

"This is a people's tax—it reaches right down into the pockets of the small wage earner; it makes him a partner in the job of winning the war."

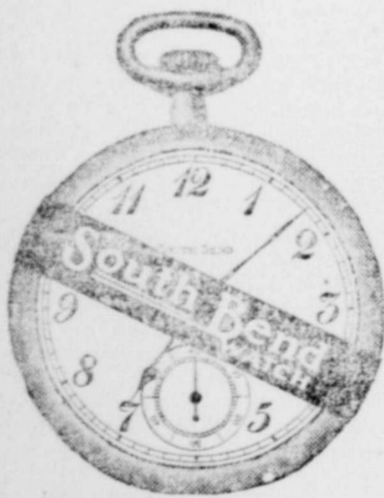

Camp Travis, Texas, March 23, 1918
 "There will be no lost motion at Camp Travis. Every movement made by every soldier of this command must be made with a distinct purpose." This is the opinion of Major Henry T. Allen, Commanding the Ninetieth Division, National Army, who has recently returned from a careful inspection of the English, French and American troops in the war zone of France.

The absolute necessity for a coordination of physical activity with mental activity is apparent to those who have seen service or have visited the fronts in Europe, according to General Allen. With this end in view, the soldiers of Camp Travis are to be given a thorough course of training of such nature that will call into play, not only the muscles of the body, but the muscles of the brain.

The success of the Allies in a great measure can be attributed to the fact that the average soldier of the Allied Armies is a clearer thinker, and a more concise thinker, than is the German soldier. The German soldier is often driven, while the soldiers of the Allied forces are led into combat. Without their officers, it has been shown that the German forces break down. This is not true in the Allied forces where non-commissioned officers and even men without rank have stepped into the breach at the proper time and lead their respective units to victory or safety.

It is the development of men in the ranks who are capable of leading when the occasion demands that General Allen is intending. Nor can the men themselves be choosers of the time and place. For this reason it is necessary that every soldier be able to think and act, that he know and understand clearly what should be done and does it. In order that minds may be kept continually active, the plan is in operation whereby officers and men alike must think when they act.

An example of the coordination on necessary for precise military salutations demonstrates the point. Where officers and men might previously salute with an almost nonchalant wave of the hand, is substituted a style of saluting which re-

quires heads to be turned toward the parties saluted and the eyes looking directly into those of the person saluted. It requires four movements to complete the salute. These four movements may not be altogether necessary for compliance with the former drill regulations on the subject, but they serve to do more. No man can salute and salute, properly at Camp Travis without knowing and without thinking just what he is doing. Many times a day salutes are made and returned and every time a stimulus is of necessary sent through the brain.

Aside from this training of mind and body that will fit the soldiers of Camp Travis for victorious soldiers, there is yet another result equally as far reaching. When the war is over and the soldiers have returned to their homes or farms, their will not be slow acting, sluggish minds. They will be able to take their places among the leaders as worthy citizens better able to cast a ballot and assist in the administration of the affairs of the country.

No better evidence of the spirit generally prevailing throughout the country could be secured than that of a recent occurrence in the Depot Brigade at Camp Travis. Tired of his army life, a big negro, recruit decided to quit the army and return to his home. He did so, went "absent without leave" and returned to his home with the exception of being met with open arms. He was temporarily, but the father of the deserting negro was patriotic. He took the boy to the depot himself, boarded the train and brought him to the proper authorities in the camp. He went even further than this. He prepared for the expected charge that the boy was worthless and he wanted to get rid of him by bringing with him papers from reputable citizens stating he was a negro of good standing in the community in which he resided. It is only one of many instances occurring daily.

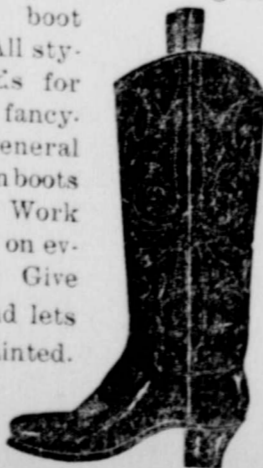

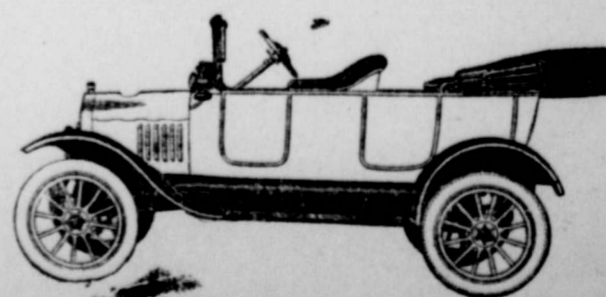

HOME TOWN HELPS

CONTROL OF TREES IN CITY
Los Angeles Newspaper Advocates Commission Which Should Wield Absolute Power.

What we need, and need badly right now, is a tree commission having absolute control of all street planting. The trees should be taken away from the owners of abutting property. He should neither be held responsible for them nor allowed to touch them, any further than any other resident of the city. Why has the city taken over street, curb and sidewalk, and allowed a narrow strip of private property to intervene? Why does the city partially control it? Is a divided interest and responsibility conducive to the best results? A study of our street planting will quickly bring an answer. Not one in a hundred is competent to choose the right tree for a street. The same percentage will care for them properly, and about the same number will agree on the same tree. No resident of Los Angeles need be told of the outcome of such laxity of control, or rather such absence of control. The need for a change is great, and the problem cries to high heaven for relief. When will it be solved, and solved aright? How long are we to continue under present conditions? All know a change must come—why delay? Our charter framers may help us out by providing for a tree commission in full control, with a corps of trained experts, to give us a city in the near future of which our residents for all time may be proud as the really city beautiful.—Los Angeles Times.

PUTTING YARD TO BEST USE

Bulletin of Department of Agriculture Gives Some Valuable Information to Those Interested.

The best methods to follow and the best crops to grow in order to make a small area like a back yard produce the maximum amount of food for the family are discussed in a publication of the United States department of agriculture, Farmers' Bulletin 818, "The Small Vegetable Garden." In addition to furnishing information in regard to the fundamental principles of gardening, this bulletin describes in detail the culture of all of the common garden plants, and also furnishes a table showing in a concise form the quantity of seed needed for each kind of vegetable, the proper way and times to plant, and the material required to produce the crop.

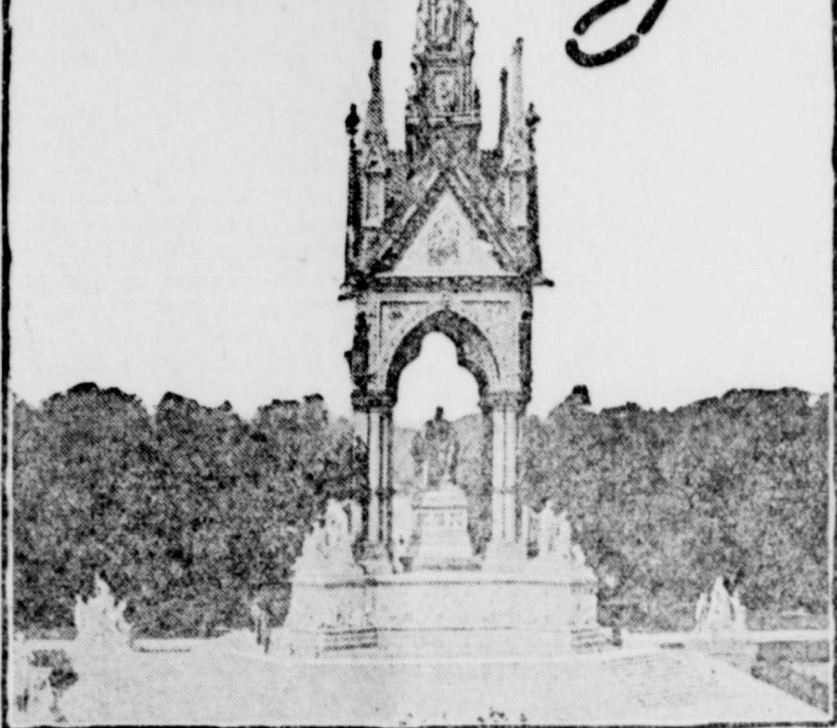
To make a small area produce a large amount of food, the bulletin points out that not only every foot of available space must be utilized, but that late or succession crops must be planted as soon as the earlier plants have been removed. To carry on gardening in this intensive way requires careful planning in advance, and it is recommended that a detailed diagram of the garden be drawn up and the various uses that it is planned to put each portion to, throughout the growing season, be clearly indicated. On this plan the success or failure of the various enterprises should be noted and the plan itself kept as a guide for the following year.

Encouragement Counts.
In every town there are a few of taste and purpose who will take the helm. To thoroughly arouse public interest is a long and arduous task. Make a beginning. Results will attract attention and gain support. It was Gladstone who said: "One example is worth a thousand arguments." Organize, interest the local press, interest this department, your efforts and progress will cheerfully be given place and encouragement in these columns. Every year of the past decade Mr. Reed has written thanks for substantial aid given "Reed and Riverside" in city beautification. In a very recent letter, in reviewing the progress of street planting in Riverside, he writes: "I remember very distinctly the very efficient aid I received through the 'City Beautiful' department of the Times." Let us hear of your work, no matter how humble or how small the community—and encouragement will be extended to all alike.—Los Angeles Times.

Landscape Gardening.
Landscape gardening has not received the attention that it deserves. We have not studied the kinds of rose that thrive best here, nor have we exercised care in preparing the soil for thrifty growth and blooming. Most people have merely dug holes in the ground and planted rose bushes without adding the elements on which roses thrive. Then we wonder in the blooming season why they do not produce fine flowers.

Novel Street Construction.
In one of the larger Michigan cities they are trying a novel type of street construction. Pavements 18 feet wide are being laid, confined between headers of concrete built as a part of the concrete foundation along the center of the street. A strip along each side of the pavement and the curb is built of earth and gravel, as are the shoulders of the paved country highway.

Seeing London In Two Days



The Albert Memorial.

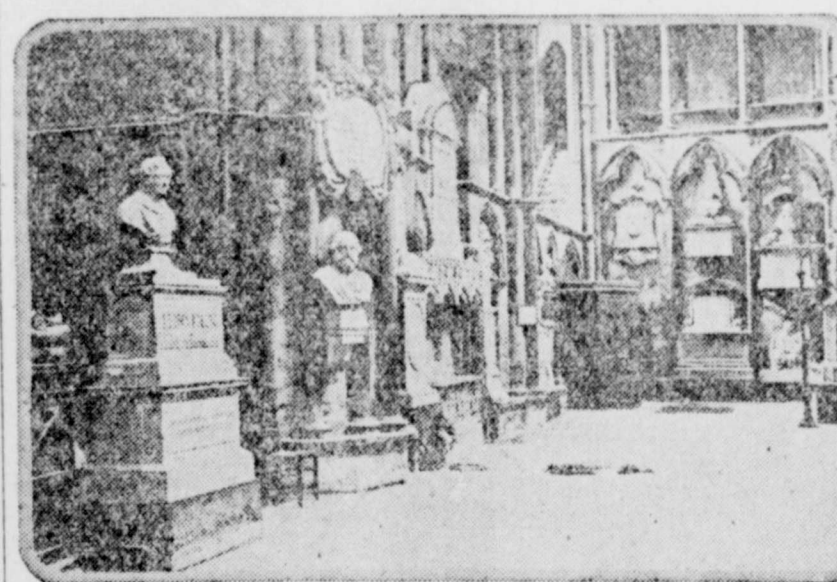
AS SO many American soldiers are passing through London on their way to the western front, the following article from Country Life on "How to See London in Two Days," is timely.

In normal days, when American visitors filled the hotels, sight-seeing was, in spite of American hustle, a fairly leisurely thing. It is the soldiers who are here today who have to be the real hustlers. Their sight-seeing has often to be crammed into a day or two's leave, and the problem of how to see all possible, and yet so to see as to store up mental pictures, clear, definite and full of color, on which to draw in pleasurable retrospect for the rest of life, is one which probably few of them are solving.

Now, the secret of success in sight-seeing is discrimination and selection. Try to see everything and you see—effectively—nothing. Your thousand impressions are mixed, in a week they are hard to disentangle, in a year they have vanished. On this principle I throw out ideas for those who have no more than a couple of days to give to the work and the pleasure. On more than one ground I should counsel the giving up of at least half a day to outdoor sight-seeing. The hugeness of London strikes everyone who gives days to its discovery. The best way of getting the same impression quickly is to travel from end to end of the route of one of the great London liners—the "General" motorbuses. It matters little which you take. Service 38—Victoria to Walthamstow—will show you much of west and central London and of the northeast. At Dal-

ton you can pick up No. 106 to Mile End station, thence you can return by the Mile End road to the city and by Fleet street and the Strand to the heart of things, having seen something of the real and wonderful East End, alien, cosmopolitan; and having passed through the Mile End road.

But this is only one suggestion. If you are for less variety and for more of the splendor, you can as easily go south, west or north—out by Kensington and Hammersmith to Richmond—and this will be for many a more delightful excursion, since it would give time for a peep at the wonderful view from the hilltop; or from Charing Cross to Golden Square.

While in the city I should suggest two other things at least to see—the Guildhall and St. Bartholomew's church—the former because of its historic connection with the city, as a hall that has been for 500 years the court of justice, the meeting place of the corporation and the scene of historic feasts.

I should ignore the houses of parliament, except as to the outside, but do not let the opinions of certain critics rob you of a right appreciation of this modern work. See Westminster hall, however, if you can, as the ancient court of justice, and for its magnificent timber roof.

There yet remain, of the major institutions, St. Paul's and the National gallery. They are more easy to deal with than Westminster or the Tower. St. Paul's has no secrets as Westminster has. It is revealed at one view. To have seen it from outside is to carry the memory of its huge bulk and form forever, and in the main that is true of it internally, though a few minutes can be spared for the tombs of Nelson, Wellington, Lord Roberts and other great soldiers. The National gallery, too, is comparatively easy to see on the principle of restraint.

One thing remains. Do not fail to walk the embankment from Westminster to Blackfriars, both for its river views and for the finest river front of buildings in the world.

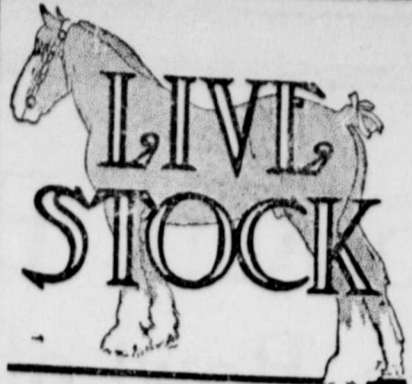

Colts that are kept growing make the best horses. Some farmers allow their young horses to "rough it" through the winter and, although this is a good practice when not carried to extremes...

Feeds that will promote growth should be supplied. Good, clean clover hay is palatable and slightly laxative. Timothy hay commonly is fed. Well-cured alfalfa hay free from dust is one of the best roughages for growing...

Slilage should not be fed to foals to any considerable extent. Sliced roots, such as carrots and sugar beets, are very palatable and have a cooling effect on the digestive system.

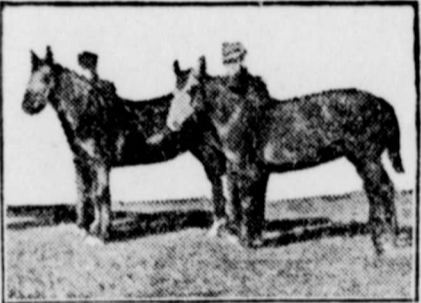

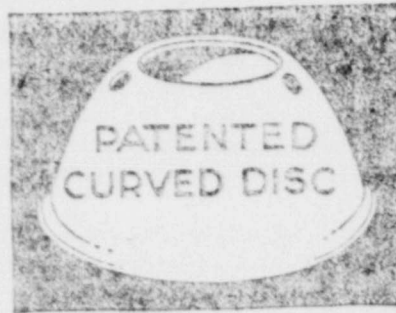

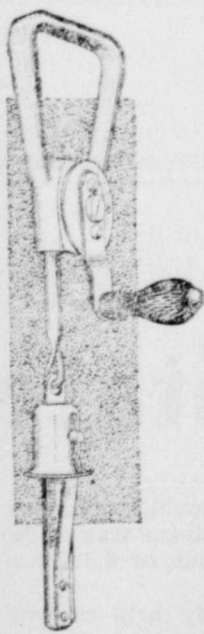
